Reflection

Historians divide human history into many

periods. You may know some of them. The Bronze Age. The Iron Age. The Middle Ages. The early Modern period. Post-modernism. And many other names but surely our age is best described as the Information Age. Literacy. Education. Early childhood learning. Pre-school. Primary school. High school. Schooling gives way to more schooling, then college or university, a degree then post-graduate studies, on the job training, ongoing professional development, perhaps an MBA – a lifetime of learning.

The Information Age. More knowledge than our ancestors could have ever dreamed of just a few keystrokes away. And yet the more we know, the deeper we go, the more we realise how very little we know about this universe in which we live. Our Nobel

Prize winning scientists are often the best examples. The deeper they go into their field, the more breakthroughs and discoveries, the more they are humbled by the finite nature of human knowledge in our infinite universe. And they are filled with wonder and awe at the natural world. For them science becomes almost a religious experience as they marvel at the order and design that they find in diverse fields from micro-biology right up to astrophysics. Unsurprisingly, for many of them, the Christian worldview makes best sense of their science.

The Bible celebrates their field as well. Solomon and Job were fascinated by the natural world and wrote extensively about it. The apostle Paul had great learning. And a whole section of the bible has come to

be known as the Wisdom literature; it even incorporates writings from wise people from nations other than Israel. And yet all the wisdom writings in the Bible have one thing in common: true wisdom begins with fear of the Lord. And so it is no surprise to read in Proverbs 3:5–6 today,

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and lean not on your own understanding;

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and he will make your paths
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Despite the blessings of our age and our great learning, true wisdom begins with fearing, standing in awe of, deeply respecting, obeying and heeding him who knows all. The wise person is the one who lives

by the words of Proverbs 3:5–6,

5 Trust in the Lord with all your heart
and lean not on your own understanding;

6 in all your ways submit to him,
and he will make your paths
straight.

Lean not on your own understanding, instead trust him with all your heart, submit to him in all your ways, and watch him make your paths, not difficult, not cumbersome, but straight. It is refreshing in an age of unrelenting study and learning that simple trust in our Lord is enough. Trust and obedience and he will take care of the rest.
