Old Testament Backgrounds

Shavuot or Pentecost or the Feast of Weeks was one of the three Shalosh Regalim or Pilgrimage Festivals (along with Pascha or Passover and Sukkot or Tabernacles). Together with the other four festivals on the Old Testament calendar (Sabbath, First Fruits, Trumpets, and Day of Atonement) they are prescribed in Leviticus 23.

Passover celebrates Israel's deliverance from Egypt. Tabernacles celebrates God's guiding hand through the wilderness wanderings and into the Promised Land. Pentecost celebrates God's provision of the Law at Sinai and His provision at the time of the wheat harvest. Unlike the others, it was to include all the various kinds of sacrifices: Wave, Burnt, Drink, Food, Sin, Peace, and Thanks.
