A starting note D key

2013 - we will sing the verses that are boxed: 1, 4, 5, 6, 10. Shout "Wassail!" after song end.

We sung verses 1, 4 and 6 in 2012 - but there are many more (plus some not shown here). Harmonies on last line of each verse.

The old custom of wassail singing still survives in parts of England, though it is fast dying out. Indeed, wassailing songs are among the most popular of the secular holiday songs of Christmas. However, it is in fact a post-Christmas tradition, being performed on January 5, ie the eve of Epiphany. Of Saxon origin, the word "wassail" (accent on the last syllable) means "be of good health" from the Anglo-Saxon "wes" = be, and "hal" = whole or hale. The bowl "made of the white maple tree" refers to the period when all common domestic vessels were made of wood. In early times, there was an ecclesiastical edict against the use of wooden vessels for the Holy Communion.

The Wassail Song is among the best known of the traditional wassail songs, and was well-known throughout England by the mid-19th century although its roots go back even further. The tradition of wassailers going door-to-door, singing and drinking to the health of those whom they visit, goes back to pre-Christian fertility rites where the villagers went through orchards at midwinter singing and shouting loudly to drive out evil spirits, and pouring cider on the roots of trees to encourage fertility.
