

"The compassion of the Lord is for every living thing" (Sirach 18:13)

According to the creation stories in Genesis, God first pours out Spirit on the waters, heralding and facilitating the stirring of life and becomes incarnate as the very life and breath of the Creation. On and *through* the forming Earth, creation continues: "Let the earth put forth vegetation"; "Let the waters bring forth swarms of living creatures"; "Let the earth bring forth living creatures of every kind" (Gen 1:11, 20, and 24).

The Earth co-creates with God. God calls forth life from the substance of the Earth, with human life as part of this: "Then the LORD God formed a human from the dust of the ground... So out of the ground the LORD God formed every animal of the field and every bird of the air."

The Hebrew word for ground is *adamah*, and also means earth, soil, and land. Genesis says that life came out of the *adamah*, from the Earth itself, and all living creatures share not only the same Creator but the same matter, the same essence.

When we look at the Hebrew there is something else quite striking. The Hebrew word that we translate in English as "man" or "human" is *adam*. That's where the name Adam comes from. It is the word for humankind. So, using a bit of the Hebrew, Genesis 2:7 says, "Then the LORD God formed *adam* (human or humankind) from the dust of the *adamah* (earth or ground)."

In Genesis you can see the interrelationship between the Earth and all life. In the case of humankind, the Hebrew name for human, *adam*, even connects etymologically to the Earth, *adamah*. As Scripture affirms, and our own Prayer Book echoes, we come from the Earth and return to the Earth.

Humans are completely embedded in this world. Whether we recognize it or not, we belong wholly within the unity and processes of the whole creation, interdependent and intimately related.

What is more, this Earth and all that it holds speak to us of who God is and what God desires for us. It mediates the divine. It communicates God's nature and draws us into deeper relationship with God. Through the Creation we see who God is and God reveals God's self to us (Romans 1:20)

God actually loves us through the Creation. And we are called to love it in return, act toward it as God acts toward us, in blessing and in love. God's hope, God's dream, God's redeeming love, is for us all (Revelation 21:1; Isaiah 49:6; Isaiah 65:17). God's desire is for the restoration and reconciliation of all creation (Colossians 1:20). The whole created order glorifies God together, each in our own way and according to our own gifts (Psalm 148).

From the first pages of Genesis through the Book of Revelation, God invites us to care for our relationships – with each other, both near and far, and with the rest of Creation. Let us continually be mindful of this, looking for ways to better cultivate and respect our relationship with God and our sacred connection with the whole of God's Creation.

This gift contributes essential funds to the campaign as it helps to maintain the structure which houses our bells and to restore our tower which is a visible landmark on the New Bedford skyline, a beacon in New Bedford and her surrounding communities.

NOTES FROM THE JUNIOR WARDEN

It has been a busy summer with an even busier Fall in store. The steeple is down and the birch cone for the new steeple is nearly complete. The panels for the wooden cone will be set in place and a special team will affix the slate to the cone after it is in place and secured. We have been delayed by the condition of the tower; this became evident as demolition progressed. Powdery mortar and cracked interior brick made demolition a slow, laborious process. In addition, a two foot interior layer of brick just above the arches of the belfry needs to be removed and rebuilt before the concrete ring support can be poured. This site condition will necessitate removal of some portion of the befry in order to establish a stable base for placement of the new steeple. As we go to press, we are awaiting the contractor's and engineer's assessment of how much additional work this involves and what the schedule impact will be.

The office area is moving along well. It is important to keep in mind that by the time that you receive this news, that much of the work will have been completed. The HVAC is scheduled for completion during the week of October 20th. The drywell for the sump pumps has been put in within the guidelines set by the city. Office furniture has been ordered where needed along with the conference table with a communications module. Seating to accommodate meetings has also been ordered. The subway grate system to protect from backflow near the east door is scheduled to go in. All of the LED lights are in and the security system is close to completion. The whole system for the church and the parish house will be updated with a new panel. What will remain will be updating the church itself with either a beam detector or multiple addressable units. That is still being studied.

The dimmer system for the church and chapel lighting has been updated. It was in remarkable condition and did not need to be replaced. Replacement modules were installed instead.

Some of the fire suppression system, (not allowed to call it the sprinkler system anymore!!!) piping needed to be replaced. This will be an ongoing concern and will be addressed as needed. There is no way to be proactive; we must wait for the signs to alert us.

Gutters for the parish house will be cleaned on the 19th. We will also need to check for damage to the slate and gutters on the south side, since water was coming into the organ chamber during one of the storms. Water and wind from a specific direction has caused this in the past as well.

The contractor and a stone mason are designing a pod for the diesel generator to be installed. The pod will be large enough to contain the generator and recycling bins. Fencing around the pod will protect the generator and exterior HVAC units. Our own Chris Reed has submitted a landscape design that is simple, elegant and authentic to our region. More importantly, it showcases our beautiful architecture. Implementation of the plan will of course wait until repointing work has been completed and input from Team Property has been gathered.

Pricing for future projects is being sought. Included in our original \$1.9 is the repointing of the four sides of the church and painting the trim of the windows of the church. We should have four bids by the first part of December.

While we are concentrating on the capital campaign, other necessary improvements are still being investigated. These include repairing water damage in the church and chapel, the stairwell going from the church to the church school area, windows in Grace House, and replacement of defective thermostats.

VESTRY VOTES

At its meeting on September 30, 2015, the Vestry approved the following motion:

• The disposition of donations for weddings, funerals and other pastoral offices performed by clergy of Grace Church will be deposited in that respective income line in the general operating budget. An exception may be made in the rare instances when clergy celebrate these offices outside of the church on vacation or a day off, with the understanding that these instances should be avoided in general.

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FROM THE SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE.....

Dear fellow Grace Church parishioners:

Grace Church is blessed to be in a unique position to offer scholarships to active members seeking higher education. The generous bequests of several Grace Church members and their families and the prudent investments of these funds have afforded us the opportunity to assist our parishioners with their endeavors in higher education. After the scholarship presentation in August, several members of the congregation asked about the process and criteria for scholarship applicants. In an effort to clarify the process and the requirements, the Scholarship Committee would like to take this opportunity to explain the procedure which was instituted in September 1989. To meet the eligibility for a Grace Church Scholarship:

- The applicant must be a member in good standing of Grace Episcopal Church. The canonical understanding of this means having received communion at least three times in the past year and being known to the treasurer as having supported the mission and ministry of the Church. (Given the fact the applicants are in college and not working full time, we take into consideration their support of the mission and ministry of Grace Church through non-financial means, which can be noted on the application or outlined in the cover letter.)
- The applicant must be a high school graduate, or have a GED, or be accepted to a degree granting institution of higher learning (without necessarily having graduated from high school).
- The applicant may apply to any post high school program including college or university, community college, culinary arts school and technical school. Graduate school candidates are also eligible to apply for a Grace Church scholarship.

The committee uses a three tiered, weighted point system to evaluate the applicants and determine the awards. It is based on the applicant's degree of church activity and community service (40%), academic achievement (30%) and financial need (30%). Given this system of scoring, it is imperative that the applicants submit a complete application which includes:

- a. The Grace Church Application for Scholarship Funds (all sections completed).
- b. A cover letter of approximately 250 words addressing the applicant's goals in seeking higher education as well as any information that would be important to the committee members making the decisions on the awards.
- c. A transcript of the fall/spring semester including their most recent GPA.

Each candidate is given a copy of these "Scholarship Regulations" when they request an application. The applicants are given two months to request and submit the completed application. An incomplete application or an applicant who does not meet the criteria or the submission deadline will not be considered for a scholarship award. The Grace Church Scholarship Committee is committed to strictly adhering to these regulations and criteria and, in so doing, strives to honor the original intent of those who so very generously donated to make these scholarships possible. FOOD PANTRY

Each year, the Grace Church Food Pantry provides Thanksgiving dinner to over 140 households in the Greater New Bedford area. Depending on the size of the family, either a turkey or a chicken is provided along with all the "fixings" for a wonderful holiday meal. Last year we were especially blessed with a tremendous amount of fresh produce from the Greater Boston Food Bank which supplemented the stuffing, cranberry sauce, canned pumpkin, bread and canned vegetables we provided. Those receiving the meals include regular Food Pantry clients, parishioners in need, GASSP families in need and families identified via the court system.

We have carried on this tradition for many years in conjunction with the Greater Boston Food Bank which has provided most of the turkeys and chickens. But in recent years, the Food Bank has been less able to provide the turkeys we need. As always, the Grace community has stepped up to help out. This year we are in more need than usual. In past years, the Food Bank has been able to let us know several weeks ahead of time how many turkeys they will be able to provide. This year, due to a number of factors, they are unable to do that. We will find out the first week of November how many turkeys will be delivered on November 10th, the day we provide most of the meals to Food Pantry clients. In faith, we are moving forward with this outreach, hoping to

provide meals for as many as we have in the recent past. And we rely on Grace parishioners to help as you have in the past. So, BRING A TURKEY TO CHURCH !!!! and join us in helping those in need this holiday season.

NOVEMBER

We begin November with the **Feast of All Saints**, which is Sunday the first. It is a break in the succession of the Sundays after Pentecost. The color is white to mark this special feast day when we honor all saints, all those who have gone to their reward in heaven. We will be using Eucharistic Prayer D, a translation of one of the oldest Eucharistic Prayers. This is one of two occasions at Grace when we use this particular prayer; the other is Maundy Thursday. On this weekend, slips of paper will be provided with a basket in which to place them. We ask that you

write the name of a loved one who has gone before you to their eternal reward. During the consecration, the basket will be placed on the altar at all services that weekend.

There will be Healing Prayers before the Saturday five-o'clock service, and after the Sunday eight-o'clock service. The next weekend we will be kneedeep in our great annual effort, the **Bittersweet Bazaar** on Saturday November 7. That weekend is the **Twenty fourth after Pentecost**. On Sunday afternoon, November 8, the **Southcoast Chamber Society** will hold a concert in our church at 4:00 p.m. We return to the seasonal color of green, and we will be using Eucharistic Prayer 3 from Enriching

November 29: First of Advent Angel Tree Our Worship. The following weekend, the **Twenty fifth after Pentecost**, **Children's Liturgy** will take place at the ten-o'clock service.

November 21-22, will be the **Last Sunday after Pentecost**, as well as **Harvest Sunday**. Every Parish has a Parochial Feast Day, usually around the date of the feast day of the saint or event in Jesus' life after which the parish is named. In many ways

Harvest Sunday is our Parochial Feast Day. The word Grace is from the same root as that which gives us the word for "thanks" or "thanksgiving" or a benefit freely given. In Romance languages: Spanish *gracias, Italian grazie,* Portuguese *grátis* and, in French, Thanksgiving Day is *Jour d'Actions de Grâce*. It is also in November that our parish was originally founded as a diocesan mission in 1833. As well as being the month in which the new church building was opened in 1880, and also the month of the tragic fire and subsequent rebirth of Grace in 1987. In one of the earliest photographs extant on the chancel of the present church it is decorated for Harvest Sunday, and today, over one-hundred-thirty years later we still decorate the altar with the fruits of the harvest on this Sunday. For this weekend we will be using

Eucharistic Prayer C. It is also a special anniversary for our Director of Music and Organist, Brian Roderick, who will have been with us for twenty years.

With the last weekend in November, we will be ending the liturgical year and beginning a brand new one with the **First of Advent**. The color changes to blue; the Angel Tree and the Advent wreath appear. More details will be manifest in the December Grace Notes.

On Wednesdays in November, there will be Morning Prayer on November 4 for **All the Faithful Departed;** Morning Prayer on November 11, the feast day of **St. Martin of Tours (it** is also **Veterans' Day)**; and Holy Eucharist and Healing Prayers on November 18 celebrating **Hilda of Whitby.** There will be Morning Prayer celebrating **James Otis Huntington** on Wednesday November 25, and Morning Prayer at ten-o'clock on **Thanksgiving Day**, November 26.

The **Thanksgiving Dinner** will take place on Tuesday evening, November 24.

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SPIRITUAL FORMATION MINISTRY

Two of us were able to attend sessions at the Congregational Resource Day last month, which we found very rewarding. Amy Cook, the Diocesan Missioner for Education, Formation and Discipleship, made a presentation on Adult Faith Formation that emphasized the importance of adult formation as a way of living out our faith. She noted that research indicates that thriving adult formation is a necessary component of growing congregations. She acknowledged the difficulties we all encounter in scheduling adult activities, and provided several online resources:

- The Living Compass (livingcompass.org) this site supports a personal inventory in a journey towards wellness if heart, soul, mind and strength
- ChurchNext (<u>www.churchnext.tv</u>) -- offering a wide variety of video courses
- The Massachusetts Bible Society (<u>www.massbible.org</u>)
 their series Exploring the Bible does not assume a lot of prior knowledge

Sara Fry, health ministry contact for the diocese and a parishioner at the Church of the Holy Spirit in Orleans, made a presentation on pastoral care as a ministry of the people. Her church's Lay Pastoral Care ministry developed into its current form over many months of investigation and planning, and evolved thereafter over several years, to encompass an umbrella group linking fifteen different ministries with timely and effective communication among them. A request for parish nurses led to several retired nurses, including Sara herself, being trained and licensed as such. Their duties include inhome evaluations of aging or ailing members of the congregation. Other teams send greeting cards, visit the homebound, offer prayers, or provide transportation. See deaneryweb.org/Church of the Holy Spirit/Lay Pastoral Care to read more about this.

Steve Matthews, Director of our mission hub, led a session on the church as a living system which had us up and moving around. First we moved the chairs into a circle for an opening meditation, then we broke into small groups for a directed discussion of our own church systems, then came the hula hoops. Steve put four of them in a line down the center of the room, labelled from "control" to "order" to "chaos" to "chamos" (that's chaos gone evil, we learned). We were asked to stand where we felt we personally belonged. There was quite a crowd at the intersection of chaos and order! So we talked about that, then moved to where we felt our congregations belonged. As you can imagine, it was a lively discussion. We learned another new word, chaordic, for the sweet spot between chaos and order where innovation and creativity lurk.

Below are brief summations of the three videos emailed over the last several weeks. The videos highlight how Grace Church ministers to the people of New Bedford and the surrounding areas. SHINING LIGHTS, ESOL Olga Rodriguez & Mali Lim

Shining Lights is an ESOL (English Speakers of Other Languages) program for adults. The program began several years ago through the initiative of Grace Church parishioners who contacted the City of New Bedford for collaboration to meet this need. Classes are held at three locations in the city and at Grace Church on Tuesday and Thursday evenings from September to June. Thprogram also provides childcare services during classes.

How important do you feel these classes are to the community?

There is a waiting list for classes at the colleges and schools. This program fills a gap during that wait time and provides a stepping stone to a successful outcome.

How many people do you serve?

Approximately 80 to 100 people per year.

What is the general outcome of the program?

The program provides a path for pre-literate non-English speakers to gain functional literacy in order for them to succeed in more formal ESOL programs at the college level.

LAUNDRY LOVE & COMMUNITY BREAKFAST Christine

Laundry Love seeks to bring economic relief by giving individuals or families the option to redirect funds toward food, medical care, gas or transportation costs as well as school supplies and other basic, everyday necessities. The Laundry Love initiative consists of regular opportunities to help people who are struggling financially by assisting them with doing their laundry.

Community Breakfast provides an opportunity for anyone, including those who are homeless and/or have serious financial needs, to get a hot, filling breakfast on Sunday morning. Normally there is no opportunity for a breakfast at other agencies on a Sunday. This program allows the people to come together in a safe and enjoyable environment surrounded by fellowship and food.

What does Grace Church provide for you? Fellowship and community

How do you feel Grace promotes fellowship and charity? By being accepting of people no matter their situation.

How did you hear about our programs?

"By word of mouth. Everyone knows you can come to Grace Church. Grace Church community programs are well known throughout the New Bedford area. Everyone tries to help each other out by letting newcomers know what programs are available to them."

Have you used the Laundry Love Program?

Yes, it's a great program. While there are many places in the area to receive clothing donations, without programs like Laundry Love you don't have an opportunity to get clothes cleaned regularly.

GRACE AFTER SCHOOL AND SUMMER PROGRAM Tracey Medeiros

Grace After School and Summer Program, a community caring for children, provides after school care during the school year and all day care during school vacations for children in kindergarten through grade 8 (ages 5 to 14). Donna Pires, Program Director, promotes a learning environment within the classroom by using a curriculum. The GASSP staff provides homework help, and a wide variety of activities are available including a computer lab, Science and Math Projects, reading, and sewing/embroidery. There are currently 22 children in the program.

Can you tell us about your experiences with the Grace After School and Summer Program?

Tracey received a flyer at an opportune time in her life. When she came to find out more about the program, she was impressed with the cleanliness and well maintained equipment, books and toys, and the fact that the program was structured and safe. Through the years, and even through personal hardships, the program has been a support structure for her and her children. Even as her children have grown, Tracey feels that the GASSP is like a second family.
