The United States Senate Youth Program

The United States Senate Youth Program, established in 1962 by U.S. Senate Resolution, is a unique educational experience for outstanding high school students interested in pursuing careers in public service. Funded by the Hearst Foundations and administered in Florida by The Florida Law Related Education Association, Inc., this program is offered to qualified junior and senior high school students demonstrating leadership through public service in elected or appointed positions.

Two student leaders from each state are selected to participate in a special program March 3-10, 2018 in Washington experiencing national government in action. Student delegates will hear major policy addresses by Senators, cabinet members, officials from the Departments of State and Defense, and directors of other federal agencies, as well as participate in a meeting with a Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court. All transportation, hotel and meal expenses will be provided by The Hearst Foundations. In addition, each delegate will also be awarded a \$10,000 college scholarship for undergraduate studies, with encouragement to pursue coursework in history and political science.

This year, the State of Florida is proud to announce Stephen Marante and Carlee Goldberg as the 2018 delegates for the United States Senate Youth Program. Each delegate will participate in the 2018 Washington Week program. After being selected among the top applicants, Mr. Marante and Ms. Goldberg excelled during the interview process where they were asked questions about the American political system and current events. These students distinguished themselves among a highly competitive field with their exceptional dedication to public service and outstanding leadership in both their school and their community. The 2017-2018 selection committee included Mary Louise Hester, Deputy Director of Outreach from U.S. Senator Bill Nelson's office; Lance Watson, Regional Director from U.S. Senator Marco Rubio's office; and Michael DiPierro, Social Studies Education Specialist from the Florida Department of Education.

Applying for the United States Senate Youth Program

The application for the State of Florida is available at www.flrea.org annually at the beginning of each school year. Juniors and seniors wishing to apply must be serving in an elected or appointed leadership role for the entirety of the academic year. Qualifying student government, civic, or educational organizations include:

- Student body president, vice president, secretary, or treasurer
- Class president, vice president, secretary, or treasurer
- Student council representative
- Student representative elected or appointed (by a panel, commission, or board) to a local, district, regional, or state-level civic, service, and/or educational organization approved by The Florida Law Related Education Association, Inc. (state selection administrator)

In addition to the application, students must include letters of recommendation and an official copy of their high school transcript. Applications are thoroughly vetted, and the top applicants are selected for the interview phase where students are asked a series of questions assessing their knowledge of current events and the American political system.

Meet the 2018 Florida Delegates



Mr. Stephen Marante is a senior at Coral Springs High School located in Broward County, Florida. Mr. Marante currently holds the position of Student Advisor to the School Board of Broward County, representing over 270,000 students in the sixth largest school district in the United States. In this role, he advises school board members on how to vote on key issues impacting students throughout Broward County.
