BAGUIO CITY – City mayor Reinaldo Bautista, Jr. last week signed Administrative Order (AO) No. 169 "creating a committee to identify vacant areas in the city with which to accommodate registered vendors and to formulate and implement policies and programs for the purpose."

The AO comes in the heels of Council Resolution No. 134-2008, "Seeking compliance by the mayor with Department of Interior and Local Government (DILG) Memorandum Circular (MC) No. 2001-135 [compelling local government units] to identify and designate within 90-days vacant areas for vending by duly registered vendors."

Heading the committee is administrator Peter Fianza (chairperson and action officer). The members include Coun. Elaine Sembrano, Coun. Isabelo Cosalan, Jr., treasurer Thelma Manaois,

"Tax amnesty runs counter to collection efficiency" – Manaois

BAGUIO CITY "We might be sending the wrong signals to taxpayers."

Thus said city treasurer Thelma Manaois last week, dispelling claims the city council-approved tax amnesty would encourage tax payments by delinquent taxpayers in the city.

She said, "Tax amnesties are generally frowned upon by treasurers across the country... it runs counter to the thrust of every local government unit to collect more taxes.'

Earlier, the measure penned by alderman Nicasion Aliping, Jr. was approved by the City Council on final reading. The measure remains nil mayor Reinaldo Bautista, Jr.'s signature of approval as of press deadline.

Tax amnesty, being a general pardon on persons otherwise guilty of evasion or violation of a tax law, partakes of an absolute forgiveness or waiver by government from its right to collect what otherwise would be due it.

Vice mayor Daniel Farinas during the executivelegislative meeting Monday said, "It is granted particularly to tax evaders who wish to repent and are willing to reform, giving them a chance to a clean slate.

Solo parent pleads for ailing boy

Twenty eightvear old Gina Enrriquez finds herself in quite an unenviable position. Looking older than her age, she's a solo parent without work and two young kids to raise. She needs to have over P21,000, a hefty sum she might have not seen, much less held.

She breaks into tears - saying she just couldn't help it whenever asked what she would do with the amount. It's for the cobalt radiation therapy of John Mark, her younger child who'll turn four this coming Thursday.

A clinical report, issued when John Mark was two years old, diagnosed him for medulloblastoma. It's a tumor of the brain. And hydrocephalus, marked by a bloating of the head due to excessive fluid.

Doctors then advised CT scan, an imaging procedure to fully diagnose his condition. An

went on to bankroll the kid's initial 25day cobalt therapy pegged at P21,000.

"It had to be done in Pasig City as we do not have the equipment here for brain radiation therapy," Enriquez said.

Early this year, the boy had another ST scan, paid for from a P50,000 fund a woman donor set aside for distribution to indigent patients.

Recently, doctors again advised another radiation cycle, prompting Gina to again knock on doors. She's unaware whether the cost she based from last year has gone up.

John Mark went home from the hospital last Tuesday. It proved a relief to her sister, eight-year old May Anne, a second grader at the Don Mariano Marcos Elementary School. Each time her mother had to be at John Mark's hospital bed, she is left alone.

Home is at 18 Rimando Rd., а

lodging place for visitors which the Church of Christ opened as refuge for the broken family. Gina said her husband abandoned them two years ago. She has no idea where he is now.

Since the separation, Gina has depended on her parents in Rosario, La Union, for support.

"My parents can hardly help us, as my father has been bed-ridden due to spinal injury when I was still young," she said.

Only last week, a son of the woman who paid for John Mark's second CT scan called up. He asked that P2,000 be picked up and divided for two other patients - 41-year old Josephine Almeron and twoyear-andeight-mont Angelix Marie Felix.

BAGUIO CITY – Progress can only be made when a precedent already exists.

C o u n c i l o r Nicasio Aliping in a proposed resolution last week requested Super Value Incorporated (SVI) to register SM Baguio as a "head office" in the City.

SVI owns and operates SM City Baguio as a "branch" of the SM chain of malls. Consequently, income taxes computed by government against SM Baguio are paid directly where SVI's head office is located – Bacoor, Cavite.

On the other hand, SVI in part directly remits to the Bureau of Internal Review (BIR) Central Office as a perk allowed to big tax paying companies by the National Revenue Code. SM is among the top 10 taxpayers in the country.

H o w e v e r, Aliping in his proposal observed, "[SM malls in] Cabanatuan, Nueva Ecija, and Rosales in Pangasinan are registered as separate entities in these local govern-

He said if SVI has been able to arrange with the BIR and the SM group for them to register their company in the said LGU's as head offices and not as mere branches, there are no legal impediments for SM Baguio to be considered for the same arrangement.

"This way," the alderman added, "They will pay their income taxes here and this will translate to more revenue for the city and more services for the people of **Cont. on page 10**

AO for anti-squatting committee out

BAGUIOCITY – A comprehensive guideline relative to the anti-squatting and anti-illegal structures committee has been prepared, and is ready for implementation, as it is through an Administrative Order signed by Mayor Reinaldo Bautista, Jr. last week

The guidelines indicate details to be undertaken from the start of a complaint up to either the implementation of a demolition order, or an appeal; and the number of days needed for the procedure to move on.

Though the committee accepts all complaints, its limitations are: to structures built prior to year 1992; cases on boundary disputes; ejectment cases; Accion Publiciana; and Accion Reinvindicatoria.

The flowchart shows the complaint being filed, endorsed to the secretariat, initially assessed by the committee and either approved, dismissed, or referred to court or other agency.

If the case goes on, a parallel investigation and ocular inspection by the Public Order and Safety Division (POSD) and City Building and Architecture Office (CBAO) would be done. Both bodies would give ten (10) days for monitor compliance to owner; but if the case progresses, another five (5) days would be issued for second supervision. A report would then be submitted to the committee.

A deliberation shall be done by the committee, and a notice of demolition **Cont. on page 11**

Traffic scheme evaluation report

BAGUIOCITY– The Traffic and Transport Management Committee (TTMC) must submit an evaluation report to the city council on the results of the new traffic schemes being implemented in the city for several months now.

Councilor Betty Lourdes Tabanda,in a proposed resolution said it is high time that the TTMC make a final recommendation on these traffic designs to determine if these are effective or not.

"The TTMC of the City of Baguio devised an experimental traffic scheme which was implemented along the major thoroughfares of the City, designed to study and make a final recommendation on the permanent i m p l e m e n t e d, " Tabanda noted.

"With the experiments having been conducted for several months now, the TTMC can make a recommendation as to whether the schemes are beneficial or not.

Tabanda noted that one of the areas affected in the traffic rerouting is Marcos Highway, specifically the along the Campo Sioco area but that there have been several complaints regarding the implementation of the project, particularly on safety concerns. Tabanda said

she received reports that accidents happened in the area allegedly caused by the schemes and the barriers placed along the roads.

"Last October 5, 2008, a pastor named Edmund Foronda met an accident when his motorcycle collided with a traffic barrier which was set up as part of the traffic scheme along the Campo Sioco Area. To date, the pastor is

Beyond Mortal Dust "We give them back to you O Lord, who first gave them to

"We give them back to you O Lord, who first gave them to us. Yet, as you do not lose in giving, so we have not lost them by their return." (Prayer for the Departed)

"All Soul's Day is so what's the word now? –so bifurcated," the wife said after a Halloween dinner. "Words like 'bifurcated' drive editors nuts," I replied. "Just what did you mean?"

"Half a world away, our grand-daughters — one dressed as a pirate and the other as a princess — join other California kids in trick-or-treat parties," she mused. "Here, our grandchildren bring flowers and light candles for family graves. And those plots will include ours, sooner rather than later." Oh, that.

Halloween is a contraction of "All Hallows Eve" (All Saints Day). It marked the Celtic new year. And in 1848, Irish immigrants brought those spooky costumes to the US where it continues



today as a fun-filled kids' feast. Reaching out to the departed

goes back thousands of years. "It is a good and wholesome thought to pray for the dead," declares the ancient Book of Macabees. By the year 998, the Benedictine abbot Oddilo of Cluny picked November 2 for remembrance. This practice spread to other countries, including the Philippines.

The living aid the departed, the teaching went, by asceticism's trio: prayer, sacrifice and alms. They'd help atone for past transgressions, and pave entry into the Beatific Vision.

"Lift us up, that we may see further, as one by one, You gather scattered families, from the distractions, strife and weariness of time, to the peace of eternity," an ancient prayer goes.

"Death is only a horizon. And a horizon is the limit of our sight. We thank you for the labor and joys of these mortal years, We thank you for the deep sense of mystery that lies beyond our mortal dust".

The desire to "see further" echoes, even in newsrooms. "Here come those de-cajon stories," an editor wearily groused. Whenever All Souls' Day comes around, news desks are swamped with humdrum reports: traffic jams, jostling crowds to squatters living in crammed cemeteries. "Is that all there's to this?"

No, it's not. The familiar, however can blur realities beyond the customary: from votive candles, cemeteries turned into twoday cities, zapped by karaokes.

Still, the central –and stunning —reality remains of life beyond a handful of ashes.

"We Filipinos use the idiom itaga mo sa bato to assert our utmost confidence," Pastor Lino Pantoja writes. "Such were Job's exact words: 'Oh, that my words were engraved in rock forever.'

They're words of Job's primitive theology of the Resurrection: "I know that my Redeemer lives. And in the end, He will stand forth upon the earth. And after my skin shall have been destroyed, yet in my flesh I shall see God."

These words were written 2,500 years before Easter's empty tomb. And in 1741, George Fredric Handel had worked it into his soaring oratorio that the world never forgot: "The Messiah."

The liturgy for All Souls spotlights this reality. Vita mutatur, non tollitur, priests murmur in the Eucharist's preface: "For unto your faithful, O Lord, life is changed, not taken away". The same theme resonates wherever religious or laymen read the Liturgy of the Hours.

Our grandchildren belong to the post-Vatican II generation. They never heard what echoed in requiem services of our longvanished youth: the Dies Irae ("Day of Wrath") in plain chant.

Tuba mirum spargen sonum /Per sepulchra regionum/Coget omnes ante thronum, the choir would sing. My now-hazy freshman Latin translates that into: "Trumpets blare through sepulchers, calling all to appear before judgement's throne."

Young and old, however share the universal aching for assurance of what lies beyond the grave.

"If only I could see him, for just a second, and know he's all **Cont. on page 7**

Enforced disappearance as tactic to deprive people movements of martyrs

In this column, I temporarily suspend my write-ups on the new guidelines of the National Commission on Indigenous Peoples (NCIP) on the rights of indigenous peoples to free and prior informed consent (FPIC). This is to give way to a write-up that may be more appropriate this November.

We Filipinos allocate November 1 to commemorate the lives of our departed. We reserve November 1 as a day to express our love for loved ones who have gone from this life to afterlife. It is therefore fitting that this column gives space for the departed among us who were victims of salvaging via enforced disappearance.

It is sad that there are elements in the military who think that the best way to end insurgency is via the use of fear and terror among cause-oriented groups. This is the way of the barbarians and those among the military who have no honor as warriors and combatants. They belong to the age of centuries ago and not in this time of the 21st century.

Gentlemen combatants must fight guns with guns. But ideas and revolutionary zeal are not defeated by guns. They are only eliminated by correct ideas and good direction. Thus, insurgency will not end with terror and fear.

Revolutionaries are always able to overcome fear and terror because they are convinced that what they are fighting for is correct and just.

On the contrary, the use of terror only provides justification for revolutionary groups to keep up with their zeal. The use of terror provides proof that indeed the state is an institution of the ruling class ala Lenin. For revolutionaries, the use of terror by military men validates their dictum that the state is an instrument of violence through which the ruling classes oppress the exploited classes.

Thus, what the barbarians in the military are doing is that they are basically strengthening rather than weakening insurgency. Ironically, the barbarians within the military are basically providing political and moral support to revolutionaries precisely by the use of terror. Combatants who use terror are combatants without honor. They are unthinking warriors and will be defeated as history itself has shown.

The Russian tsars used terror but it did not prevent the emergence of the first socialist republic in the world. Similarly, the use of terror by the Chinese Kuomintang did not prevent the emergence of the People's Republic of China, one of the greatest powers today. Further, many of us still recall that the use of napalm, assassinations, carpet-bombing, Agent Orange, chemical and biological weapons, and other large-scale terrorism did not prevent the rise to power of the current Vietnamese regime. All these show that terrorism on the people's movement will only strengthen not weaken revolutionary insurgents.

Now it appears that another tactic is being used by the barbarians in the military establishment. This is the use of enforced disappearance against those in the various people's movements. My guess is that the use of enforced disappearance is a tactic used by the barbarians in the military establishment to deprive the people's movements of martyrs. This will not succeed however because it is clear that the disappearance was enforced because they have causes to fight for. Thus, I appeal to the patriots in the military establishment to rid themselves of barbarians within their ranks and embrace instead the rule of law.

The elimination of insurgency is a political problem that requires a political solution. The military must provide time for that political solution to be reached by the general population. In the meantime that the political solution is not yet defined, the best way for the military to respond to the political problem is for it to simply allow the rule of law to dominate. This approach will lead us to genuine and sustainable peace

Constitution must be changed to remove its "people power" provisions

CONSTITUTION PROVIDES FOR "PEOPLE POWER": Chief Justice Reynato S. Puno said removing leaders of government at this point is an "extra constitutional change" which must not happen since elections are just 19 months away, but is this mode of changing leaders "extra constitutional", really?

I am compelled to raise this question because what Puno is saying, in relation to the call of five Catholic bishops to change the government now, may provide an interesting jump off point for an honest to goodness discussion on whether or not the 1987 Constitution authorizes a change of government even without an election, by virtue of its so called "people power provisions."

Now, if the Constitution indeed authorizes a change of government even without an election by virtue of its so called "people power provisions", we may have to seriously consider changing the charter at this point of our nation's history, to remove these "people power provisions", and lay the issue to rest.

If you ask me, I believe (and I have been saying this all along) that, by virtue of these "people power provisions", the basic charter could be an authority for the perception that the people and their people's organizations can effect changes in government even without an election, something that is against God's laws (Romans 13:1 and 2, among others).

Consider this: in its Section 16, Art. 13, the Constitution says "The right of the people and their organizations to effective and reasonable participation at all levels of social, political and economic decision making shall not be abridged x x x"

Consider this also: in its Section 1, Art. 2, the Constitution intones: "The Philippines is a democratic and republican state. Sovereignty resides in the people and all government authority emanates from them."

Clearly, when the basic charter says it grants to our people and their organizations sovereignty, and the right to an effective and reasonable participation at all levels of social, political and economic decision making, what it is saying in reality is that the people and their organizations can effect a change of government on their own, and that if they do so, that is still within the bounds and parameters of the Constitution.

Note must be made of the fact that Section 16, Art. 13 was never contained in the 1935 and 1973 Constitutions of the Philippines. It was inserted by the 1986 Constitutional Commission, a body created by the Aquino government which, concededly, was a government brought about by the "participation of the people and their organizations" in political decision making.

It is therefore good that the Catholic bishops are talking about changing government now, and that Puno is reacting the way he did. What should be done however is to study these matters in relation to what the Constitution is saying, so that we could act collectively to amend or change the Constitution altogether.

TABUK CITY, Kalinga - The city government is calling for the involvement and support of all sectors in the province for the realization of the on-going Gawad Kalinga Matagoan Village project at Agbannawag of this city.

Through a forum, the city government in partnership with the Couples for Christ (CFC), the prime movers of the GK project worldwide, invited barangay officials, government employees, school institutions, the business sector and several others to become partners in said poverty alleviation endeavor.

In his message, City Mayor Camillo Lammawin Jr. stressed the need for partnership among all sectors to achieve the GK goal of providing homes and livelihood for the poor in the province.

He said that since it was launched on September 14, 2007, only 14 duplex houses were built, thus the call for more volunteers to speed up the undertaking. The project he said is programmed to put up at least 100 houses through the partnership of ANCOP Canada, the city government, beneficiaries and volunteer groups.

"The local government needs more partners and volunteers to speed up the implementation of the project which caters not only for the poor Christians but also for our landless Muslims brothers in the province," expressed the mayor, who is also the CFC GK Head of Kalinga.

Help, he said is not limited to the construction of houses alone but also in the provision of livelihood assistance through training and value formation of the GK community.

He also disclosed that to help more poor people in the province, the city government is looking forward to expanding the program and establish another GK community in a twohectare land at Lanna, Tabuk City.

Recalling how the program started in the province, Provincial Area Coordinator Dr. Joseph Aguilar said that with the strong support of Lammawin, the project was realized through the passing of a resolution authored by then Councilor Oliver Gacuya.

To initiate the work, the local government as a 'padugo' (to bleed for the cause) donated a 3.1 hectare of the municipal park reservation at Agbannawag. 2.1 hectares Aguilar said will be allocated for the GK houses and the remaining one hectare will be used for livelihood projects to ensure income and availability of food for the GK community.

But the volunteers he said lack the technical know-how for the project to succeed which also contributed to the slow implementation. Thus, the appeal to the other sector of society and resources from partner agencies to team-up to help the poor.

Gawad Kalinga which means "to had give care" started in 1995 through the initiative of the CFC in partnership with the ANCOP (Answering the Cry of the Poor) international as an alternative solution to solve poverty in the country by providing land for the landless, homes for the homeless, food for the hungry, giving each and every Filipino dignity and peace./ggd/PIA-Kalinga

Tightfist RP banks cited for saving
country from crisison the
economy,"

Strict and overlycautious banks in the Philippines have been cited for saving the country from being drawn deeply into the current global financial crisis.

"For all you know, this country may not even be hit hard by this global financial turmoil," says financial adviser Myrna Valdez who runs her own MPV Asset Management Company, a financial consulting firm in the southern city of Davao.

Valdez said most Philippine banks have "very tight credit policies" that turn off many Filipino businessmen unlike in the United States where credit is easy to get with hardly any collateral.

"It's much more difficult to get bank loans here. Philippine banks have this pawnshop mentality and don't want to lend you money unless you meet their requirements which include so much collateral," says Valdez who also sits as corporate financial officer of the Davao City Chamber of Commerce and Industry.

The noted financial adviser agrees with the recent views of US-based rating agency Standard and Poor's which stated that the Philippines is an "island of calm" in Asia amidst the ongoing financial turmoil in the higher-rated and supposedly more stable countries like Malaysia, Thailand, India, and Korea.

Philippine bank's "inherent distrust" of borrowers, strict lending guidelines and other banking reforms have placed the country in a much stronger financial position to withstand another worldwide financial crisis after going thru the devastating and crippling 1997 Asian financial crisis, according to Valdez.

The financial consultant explained that the financial turmoil started in the US when banks owning a lot of long-term assets, like subprime home mortgages, took short-term debts which they tried to pay off with short-term loans borrowed from other banks. Nervous bankers, out of fear, stop extending shortterm credit and hoarded their capital, shutting out the flow of cash in the system which caused a lot of bank failures in the US.

"A country's economy cannot function if people can't get credit easily. This is what's happening and it has a domino effect on the global economy," Valdez said.

T r a d e Undersecretary Merly Cruz, however, cited government banks and financial institutions for their prudent banking policies that helped the country weather the worldwide financial turmoil and boost the steady growth of the Philippine economy in recent years.

right, I'd be able to cope," Seamus tells the priest blessing his son's crumpled body, killed in an accident.

"I remembered Seamus' comment" at a Mass for a student accident victim, writes Jesuit theologian Catalino Arevalo." The boy's classmates chose the Transfiguration for gospel reading. "The one abut Jesus going up to the mountain and changing into dazzling white," they suggested.

"It struck me, for the first time, that Jesus allowed his friends to see, 'for just a second', what was beyond. Their reaction was strange: they did not want to leave the spot. It's 'wonderful for us to be here.' But Jesus reminded them they had to go down the mountain.

"What if we could get some vision, 'for only just a second'? Or if we could, 'for only just a second', see people who've gone before us, in faith, especially those suddenly or tragically taken, in that place of light that is God's promise?

"What if we, too, had some authentic extended experience of what 'our eyes have not seen, nor our ears heard' of what God prepared for those who are faithful?

"It is truly the better thing that an authentic extended experience is not given us —because we would not want to leave the spot. Better still because there is still so much of the humdrum, the frustrating, the difficult for us to endure, and if possible, with courage, to build some small beginnings of the Kingdom which Jesus wanted to make our work in this world."

Whether in the dim catacombs, off Rome's Appian way, or in our garishly lighted cemeteries, All Souls' Day speaks to us in Nobel Laureate Rabindranath Tagore's poignant verse: "Death is not the extinguishing of life. It is putting out the lamp, because dawn has come."

was based on a resolution adopted by the Bayan Park Management and Advisory Board requesting the office of the city mayor for the approval of the BPMAB's project proposal and appropriation of P2 million from the city for the said park.

said the global forum on migration and development is one venue where coordinated action among nations can be effectively pursued as this is the "better path than going it alone."

She urged the participants of the Global Forum for Migration and Development to work together for that transformation by ensuring that globalization is for everyone, including migrant workers who contribute much to the economy through their remittances that often buoy up the economy, including that of the Philippines.

The United Nations Convention on the Protection of the Rights of All Migrant Workers and Their Families constitutes a comprehensive international treaty regarding the protection of migrant workers' rights, emphasizing on the connection between migration and human rights. The Convention aims at protecting migrant workers and members of their families. It sets a moral standard that would serve as a guide and stimulus for the promotion of migrant workers' rights in each country.

planning officer Arturo Orig, local police chief Wilfredo Franco, secretary to the mayor Ronald Perez, and public order and safety chief Greg Deligero.

The staff of the Treasury and Planning and Development Offices acts as secretariat for the committee.

It could be remembered erstwhile president Fidel Ramos issued Executive Order (EO) 452, "Providing guidelines to ensure security of registered vendors in the workplace."

The implementing rules and regulations (IRR) of EO 452 provide mayors shall cause the conduct of a survey identifying possible sites for vending. The Sanggunian concerned, within 90-days after such survey are obliged to pass an ordinance to effect the area as a permanent souk.

Records reveal that in 2007, there are over 1,500 vendors spread throughout the Central Business District.

However, observations pertaining to night market experiments of lore revealed the number of vendors practically doubles with the "new faces" that constantly sprout every time calls for registration are made.

Bautista said, "This time it would be different... much as we are giving chance for vendors who shall register to legitimize their business, the IRR likewise provides that only relocated vendors who acquire business permits may be permitted to sell."

"Thus," Bautista explained, "While the EO secures vendors in their respective work places, it does not likewise allow a free-for-all situation where any vendor could just occupy a spot in the identified areas – they have to register first."

He warned, "With an area identified to accommodate vendors who would want to legalize their trade, the city government shall likewise be more stringent against those who fail to register and avail of perks that go with it."/ISL

.... from page 2 linquent in the payment of real property taxes as of December 31, 2007.

The measure provided the amnesty may only be availed within 3-months upon approval by the mayor.

Manaois, hoping the measure would not ripen to an ordinance meanwhile averred the mayor's approval of the measure may only daunt taxpayers who religiously inject city coffers with needed "lifeblood" on time.

She said, "The grant of amnesty is unfair to taxpayers who pay without delay... it is a precedent susceptible to abuse by those who shall be benefited as they may just defer future payments hoping another amnesty may be approved."

"Instead of pampering delinquents, we should have otherwise exerted more efforts educating them about the benefits of paying on time," she added.

Manaois pointed out under Section 276 of the Local Government Code (LGC), an LGU may only grant amnesty to delinquent taxpayers in case of general failure of crops; or substantial decrease in the price of agricultural or agri-based products; or calamity in the LGU concerned.

"These," she said, "are reasons why we never had any tax amnesties since 1994."

Under the measure, an amnesty may only be granted after a taxpayer has explained in an affidavit reasons why he must be benefited by the amnesty.

But a lawyer who spoke on condition of anonymity observed said reasons, may run contrary to the tax principle, "amnesty must be construed against the taxpayer and liberally in favor of the government."

The measure likewise provided grounds upon which an amnesty may be granted including acts of man or fortuitous events.

But the same lawyer said the measure is in danger of being challenged on the ground that "the justifications for its grant discriminate against other taxpayers with no ample support in reason... it is simply too broad, too subjective."

He said, "All persons in the same situation must be treated in the same manner, the conditions not being different both in privileges conferred and liabilities imposed."

"Besides," he added, "The mere fact delinquents can cite fortuitous events in their affidavits are too broad to cover any kind of reason for financial woes."

"Remember, it is not only the City of Baguio which is feels the economic plunge but the rest of the country as well."

He averred, "In several case laws, the Supreme Court consistently pointed out, if none of the conditions to warrant the grant of amnesty under the LGC are present, any act by the local government granting the same is considered to have been done *ultra vires* (beyond its power)."/*ISL*

The TWG is scheduled to report to the city council and the City Solid Waste Management Board the results of the assessment next week.

Of the nine prospects, two have been considered as special cases – the open pit mine site in Antamok and the Sto. Tomas property.

The mine site was offered for the city's free use by the Benguet Corporation while the Sto. Tomas site is owned by the city.

So far, the two sites have been touted as the most viable of all the options as landfill stations.

Banez said the Ampucao mine site which offers a long-term solution to the garbage problem can be tapped immediately if developed by phase. So far the city government is laying down parameters for its use with the Benguet Corporation and the Itogon town officials.

The Sto. Tomas lot on the other hand can be developed as a secondary landfill station to supplement the Ampucao site.

While the landfill site selection is still in the pipeline, the city will continue to rely on hauling activities for its waste management until December this year.

Banez said they are now preparing the ground works for the completion of the required measures to rehabilitate the Irisan dumpsite to enable the city to operate it as a temporary sanitary landfill.

Banez said a survey of the dumpsite is in the works to determine the design necessary to fully restore the area.

Works expected to be implemented in the area to prolong the facility's life are sloping, completion of fence, canal and piping system./Aileen P. Refuerzo

Baguio expressed through greater shares from the Internal Revenue Allotment."

As early as when SM Baguio opened its doors to the Baguio community in 2004, city officials already manifested they wanted the local branch to remit income taxes directly to BIR Baguio.

may be issued. A written protest with evidence may be filed within seven (7) days and a hearing would be conducted, otherwise, the complaint is dismissed. A recommendation however may be issued by the committee, otherwise, the demolition order may then be implemented by the CBAO demolition team.

A case for violation of National Building Code of the Philippines may also be filed against the owner of the illegal structure, without prejudice to the issuance of a demolition order.

The AO issued by the mayor is anchored on the Local Government Code; Letter of Instruction (LOI) 19, LOI 691 in relation to PD 1096; City resolution 23, 1990; Tax Ordinance 2000-001; Presidential Decree (PD) 296 and other related laws and ordinances.

The anti-squatting and anti-illegal structures committee as mentioned would have the City Legal Officer as Chairman; and the regular members as, representatives from the CBAO, Philippine National Police-Baguio City Police Office (PNP-BCPO), Presidential Commission on Urban Poor (PCUP), and POSD-City Mayor's Office.

ally limitless power." But for a few magic seconds in 1997, JET managed to "return 60 percent of the energy it consumed, but that's the best it's ever done and is typical of fusion research all over the world."

Not quite if what four groups this year have witnessed happened during the demonstrations performed by a Filipino engineerinventor - Mr. Victorio Ayco. Energy was generated by mixing water with limestone and acid plus the so-called Ayco catalyst, under room temperature. Where JET continues to fail to break-even in the energy input-output, and where almost all laboratories the world over chasing after the golden goose of hot fusion after billions of dollars spent continue to struggle to obtain any meaningful results, and where only four of the 5,000 academic journals would barely consider papers which mention low temperature fusion, the Ayco demonstrations appear to be the key to end all the speculation, bickering and uncertainties in the cold fusion controversy.

It was suggested that one way to do an end run around the barrier erected against cold fusion was to manufacture a marketable product, say, a cold fusion water heater and the phenomenon would be undeniable. Well, the Ayco demonstrations invariably generated LPG-like energy which supplied "fire" to a burner and to a torch, and which ran a fourstroke stationary engine and a two-stroke tricycle engine. All "simply" from a mixture of your ordinary water tap water and limestone so abundant throughout the country. But what makes it all happen is the chemical catalyst Engr. Ayco has painstakingly developed over 35 years of research and experimentation.

Moreover, there are two other practical devices which utilize the Ayco catalyst to the benefit of the environment and the economy : the AeroNitro and Hybrid Reactor car devices. The first one converts nitrogen in ambient air into nitro gas which is shoved into the intake manifold during air and fuel intake. When nitro gas mixes with the fuel, fuel combustion attains maximum of 99.5 % efficiency and coupled this with the explosion of nitro gas itself as fuel, added power translates into up to 60 % savings on fuel consumption. And since there is almost complete burning of carbons, emission of pollutants is almost completely eliminated, thus more than satisfying the requirements of the Clean Air Act of 1999.

The second device – Hybrid Reactor – splits the atoms of water and utilizes the hydrogen as fuel in a 60-70 % to 30-40 % waterfuel (diesel or gasoline) ratio. This device comes along with water in a plastic bottle and is the authentic Filipino-made hybrid that utilizes water as fuel.

The devices may be fitted singly in any motor vehicle, but when installed jointly, savings in fuel consumption may run as high as over 100 % - a great breather to the economy - and pollution would be reduced to almost nil, thus paving the way to pollution-free cities, starting with our very own Baguio City.

Water and Limestone to produce Fuel of

the Future ?

In the Preface for his book Profiles of the Future, Arthur C. Clark wrote, "."It is really quite amazing by what margins competent but conservative scientists and engineers can miss the mark, when they start with the preconceived idea that what they are investigating is impossible. When this happens, the most well- informed men become blinded by their prejudices and are unable to see what lies ahead of them

This could have been a good commentary on what happened after chemists Martin Fleischmann and B. Stanley Pons of the University of Utah announced in a press conference that their recent experiment yielded excess heat or energy under room temperature – prescriptions for the energy of the future. This announcement unleashed unprecedented controversy and intrigue in the scientific community because what was reported ran contrary to every theory – all theories and all physical laws known to this day tell us that that was impossible.

Further, Fleischmann and Pons suggested that their experiment was very easy to reproduce, and that scaling it up to practical, power-producing devices would not be especially difficult. Less serious shortcoming but significant still, was their initial incomplete disclosure of relevant experimental protocols. These and other "procedural failings" gave "cold fusion" detractors added ammunition to further undermine the two scientists' discovery, and to their being condemned as

imposters and ultimately to their getting exiled by their peers or fellow scientists.

To understand the real story behind the controversy, we need to imagine a four stories-high building housing the Joint European Torus (JET), the largest fusion power experiment in the world lo-
