Old Self, New Self Colossians 3:1-17

I. Introduction

II. Motivate Yourself! (1-4)

- A. Paul begins, as per his normal routine, by explaining the motivation for why Christians ought to behave or not behave in certain ways.
 - 1. He keys us in to the "eschatological reality" (i.e. the reality of Jesus' return) as the motivation for us to do what he is about to instruct.
- B. This reality manifests itself in three ways that bring holistic change to our lives:
 - 1. We have been raised with Christ to new life (2nd Cor. 5:17)
 - 2. Jesus has killed who we used to be, and we are delivered from the power of sin (Gal. 2:20; Rom. 6).
 - 3. Jesus is coming again, and we will be glorified with Him!
- C. The second of these three truths is especially important, because often we behave as if sinning is an eventuality, but it isn't. (Rom. 6:14, 17-18)
 - 1. Sin has NO POWER over you, except the power that you give it!
 - 2. We will sin, because we have not been delivered from the presence of sin, but it has no dominion over us!
- D. Our motivation to avoid sin and pursue righteousness is found in Jesus' return.

III. Put off the Old Self (5-11)

- A. Paul opens this passage with a call for us to put to death the things that belong to the old, sinful self.
- B. His list of sins here encompasses the three big sectors of the human life:
 - 1. Sexuality
 - 2. Desires
 - 3. Speech
- C. Paul lumps all of these sins together because they all necessarily involve idolatry, placing something else apart from God on the throne.
 - 1. Paul makes it clear that God punishes sin and His wrath comes on people who live this way, but we don't have to anymore!
- D. Then Paul ends with one sin that doesn't fit in these categories: bigotry.
- E. The point is clear, all people, regardless of how they sin, are welcome if they put that sin off.

IV. Put on the New Self (12-17)

- A. There's a richness in the way Paul now describes the people we can be in Christ!
- B. Jesus is transforming us into a people who are selfless and put the needs of other before our own.
 - 1. Sin is idolatry and puts me on the throne, but when I surrender to Jesus, he comes on the throne and I become less and less concerned about myself and more and more concerned about others.
- C. This works not only on an individual level, but on a corporate level as well!
 - 1. We begin to interact differently with one another because the Spirit unites us all.

- D. We harness the power of praise and worship to help one another and offer ourselves to God!
- E. The application: Do everything with an eye to His glory (John Calvin).
- F. So, what do you need to put off and put on this week?
