# OFFICE MANAGER

## HELP WANTED

We need an Office Manager to supervise our office administration and co-ordinate the work of our office volunteers. It would be great if we had 2 volunteers (even better with 2 assistants) so that the Office Manager can take a break or deal with unexpected hiccups without distraction.

The role could be split into two:

### **Office Administration Manager and Volunteer Co-ordinator**

## ISSUES OF CONCERN

A new member joined us this month - welcome to Martin.

Subjects have been varied, as usual. Gina Rinehart, Australia's richest person, wrote a piece in the Australian Resources & Investment magazine outlining her vision for northern Australia as a free trade zone. As well as free trade she sees this zone as free of taxation and populated by plenty of temporary labour from overseas. Her arguments are:

(1) That new taxes from the federal Labour government are killing investment in mining forcing companies offshore and slowing down the mining boom.

(2) To encourage Australians to move north we need to tax them less, cut payroll and company tax, and stamp duty. Failing that we should offer very poor people in neighbouring Asian countries the opportunity of guest labour work in Australia.

Her second point seems to ignore that incentives to work in mines are already extremely generous - the average wage in mining is \$149,000 and tradesmen can often earn more.

An interesting pie chart in Spiegel Online revealed that the world's largest weapons exporters are USA - 34.6%, Russia 24.2% and Germany 9.4%. Even more interesting was that the largest importers of German weapons were Greece and Turkey followed by South Africa, South Korea, Australia and Spain.

Two researchers from Curtin University suggest that population growth and sustainability might be complementary. Their proposal is that population growth plus the consequent economic growth might lead to the creation of low-carbon technologies and more efficient infrastructure. The question is not "how many people are sustainable?" but "how can any number of people live more sustainably?"

Protests against coal seam gas mining are increasing with a rally occurring in the Illawarra on October 16th which called for a moratorium on and a Royal Commission into the coal seam gas industry. With Sydney's radio shock jock, Alan Jones stating his opposition to CSG mining, the protesters have a powerful spokesman.

Qantas CEO, Alan Joyce clearly wants to move Qantas operations offshore. One worry is that maintenance manuals are written in English but the manuals from the US are written in American English. The different types of English may be interpreted differently - could lead to problems.

We were all shocked at the suicide of a 27 year old Sri Lankan refugee and the callous attitude of the Immigration Department towards his requests to be allowed to celebrate a religious festival. The GetUp website has a petition which can be signed by anyone who wants to try and stop these tragic events happening.

## CHRISTMAS TREE GIVING

A Christmas tree will be set up at our December meeting and we ask that you bring a gift for those less fortunate than ourselves. This year the Committee has elected to support the local Uniting Church Charity. We have been advised by them that the best way in which we can contribute to a Christmas Appeal is to place money in an envelope rather than give goods. Members are asked to contribute whatever they can afford to support this group that gives Christmas charity and cheer to those in need, irrespective of the denomination or creed.

## MOVIES OF MERIT

This course continues to be well supported, but a number of attendees have left due to illness or conflicts with other courses. We now have a smaller but very dedicated group of around 20 and we're delighted that David Stretch has continued to allow us to attend his theatre despite closing it on Mondays and Tuesdays to the general public.

Since the September newsletter, we have seen nine films, all chosen for their high ratings by international and local reviewers and their ability to stimulate the audience. It's not easy to look at a film simultaneously as a viewer and as an analyst, but we are succeeding!

The titles shown (with our respective approval ratings in brackets) are *Battleship Potemkin* (81.8%), *Forbidden Games* (65.6%), *La Strada* (66.8%), *Mephisto* (81.3%), *It Happened One Night* (75.7%), *Aguirre, the Wrath of God* (67.2%), *The Road Home* (78.9%), *The Battle of Algiers* (81.3%) and *Spring, Summer, Autumn, Winter...and Spring* (84.8%).

The last showing this year will be on **December 5<sup>th</sup>**, and we're delighted to announce that this course will run in 2012, starting in January. More information will be given in the December newsletter.

## MUSIC APPRECIATION – 3/8/11

Today there were just 2 composers, Mozart (1756 - 1791) and Mendelssohn (1809 - 1847). We started with Mozart's symphony No 41 in C, K551, known as the Jupiter Symphony. This was the last of a final group of 3 symphonies that Mozart wrote in 4 weeks during the summer of 1788. The symphony is in 4 movements, about 37 minutes in length, and a pleasure to listen to. The next was Mendelssohn's Wedding March from 'A Midsummer Nights Dream'. Unlike church weddings, we heard the complete march. The rest of the program was all Mendelssohn, which included the next work, a Sonata for violin and piano in F Minor opus 4. This remarkable work was written when he was 14 years old. After coffee break we heard The Overture to a Midsummer Nights Dream. He wrote this 3 years later. Discussing the work with Bruce it was decided the complete Work would be played at the **November** meeting. It is about 44 minutes in length and you do wonder how a 17 year old could write such a complex piece of music. The morning concluded with the Symphony No 4, known as 'The Italian'. Mendelssohn at this stage was 24 and had an international reputation as a pianist, conductor and composer. The 'Italian' though listed as his 4th symphony is actually his 16th. He did not consider the other 12 worth numbering. This was a fine conclusion to the morning's music and much more can be written about Mendelssohn.

Today's similar preoccupations are a direct descendant of the idea of "correct spelling" invented by the pedants and pedagogues of the 16<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup> centuries. Is language a reflection of society? Where does a 'native' word and a 'foreign' adopted word clash in spelling, in pronunciation and eventually in meaning. Are there standards? If so, who sets them? - Perhaps journalists, poets, (Shakespeare?), philologists (S.Johnson?). --- Following discussion of these pertinent questions, we will look at why language changes and why words change in meanings, and how some dictionaries reflect a hierarchy of meaning.
