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Though these caves are accessible from a surface entrance, I used them as the temporary base for a small group of normally-Underdark-dwelling Kua-Toa. They had been sent to the surface for various nefarious purposes, and sought shelter in these caves when the harsh light of day became too much for them. The PCs tracked them here and disposed of them, finding an important clue to their purpose on the surface in and among the detritus of the lair.


A.

The entrance to the caverns rises sharply before widening out. The smaller chamber on the left contained the remains of the Kua-Toa's kills, along with whatever goods they may have had on their possession.

The narrow section to the right contains a 10' diameter chimney through the ground that descends 15' before opening in to the flooded chamber below.

B.

This cavern is flooded from floor to ceiling, apart from the north section where both the roof and floor rise up and give way to a higher passage. The cavern is 20' tall at its lowest point beneath the chimney, rising to 30' at the north end.



A giant octopus dwells here; it is part of a breeding pair, and will defend its territory.


C.

The passage dips again partway up, where it is flooded to around 3' deep. A small pod of octopuses – the offspring of the giant pair – rests here. They will attack if disturbed.


At the northwest end of the passage there is another chimney that rises 20' up through the ceiling. This one is narrower than the first, with a diameter of roughly 5'.


D.

The main chamber, where the bulk of the Kua-Toa dwell. The other giant octopus is also here; it is the pet of the Kua-Toa leader, and stays with him as much as it can, even on land.
