Domogan Orders Immediate Demolition of Illegal Structures Inside Forbes Park

BAGUIO CITY - Mayor Mauricio Domogan has ordered the immediate demolition of illegal structures inside the controversial Forbes Park Reservation here.

This as reports reached his office of on-going massive constructions inside the forest reserve without the necessary Building Permit in Violation of Section 301 of the National Building Code or Presidential Decree No. 1096.

As per investigation of the Public Order and Safety Division (POSD) of the Mayor's Office, there are at least six newly constructed shanties measuring 5 meters by 4 meters made of light materials and on-going fencing in some parts of the area.

The shanties are not covered by any requisite building and fencing permits.

Aside from the POSD report, a letter request for investigation on alleged rampant squatting and selling of public lands was also received by the city government thru the City Buildings and Architecture Office (CBAO) from barangay officials and residents in the

On-site inspection and investigation by the CBAO revealed a one story building made of concrete, cement, steel and other mate-Cont. on page 11

DepED-CAR all set for Brigada Eskwela , Ready for School Opening

BAGUIO CITY – The Department of Education -Cordillera Administrative Region (DepEd-CAR) is set to launch Brigada Eskwela for school year 2014-2015 on May 19-24.

Regional director Ellen Donato, DepEd said that Brigada Eskwela also known as National Schools Maintenance Week, is a school maintenance program enjoining all education stakeholders to contribute their time, effort and resources in ensuring that public school facilities are ready for the upcoming school opening which will be on June 2, 2014.

Now on its 11th year, the theme "Making our Schools Safer for our Children", focuses on making schools disaster-ready, and on developing disaster-resilient school communities, Donato said.

"In the region, we want to reach out to the farthest division so the launching will be held on May 19 in Kabugao, Apayao, and the closing program will be on May 26 also in Kabugao, Apayao.

Donato informed that since the inception of the K to 12, for the whole month of May there is a full blast of training of all teachers in grades 3 and 9 in time for the opening of classes this coming June 2.

She said that generally, all public schools will formally open on June 2. However, in as much as the Constitution provides that opening of classes can happen prior to August 31, some private schools have opted to open after June 2.

Small World Christian School Foundation will open in July, Saint Louis University across all levels will be opening in August.

BAGUIO CITY – As expected, a huge crowd turned up to witness the funeral of the late Vice Mayor Daniel Farinas last Saturday at the Baguio Memorial Cemetery demonstrating an outpouring of grief and love for the late legislative stalwart who succumbed to an illness last May 4 at the age of 61.

For the last time last Saturday morning, the vice mayor left the session hall of the city council ending 23 years of public service as city councilor and vice mayor that together with his lifetime work as a teacher, had endeared him to thousands who came for the six-night vigil.

Billog's Immediate Oath Necessary says

Mayor BAGUIO CITY – the helms of power in this mountain resort has undergone

an unforeseen change with the untimely demise of Vice Mayor Daniel Farinas early morning of Sunday (May 4) here.

Top City Councillor Edison Billog has taken his Oath of Office as the city's new Vice Mayor in accordance with law.

City Mayor Mauricio Domogan who personally administered his Oath Monday afternoon said, 'he personally called on Billog to take his Oath for the sake of Co-Terminus employees working at the City Council.'

'Weather he likes it or not, he has to take his Oath immediately so the affected employees can continue to work in order not to hamper the delivery of public service,' he said.

Domogan explained, 'if the successor does not take his Oath immediately, services of co-terminus employees will have a gap leading to the disruption of functions in the Sangunian Panglungsod.'

Meantime, the untimely death of Farinas created a 'permanent vacancy' in the Office of the Vice Mayor thus Section 44 of the Local Government Code on succession came in to play where the highest ranking Sangunian Member has to fill the position.

Furthermore, subsequent vacancies in the said office shall be filled automatically by other Sangunian members according to their ranking.

However, it is still unclear on who will be the 12th City Councillor for the city as the rules on automatic succession do not apply.

Domogan said, "the Local Government Code provides that a permanent vacancy in the Sangunian Panglungsod in the case of a highly urbanized city like Baguio shall be filled by appointment by the President, through the Executive Secretary.'

Second option provided by the Code states only the nominee of the political party under which the Sangunian member concerned had been elected and whose elevation to the position next higher in rank created the last vacancy in the Sangunian shall be appointed.

The appointee shall come from the same political party as that of the Sangunian member who caused the vacancy and shall serve the unexpired term of the vacant position.

Domogan said, 'hopes on the process of choosing the 12th councillor should be thoroughly discussed taking into consideration the situation of the family of the late Vice Mayor.'

Domogan also said, 'Billog assured him of support towards the implementation of programs of the city for the benefit of its residents.' /paul rillorta

Former Police Officer, Farmer's Wife Plea for Treatment Support

The wife of an ailing police officer in La Trinidad, Benguet and the daughter of a farm-hand from Bauko, Mt. Province went on a simultaneous appeal for help last week, their common plea prompted by the need to maintain and sustain the life-time treatment of their kin afflicted with kidney failure.

As misery, indeed, needs company, they came with two other women, relatives of two other renal patients - an uncle and his nephew – who were featured in this page months back, and whose own struggles to survive will be retold next week.

The police officer, Jerry Taynan, 49, a native of Km. 47, Atok, Bengue, served from 1992 until his ailment forced him to quit last March while he was assigned to the La Trinidad office.

"Kasla kadagiti kaaduan nga agpapa-agas gapu iti saan nga sakit ti kidney, marigatan unay ni lakay ko nga mangmintenar iti tallo nga dialysis ni lakay ko kada maysa a domingo no awan mangtulong kaniami," (Like many being treated for kidney failure, my husband is finding it difficult to maintain three times a week dialysis every week without support from donors) Taynan's wife, Angelin (nee Layugan of Bulanao, Tabuk, Kalinga) said.

"Isu nga nagkuyog kami kenni Angelin nga umay agpatulong babaen iti media," (That's why we and Angeline came to seek help trough media) added Annie Cadio, whose mother, 63-year old Manuela Battateng, is on a twice-a-week hemodialysis schedule for kidney failure.

Annie said her mother, originally from Atok, Benguet, moved to Boga, Monamon Sur, Bauko, Mt. Province when she married farmer Pacito Battateng. Manuela, who was blessed with 11 children, began dialysis treatment in October, 2012 after she was diagnosed for stage 5 kidney disease.

Manuela, who has to transfer to a rented room at FC-292 Central Balili, La Trinidad to be nearer the dialysis room, has her treatments on the 11 a.m. shift on Monday and Thursday at the Baguio General Hospital and Medical Center.

Taynan is also at the BGHMC treatment room every 3:00 p.m.every Monday and at 6:00 a.m. on Wednesday and Saturday. He and Angelin, together with their son Jetraj, 5, stay at LA 128, Lubas, La Trinidad.

In December, 2011, a month before Jerry's illness was diagnosed, Angelin went to work as a domestic in Cyprus to augment her husband's earnings as a police officer and to give their son a better future.

"I couldn't concentrate on my work when I learned of his condition and decided to come home in September, 2012," she recalled.

In a social case study report, Ruby Docao, municipal social welfare and development officer Ruby Docao fo Bauko noted that Manula "came from an indigent family, the reason why she was depirsed of education. She was exposed to hard labor at an early age to (be able to) help her parents until she reached adulthood and married. She used to work as a farmer and plain housewife until she was diagnosed with her present health condition."

Manuela's husband, Pacito, was diagnosed for brain tumor in 2001. His treatment cost the family their fortune. He recovered but can no longer work.

City Sets Procedure in **Cutting Trees at Busol** Watershed; Inventory of Dead Trees Conducted

BAGUIO CITY - All requests from informal settlers to cut trees at the Busol watershed will be denied outright.

Mayor Mauricio Domogan stressed this during the meeting of the Busol Forest Reservation Task Force last April 1 for the firming up of the procedures in the processing of tree cutting permits within the watershed.

Task force members including Baguio Regreening Movement chair Erdolfo Balajadia and city environment and natural resources officer (CENRO) Edgardo Flor agreed that all applications coming from the illegal occupants of the watershed for the cutting of trees, whether dead or alive, will be denied immediately at the city's end and will not be endorsed to the CENRO Baguio.

Balajadia said this is necessary to deny the squatters the opportunity to cut the trees and use the wood to build new structures or expand their constructions in the area.

He said there were reports that the squatters intentionally kill the trees for their own purposes adding that these incidents should also be investigated and the culprits be prosecuted.

The mayor said the task force will discuss how it can intensify the monitoring and guarding of the watersheds to prevent said incidents.

He ordered an inventory of the dead trees within the watershed for the city to determine if these are afflicted with a disease that can infect others and to facilitate their cutting and disposal.

"We need to inspect them so we will know how we can dispose of them and use those that still can be used," the mayor said.

Forestry division chief Beatriz Gajete said that as of May 2, they have covered 75 percent of the area for the inventory mostly the squatterinfested site and they have listed a total of 34 dead trees due to various reasons./A Refuerzo

DILG Starts Performance Assessment of LGUs for SGLG Award

BONTOC, Mountain Province - The Department of Interior and Local Government (DILG) will start this month the conduct of the performance assessment of local government units (LGU) for the Seal of Good Local Governance (SGLG) award pro-

Marites Carino, Local Government Operations Officer V of the DILG provincial office, said the nationwide performance assessment will cover local governments of provinces, cities and munici-

A scaled up version of the previous Seal of Good Housekeeping(SGH) which gives recognition to LGUs for their good performance, the SGLG has six core assessment areas such as good financial housekeeping, disaster preparedness, social protection, environmental management, peace and order and business friendliness and competitive-

To be awarded the SGLG, the LGU has to pass all core assessment areas to be evaluated by DILG in partnership with other national government agencies and some civil society organization, Carino explained.

As SGLG passers or awardees, the LGUs are automatic recipients of the Performance Challenge Fund (PCF) cash incentives from the DILG which are P7 million for provinces, P3M for cities and P1 M for the municipalities.

Other than the PFC monetary benefits, Carino said Seal awardees could also access other national performance-based programs and other program windows of the national government as well as loans being offered by the government financing

Last April, the provincial government received a check worth P7M from DILG regional director John Castaneda as PCF cash incentive for passing the Silver Seal of Good Housekeeping (SGH) Award for 2012.

Seven out of the ten municipalities of the province namely Bauko, Bontoc, Paracelis, Sabangan, Sadanga, Sagada and Tadian were also given their PCF cash incentive of P1 M each as SGH

POEA Calls for Stronger Partnership Against Illegal Recruitment

BAGUIO CITY - With the continuing increasing trend of Cordillerans migrating abroad to work, the Philippine Overseas **Employment Administration** (POEA) calls for a stronger partnership in the campaign against trafficking in person and illegal recruitment.

POEA Cordillera Regional Extension Unit supervisor Delfina Camarillo, in a kapihan forum, reported that from the 18,622 overseas employment documents they processed in 2012, it has increased to 20,933 in 2013.

According to her, illegal recruitment remains a concern with 69 cases filed involving 142 victims. For this year, she also reported that 16 cases involving 73 individuals were also recorded.

With this, she stressed the importance of a continuing and stronger partnership among partner government agencies and with the different local government agencies in the region in addressing problems regarding illegal recruitment cases.

So far, POEA already has a Memorandum of Understanding with the provincial governments of Apayao and Abra, as well as with the municipality of Tuba, Benguet, for a convergence program against illegal recruitment and trafficking in person.

"We are now taking the capability enhancement training in convergence with other agencies like the Department of Labor and Employment and the Overseas Workers Welfare Administration, as well as with local government units through their Public Employment Service Office, in bringing in important information to the people", Camarillo stressed.

The convergence of POEA with LGUs could paved way for a more effective information dissemination to the constituents who wish to work abroad, for them to be aware of the legal terms for application, she added

POEA also provides assistance to illegal recruitment victims in terms of filing a case or endorse them to the National Bureau of Investigation or to the nearest law enforcement agencies for the conduct of an investi-

Camarillo also reminded applicants to take precautionary measures and avoid recruiters who conduct house-to-house or mall recruitments, those who cannot present authorization as recruitment agency; and those who did not get clearance from DOLE or from the local PESO

"All those who want to work abroad must pass through the POEA. It is for your own protection. Work abroad the legal way", Camarillo stressed./CCD/Jam Lardera and Cherish Macaraeg – PIA Interns

Renewing Hopes or Sustainable Forestry in the Philippines

February 1, 2011 marked an exciting change in the dynamics of Philippine environmentalism. On this date, His Excellency Benigno Simeon Aquino III issued an order that is intended to respond to the problem of forest denudation and environmental degradation in our country.

Executive Order (EO) No. 23 could not have come at a better time. We have reached a state where we humbly admit that our environment is sick and needs rehabilitation. We feel alarmingly trapped between floods, landslides, hot weather and dirty air. All these are caused by depriving ourselves of a most potent resource: our trees.

Over the years, extractive activities have resulted in the thinning of our forest cover from 80% in 1910 to 18% in 2010, a century after. Sadly, the denudation of our forests has reached such an alarming level that efforts to reforest may hardly keep up with the rate of destruction.

Hence, in pursuit of protecting our remaining trees and increasing our forest cover, President Aquino took the bull by the horns, and EO 23 was born.

The EO has sparked interest among naysayers, and garnered the support of some local executives and environment groups, but it also raised questions from the local wood industry and skeptics in the political arena.

To further our understanding of this executive order, let us explore its intentions, components and pertinent features.

Law's Intent

EO 23 declares a moratorium on the cutting and harvesting of timber in the natural

and residual forests of the entire country and creates the anti-illegal logging task force. The intention of

President Aquino in creating the said EO is to uphold our intergeneration responsibility to protect the environment and to prevent further destruction wrought by natural disasters.

Still fresh in people's memory are the occurrences of landslides in Ormoc, Baguio, Leyte and Aurora which killed thousands of our countrymen; and the disasters brought by Reming, Ondoy, Pepeng and Frank which destroyed hundreds of lives and millions worth of properties. And just recently, our country witnessed the devastation in Bicol, Samar and Surigao. In the midst of perceived further threats of more landslides and the destructive potentials of the La Nina phenomenon, EO 23 was signed.

The EO underscored the State's obligation to protect the remaining forest cover areas not only to prevent such calamities, but also to preserve biodiversity, protect threatened habitats and sanctuaries of endangered and rare species, and to allow for the natural regeneration of residual forests and the development of plantation forests.

Components and Pertinent Features

In order to implement the moratorium, EO 23 has prohibited the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) from issuing and renewing logging contracts and tree cutting permits in all natural and residual forests. When we say natural and residual forests, we refer to forests composed of indigenous trees that were not planted by man.

On the other hand, a plantation forest is a man-made forest, where trees were planted pursuant to a management agreement with the DENR.

The log ban is in place indefinitely.

The only exemptions allowed by the ban are the clearing of road right-of-way by the Department of Public Works and Highways, site preparations for tree plantations, silvicultural treatment and similar activities, provided that all logs derived from the said cutting permits shall be turned over to the DENR for proper disposal. Likewise, the ban may allow tree cutting associated with cultural practices pursuant to the Indigenous People's Right Act (IPRA) subject to strict compliance with existing DENR guidelines.

The Executive Order also tasks the DENR to review all existing forestry agreements and immediately cancel those that have violated forest laws at least twice. Furthermore, said agreements will be immediately terminated if the holders engage in logging activities in any natural or residual forest.

The DENR was given authority to close all sawmills, veneer plants and other wood processing plants that are unable to present proof of sustainable sources of legally cut logs for a period of at least five years starting this year.

A National Greening Program shall likewise be developed by the DENR through the DA-DENR-DAR Convergence Initiative. The NGP is meant to anchor on the government's goal of poverty reduction, food, security, and climate change adaptation and mitigation. To effect this, the EO has directed the DENR to partner with agencies such as the Department of Education and the Commission on Higher Education (to initiate the necessary educational drive campaign), the Department of Interior and Local Government (to help in establishing communal tree farms for firewood and other purposes), the Department of Social Welfare and Development (to identify the upland farmers covered by the NGP as priority beneficiaries of the conditional cash transfer program), the Department of Budget and Management (to provide the funds for the production of quality seedlings for reforestation programs from available funds of the government), and the private sector and other concerned agencies and institutions (to raise funds and resources for tree planting activities).

The other night, President Ramos literally was "a hit" all night to the nation-wide members of the Philippine Press Institute who gathered at the Trader's Hotel in Metro Manila to celebrate its 50th year founding anniversary. He was 30 minutes early when he arrived at the hotel entrance already bantering with some well wishers (among them my colleague former Congressman Bert Lumauig of Banaue). When Atty. Raul Pangalangan, publisher of the Philippine Daily Inquirer and I came down to welcome him, he "welcomed" us instead. He was clad in his favorite barong, with the native Igorot material lining the seams and cuffs (calling his barong "igorotchi" which he described as much better than "Gucci").

'EX-PRESIDENT' — FVR was in his usual jovial self. When I addressed him from the rostrum "Mr. President" he interrupted me by calling out aloud from his seat, admonishing me: "ex-president, ex-president"! (As if "somebody up there" would be displeased if he used that title — so I had to correct myself! LOL) He listened intently in his seat when Publisher Raul, in briefly introducing him, reminded everyone about the milestones during his presidency that many of us might have forgotten; like today's cell phones and the landmark opening up of the Philippine economy made possible by his liberalization policy, the progress brought about by the military bases conversion; his being a "warrior for peace" due to his unprecedented peace initiatives despite being a soldier.

'CON TODO AMOUR'— When he went to the rostrum to give his message, he first called on everyone to please stand up and warmly hug the next person "con todo amour" (with all the love). He said it's in this light that we, as a people, value our country and should value each other. "Go ahead, embrace each other "con todo amour" because it is perhaps this way that you can convince our legislators to pass the Freedom of Information bill", he quipped. To further demonstrate, he came down from the rostrum and brought up the stage a lady guest and showed everyone how to do it. (Naughty him, he got away with several kisses!) When he started his message, he first appeared as if he was looking for his prepared speech. He then reached down to his socks where his papers were tucked saying: "During the early days, this was where we hid our .45s and ammos". (As expected, he would throw to the floor every page when done — which his aide would dutifully pick up and gather after his speech.)

CREDIBLE, NOT RESPONSIBLE — He then turned serious and talked about the responsibilities of media and the basic need to be accurate, independent and accountable, hallmarks of a "credible" press. No, he preferred not to describe media as "responsible press" because it might sound all right at first blush. "But then, it may be relevant to ask: what do you mean when we say 'responsible'? By whose standards or by what measures do we consider the press 'responsible'? If you ask those in government or in politics, being a 'responsible' press may mean being less a critic and more a publicist. Being called a 'credible' press is better as 'credibility' is earned", he said.

SOCIAL MEDIA —Touching on the challenges posed by social media on the printed press, he noted: "Today's social media, as a rule, falls short of this

WHERE IS P6 BILLION WATER FUND COL-LECTED BY MWSS? The Union of Consumers and Commuters of the Philippines is raising a very valid point, now that water is becoming more and more scarce from the Angat Dam in Bulacan and the La Mesa Water Reservoir in Quezon City as a result of the gravelyheated temperatures in the country today.

The question, propounded by the Union's president, RJ Javellana, in a morning radio interview last May 07, 2014, is: why are these two dams suffering the same problem of vanishing water levels when some years ago, the Aquino government collected hefty fees, now amounting to about P6 billion, from water consumers in Metro Manila and nearby provinces to precisely remedy this problem?

Javellana's question gave rise to other equally-disturbing questions which President Aquino and officials of the Metropolitan Waterworks and Sewerage System (MWSS) must answer: Where did the P6 billion or so contributions go? Was this huge amount, exacted from helpless water consumers through the MWSS and its concessionaires, really used to improve Angat and La Mesa? Why are the dams still suffering water lack now?

AQUINO GOV'T DID NOT ACT ON VANISHING WATER FROM DAMS: Surely, if only the Aquino government used the P6 billion or so contributions from MWSS customers to buy portable machines that could turn sea water into safe potable and drinking water for the different provinces greatly affected by the hot weather, including those in Metro Manila and in the franchise areas of the MWSS, no one needed to worry about water lack and probable water rationing.

Indeed, the sea is a vast and inexhaustible source of water that could be desalinated and turned into safe drinking water, and any right-minded government official, from Malacanang to MWSS, would certainly try to tap it with the acquisition of desalination machines. Now, not only is there no effort to tap the sea, but the P6 billion MWSS users contributed some time ago is even nowhere to be found.

THE BEST OPTION AGAINST OPPRESSIVE **HEAT:** So, what can ordinary Filipino mortals do, in the face of their officials' evident inefficiency, incompetence, and criminal neglect, which have put everyone in grave peril? Of course, the organized sectors of Philippine society can march down the streets, rally in front of

Malacanang and other government offices, but then not everyone can do these activities. As far as I am concerned, still the best option for Filipinos over this problem of scorching heat arising from global warming and climate change is Biblical, as Deuteronomy 28:15, 22 and 23 suggest quite clearly. We should now endeavor to read the Bible and listen to God

more conscientiously, and to obey God's commands truthfully from now on. The other options have been proved to be inutile and useless, so it is now time to

After the expropriation in 1957, Petitioner NPC exercised all acts of ownership on the property covered by OCT No. 1633 (the "Property") and together with other expropriated lands by utilizing the Property for its offices, motor pool, residential houses and other facilities/structures for the Binga Hydroelectric Power Plant.

On 8 June 9. 2001, Republic Act 9136 otherwise known as the ElecReform Act of 2001 ("EPIRA") was signed into law by then President Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo. The EPIRA mandated the creation of Petitioner PSALM. Under Section 49 of the EPIRA, PSALM became the owner, by operation of law, of all existing NPC generation assets, liabilities, IPP contracts, real estate and all other disposable assets which includes the property covered by title subject of this Petition. Section 49 of the **EPIRA** provides:

SECTION 49. Creation of Power Sector Assets and Liabilities Management Corporation. - There is hereby created a government-owned and controlled corporation to be known as the "Power Sector Assets and Liabilities Management Corporation", hereinafter referred to as the "PSALM Corp.", which shall take ownership of all existing NPC generation assets, liabilities, IPP contracts, real estate and all other disposable assets. All outstanding obligations of the NPC arising from loans, issuances of bonds, securities and other instruments of indebtedness shall be transferred to and assumed by the PSALM Corp. within one hundred eighty (180) days from the approval of this Act.

10. PSALM thereafter exercised acts of ownership over the Property.

11. Petitioners are thus entitled to the cancellation of OCT No. 1633 in the name ofPedro Lampitao and to the issuance of a new title in the name of NPC or PSALM under Section 108 of Presidential Decree (P.D.) No. 1529.

12. Section 108 of P.D. No. 1529 explicitly provides:

SECTION 108. Amendment and Alteration of Certificates. - No erasure,
