# Praying 'Thy Kingdom Come'

Did you go and explore the Prayer Stations that Jacqui and Lizzie put together in St. James' and St. Thomas à Becket churches between Ascension Day and Pentecost? There were about ten in all, offering a wide range of creativity and experience. I liked the one where you could write some things

you've done wrong on a laminated person & then put it in a bowl of water and watch you sins wash away. Watching them go made it easier for me to understand how God really does wipe us clean when we ask him to. I also enjoyed colouring in countries on a world map as I prayed for them. We, and other churches, even took a few Prayer Stations over to the Deanery Prayer Walk Evening Celebration so others could enjoy them too.

Quite a few people seem to have visited our churches while the Prayer Stations were up and we know that Years 3-6 at St. James' School enjoyed their visit. Jacqui had an interesting discussion with some of them about what prayer is and I think we managed to stretch their understanding of how, where and why we might want to pray.

Of course, during Thy Kingdom Come we not only kept the churches open for private prayer but we also organized the 24-hour prayer time, with people praying both in St. James' and at home. It was exciting to see such good numbers joining in.

A small band of families gathered to kick us off at 10am on the Saturday and another group assembled in the evening to 'Seek and Soak', using some music to worship God, enjoy being in his presence and lead them into prayer.

Jacqui and I both chose to miss one of these gatherings to pray even though we both think they're really important. The reason? Like many of us, we've been 'Praying for 5', using one of the book marks as a prompt. People on our lists invited us to spend time with them and we felt that it was important to do that. If we're committed to praying, we need to be willing to give our time too.

I thought I might find an hour of unstructured prayer (and reasonably late at night!) quite a challenge. I was pleasantly surprise by how quickly the time went. I used a variety of ways to pray – using music and silence to explore being in God's presence, praying out loud and quietly, using set prayers and my own spontaneous words, praying alone and praying with another person, standing and sitting (and other postures are available too) and walking around the church, seeking inspiration from what I saw around me or with my eyes shut.

I'd love us to do something similar again. I think exploring new and different ways to pray and engage with God is helpful.

How do you like to pray? Do you have any practices that work for you that might be worth sharing?

### Emsworth Museum

#### **Emsworth's Forgotten Insurrection**

Emsworth's Insurrection is the next temporary exhibition in Emsworth Museum starting on 12<sup>th</sup> July.


Emsworth Museum focuses on historical events in Emsworth and the surrounding area. However, just occasionally, Emsworth finds itself at the centre of national or international events. (D-Day is one such example.)

#### Emsworth Museum cont.

In November 1830, insurrection swept across southern England with a campaign aimed at destroying threshing machines. These upheavals became known as the Swing Riots, named after the pseudonym of the writer of letters threatening farmers with the destruction of their threshing machines. There were three areas where the impact was greatest – East Kent, North Hampshire, – and Emsworth!

This exhibition sets out the causes of the revolt in and around Emsworth; the authorities' response and the penalties imposed on those who were caught. The ringleaders were transported to Tasmania for 7 years.

Remarkably, the underlying causes of the social unrest in 1830 are similar to social issues today – low wages; unintended consequences of legislation; and climate change. One can understand the despair and frustration of the young men who were involved in the riots. They had nothing to lose as they hurled themselves against an unsympathetic establishment.

### ARE WE REVIVAL READY?

#### Here is some advice from Scripture Union



God is on the move across the land, so be aware and have your eyes open for the seekers and the hungry.

If you haven't had a child or young person turn up at your church yet, that doesn't mean you won't! And so it is great to be prepared and to think through, as a church, how you would welcome and follow up with any young 'turner-uppers'.

#### A few abbreviated tips for churches to ponder

- 1. **Prayer**. As a church, pray together and pray individually, involving everyone from the youngest to the oldest. Pray that you would be open and welcoming to those who are walking through the doors of the church.
- 2. **Safeguarding**. Ensure that your whole church are aware of what is expected of them around children and young people, particularly if someone under 18 turns up without their parent or guardian.
- 3. **Welcome**. Ensure that the welcome is as much for children and young people as it is for adults, whether they arrive as a family, unaccompanied or with a group of friends. You could consider having a welcome pack with appropriate activities and treats in for during and after the service.
- 4. **Bibles**. Buy children's/youth/young adult's Bibles (or copies of Mark's Gospel) to give out to those who might not have one. Consider also including an indication of what to read, or a reading plan, to help them explore God's Word effectively.
- 5. **Visibility**. Setting up a QR code on your notice board linking to your website is a great way of helping others to connect with you.

## **News from our Churchwardens**

#### From St. James' ... Bob Warnock



I was honoured to be elected as Churchwarden for St. James' at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting held on 30 April 2025.

On behalf of the Parish, I would like to extend our sincere thanks to Gill Andrews, our outgoing Churchwarden. Gill has served with great dedication, leading the restoration of the west elevation and managing numerous projects to ensure our church remains a well-maintained, safe and welcoming space for everyone. I am especially grateful for her support and guidance during the handover period, which has helped ensure a smooth transition.

We are also very thankful to Dave Jupp, who has stepped down as Deputy Churchwarden. Dave's steadfast support, along with that of

Rosemary, continues to be much appreciated by the whole church community.

As a result, we are currently looking for a new Deputy Churchwarden. If you are interested in joining the St. James' Churchwarden team, Chris Barrett (the other Deputy Churchwarden) and I would be very happy to speak with you about the role. Please don't hesitate to get in touch - we would welcome the opportunity to explore this with you.

By way of introduction: my wife, Catherine, and I moved to Emsworth in August 2021, following my retirement as Superintendent of Hampstead Heath, after more than 30 years managing open spaces with the City of London Corporation. We previously lived in tied accommodation in Hampstead and worshipped at All Souls, Langham Place.

We received a very warm welcome at St. James' and soon became involved in the life of the church. We joined a home group, and I later became part of the Parish Hall team. Over the past three years at the Parish Hall, we've installed new noticeboards, worked on energy efficiency improvements and more recently, on projects to improve accessibility and storage - just completing building a new shed for the Ark Toddler Group's toys and equipment.

Catherine, a retired teacher, was elected as a Foundation Governor at St. James' Primary School in May 2022, and became Chair of Governors in September that same year. Catherine also volunteers in school to support children with their learning.

# A View from the 'Octag' - Lee Abbey

I've arrived! I've come back home! I was last here at this very special place, Lee Abbey in north Devon, about 25 years ago, but even so it still feels familiar. I've come on a silent retreat, with the expectation of meeting with God in a profound way. He's never let me down in the past, and He won't now!

Let me tell you what you can expect if you choose to visit this lovely place. A walk through the building from Reception and down the main stairs (there is also a lift) will bring you into the Octagonal Lounge, or the 'Octagonal sait's called by Community and those 'in the know'. This is where the main teaching and worship sessions are held, and it's like the hub of Lee Abbey. Looking westward through the windows the field slopes away down to the river and then on to Lee Abbey's own rock-strewn beach. To the left the hills rise up to the great plateau of Exmoor, and to the right wooded walks lead to the cliff top and a wide view over the Bristol Channel to South Wales. East, and behind Lee Abbey, is the Valley of the Rocks, and beyond that are the towns of Lynton and Lynmouth. This place is secluded, shielded and protected by the landscape from the world outside, and beyond. God, who has travelled with you on your journey here, both physically and spiritually, is also here waiting to welcome you, to wrap in His embrace.

But Lee Abbey is so much more than just amazing scenery. This is a place soaked in prayer, and the presence of God is tangible. People are drawn here from over the world - coming as guests on silent retreats, or for times of teaching, for weekends of refreshment, or for youth camps and family holidays in the summer.

This is also where the Community lives - guests are invited to share their home for the duration of their stay. Young people from all over the world come to serve - in the kitchen, looking after the bedrooms and communal areas, managing the estate, and leading worship. They come for just a few months up to several years. Their love of the Lord, and serving Him through serving their guests, is self-evident.

Guest speakers provide the teaching, with a variety of morning and evening sessions. Around this there is plenty of time to relax in the lounge areas or the library, or you can explore the footpaths around the 288-acre estate.

You will surely come with your 'baggage' of cares and anxieties, hoping to relax and take time out. And this is a place to let go, rest in God's love for you, and encounter Him afresh – for you surely will. There's time to breathe, to unwind, to just 'be'. Time to allow God to be who He knows you need Him to be in this moment of your life. Time to receive from Him and just let Him love you. Your days here, indeed your very selves, will be permeated by God as He gives Himself to you.

This is a place where prayer is easy, and God's voice is unmistakable. It's a place to grow without even realising it. It's a place of non-effort. It's a place where Jesus says to us, just as He did to His disciples, 'Come with Me by yourselves to a quiet place and get some rest' (Mk 6:31). He knows about your busy and fragmented lives, and your longings for His peace, and He will meet you here.

Some members of our Parish are going in October to spend a few days around the theme of 'A Deeper Knowing of God'. The resumé from Lee Abbey's brochure and website says 'For the Apostle Paul, a desire for a deeper knowledge of God and the conviction of its necessity flows through all of his words, actions, and longings for others. Let's journey together through his prayers to see what we can learn from him about the priority of prayer, and the priorities in prayer for those who long to grow in closeness and fellowship with God.'

If that's your desire why not consider joining them for an unforgettable experience? This is **Luke Brennan**. Luke will be working in Bunia, Eastern DRC (Democratic Republic of the Congo), an area torn by conflict. Luke writes:

"In eastern DR Congo, armed conflict has taken countless lives, forced people from their homes, leaving people grieving and traumatised. This legacy of trauma often drives people to further violence, leading to cycles of conflict that seem impossible to break. CMS and CMS Africa long to build a movement committed to seeking peace, justice and the transformation of communities through the power of God.

I will be part of a community of local mission leaders, CMS mission partners and other regional

partners, working to bring peace through healing divisions, addressing trauma and combatting poverty. My focus will be on discipling young people who have grown up amid armed conflict.

By starting with young people, we challenge deep-rooted divisions that persist through generations. I will train youth leaders and work with young people directly so they can grow spiritually and learn a vocation.

I first discovered a passion for working with young people when I visited Ghana aged 18, serving in a school and orphanage. After teaching in the UK, I worked with schools and charities in West Africa. While in Sierra Leone, I met Jesus and made the decision to follow him. Back in the UK, I discerned God's call to return to Africa to serve him."

# Hope into Action update

Enabling churches to house the homeless

As I reflect on the past 6 months in our two Hope into Action (HiA) houses, providing for those who would otherwise be homeless, it seems that things have been relatively steady. We still have the same four tenants, one with a 3-year-old daughter. However, much has been going on behind the scenes with weekly visits to the tenants from their HiA Empowerment Worker and our own befrienders. That stability is helping them to improve their relationships with their families, a key feature in avoiding homelessness.

One has been helping out at Tuppenny Barn and another sometimes helps with our food bank deliveries. The food bank at nearby One Church has been very generous to our tenants when needed. A member of our team is helping a tenant to learn English as she now has some time for herself because her daughter is going to nursery. With the fine Spring that we have enjoyed, the befrienders have worked with the tenants to keep the gardens under control.

Four of our church team went to the HiA national conference in Peterborough in March. HiA is a Christian charity and the love of Jesus for the marginalised in our society is at the centre of all that that they do. Some 400 attend this event, and it is the biggest gathering for a homeless charity in the UK. There we heard from Jon Kuhrt, the CEO, and learnt more about the challenges that are faced and also the many success stories. One former tenant, who arrived in this country with nothing, is now living independently and running a cleaning business that employs over 30 people. The highlight of the conference was the tenant awards where, often for the first time in their lives, tenants are recognised for doing something well or improving an aspect of their lives. Please pray that through the stability of a home and the love and support that they receive, all those supported by HiA, and especially our own tenants, will be able to move towards living independently in the future. Please also pray for the relationship between the tenants in each house.

A recent highlight here was a visit that we organised to Arundel Castle. Not a cheap day out, but it is hard to put a value on the relationships that a day like this forms and strengthens. We are also planning to run a fundraising event with a speaker from the charity on Saturday 18<sup>th</sup> October in the Parish Hall starting at 5pm. Please keep a lookout for this in the pewsheet and parish email. We remain grateful to the Trinity Trust for its on-going financial support.

### Does God answer prayer?

**Barbara Hammond** came across this during her 'turning out' time. She used it years ago when teaching RE to teenagers. She writes "It echoes the way God works among us. He does not wave a magic wand but he does put thoughts in our heads. So always consider thoughts that bubble up and consider first 'Is this a good thought?'. If it is, take one 'o' out of 'good' and ask 'Is it a God thought?'. If it is, then either go for it, put it off until tomorrow, or ignore it. The choice is ours."

#### SO DOES GOD ANSWER PRAYER?

If what you pray for is not right, and you're not right, and the time is not right, God answers your prayer by saying NO.

If what you pray for is right, and the time is right, but you're not right, God answers your prayer by saying GROW.

If what you pray for is right, and you're right, but the time is not right, God answers your prayer by saying SLOW.

But if what you pray for is right, and the time is right, and you're right, God answers your prayer by saying GO.

### **Gifts and Senses**

As Christians, we are all members of the Body of Christ, so we are all essential and of great value, with different strengths.

Where do we each fit in? I've been thinking of us as different sense receptors: you know, in the ears, eyes, mouth, nose and hands.

Of course the Holy Spirit in each of us has all the gifts, and at any moment could ask any one of us to move out of our comfort zone and act in a specific way.

However, within our comfort zones, we often seem to have one predominant gift.

Firstly we tend to be most aware of those who are the voices, speaking God's word and teaching; reading aloud, praying or singing in church. Yet equally important are the ears, listening to people and also to the Lord, receiving from him words of knowledge or prophetic insights to build up the body.

And what about those vital hands and feet caring practically for people, driving them to appointments, doing their shopping, providing refreshments, writing letters and articles, playing the music, cleaning and decorating the church, laying on hands for healing ......

Furthermore, maybe there are others that we don't think about so much. Who are the noses, sensing the spiritual atmosphere and ready to give warning if something 'doesn't smell right'?

Or the eyes, looking ahead, immersing themselves in the scriptures and keeping up to date with current events, like the men of Issachar who 'understood the times and knew what Israel should do'. (1 Chronicles 12:32)

Then, last but not least, I pray that we will all continue to 'taste and see that the Lord is good' and encourage others to do the same. (Psalm 34:8)

And all of this is to 'equip his people for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up until we all reach unity in the faith and in the knowledge of the Son of God and become mature, attaining to the whole measure of the fullness of Christ.' (*Ephesians 4:12-13*)

#### Answering the Editor's Questions from last month

While the Nicaean celebrations continue around the world and in Emsworth, this article will address the Editor's three questions about the Emperor Constantine's deathbed baptism, his mother St. Helena, and the Codex Sinaiticus. These were all mentioned in my previous article with a hint that there was more to tell about them and the editor picked up on these references.

No-one is really sure why **Constantine delayed his baptism** until he was dying. One suggestion is that there was a short-lived heresy at the time that believed that forgiveness at Baptism could not be repeated so, in order to die blameless and go straight to heaven, it was better to delay one's baptism. – And Constantine knew when he began to favour Christianity that he still had

plenty of fighting and killing to do in his future.

Constantine's Mother, the concubine Helena was raised to the dizzy heights of First Lady in the Empire when her son Constantine became Emperor. She certainly favoured the Christian faith, and used her position to great effect. She went travelling to Palestine, and in the dereliction of Jerusalem searched for the places where Christ had been. She found the hill outside the city walls where Jesus had been crucified, and also the cave in the nearby garden where he had been buried. She used her power, influence, and wealth to build the huge Church of the Holy Sepulchre over both the hill and the cave. Helena is also credited with finding three ancient crosses

nearby and identifying the one on which Jesus died. (Fragments of the 'Holy Rood' were shared around the world, as in the royal palace of Edinburgh and Holy Cross Abbey near Tipperary in Ireland.) Helena then travelled southwards to Bethlehem and built another huge Church, - of the Nativity, - over the cave which tradition claimed was the place where Jesus was born. Both these Churches are still famous places for pilgrims to visit (when there is no war in the area). Icons of Constantine and Saint Helena can be seen all over the Middle East, and especially in Cyprus.

And the third question -

The **Codex Sinaiticus** was described in 1859 as 'the most precious biblical treasure in existence' and is now on show in the British Library. It is now believed to be one of the 50 copies of the Christian scriptures written by order of the Emperor Constantine, but no-one even knew of its existence until the German Count von Tischendorf went treasure-seeking in 1864. He was visiting the Russian Orthodox Monastery of St. Catherine on the slopes of Mount Sinai, where monks in the library had found a collection of beautifully written Greek texts of the Scriptures. In 1845, he was given 43 sheaves to study in Leipzig (where they are now in the University Library). When he returned there in 1859, the monks were suspicious, but allowed Von Tischendorf to 'borrow' the text and take it to St. Petersburg to show the Tsar (Head of the Russian Church), and prepare it

for publication. But the Tsar kept it! Many years later, in 1923, when the atheist Soviet Government was bankrupt, the British Government stepped in and bought the text for £100,000. It is now available for all to see, and scholars to study.

Time for reflecting comes to mind,


Time for prayer, unwinds,
