

Ireland in a nutshell



When the rain is warm, it is summer in Ireland!

The climate of Ireland can be summed up as being mild, moist and changeable with abundant rainfall and a lack of temperature extremes. It is defined as a temperate oceanic climate. The country generally receives warm summers and mild winters, and is considerably warmer than other areas on its latitude. This is due to the fact that it lies on the Atlantic Ocean, and as a result is warmed by the Gulf Stream all year.

The Leprechaun - an Irish legend

Irish mythology is full of good and evil spirits and characters. There is an in-between type of beings that are neither all good nor all bad. They are balanced between the two, sometimes kind and generous, and sometimes petty and mean.



One such being is the Leprechaun. Small in size, a little old wrinkled face, he is a well-known mischief-making figure. According to the legend, this elfin shoemaker has a pot of gold hidden somewhere such as at the end of a rainbow, and he must give up his treasure to the one who catches him. You have to step lively and think quickly to capture a leprechaun's gold though, because this sly little fellow will fool you into looking away for an instant while he escapes into the forest.

A story from the past

Grace O'Malley - The Irish Queen of Pirates

Her grand- and great-grandchildren claimed they descended from a queen, the Queen of Pirates. When Grace O'Malley's father died, she inherited his ship. She began using it in legal trade. But though no one knows how it happened, she turned to piracy, leading a crew of 200 in robberies of ships all around the west coast of Ireland.

In 1576, she was known as a notorious woman. Twice she was captured and imprisoned by the British. Then, in 1593, she had a personal interview with Elisabeth I, where Grace secured the release of her son and brother from prison, and received a pardon in exchange for a promise to help guard against Spanish Armada ships off the coast of Ireland.

Fitzgerald's farmhouse and Equestrian centre welcomes not only horse lovers in Abbeyfeale, a place in the southwest of Ireland where you can both learn to ride and speak English.

The Fitzgeralds, an Irish family, decided to sell their cattle in the 1990s and use the stables for horses instead. They built fences and ditches on the hills for cross-country riding and a sand arena for riding lessons. And they opened their house to their guests - young people from all over Europe. Riders can learn about old Irish horse breeds like the Irish Cob or Tinker Horse which is extremely patient, well-mannered and suitable for children and novices. Or the Irish Hunter - with a great personality, incredible jumping ability and excellent movement. The beautiful Connemara Pony can be ridden by both children and adults. It is a sturdy, sure-footed pony, well-groomed and unspoilt.



Hurling - a popular sport on the Green Island

Hurling is similar to hockey, in that it is played with a small ball and a curved wooden stick. It is Europe's oldest field game. Celtic tribes used to play it after they had settled on the island.

The pitch is about 137 m long and 82 m wide. The goalposts are the same shape as on a rugby pitch with the crossbar a bit lower. You may hit the ball on the ground or in the air. Each team consists of 15 players and a maximum of 3 substitutes. By the way, the rules can be compared to rugby.

Did you know?

The word 'quiz' was allegedly invented in the 1830s by a Dublin theatre owner, who made a bet he could make a nonsense word known throughout the city in just 48 hours. Legend says that he gave his employees cards with the word quiz written on them and told them to write it on walls all over the city. Later, it got the definition 'to question'.

An odd Irish birthday tradition ...

... is to hold the birthday child upside down and give their head a few gentle 'bumps' on the floor for good luck. The number of bumps corresponds to the child's age plus one.


