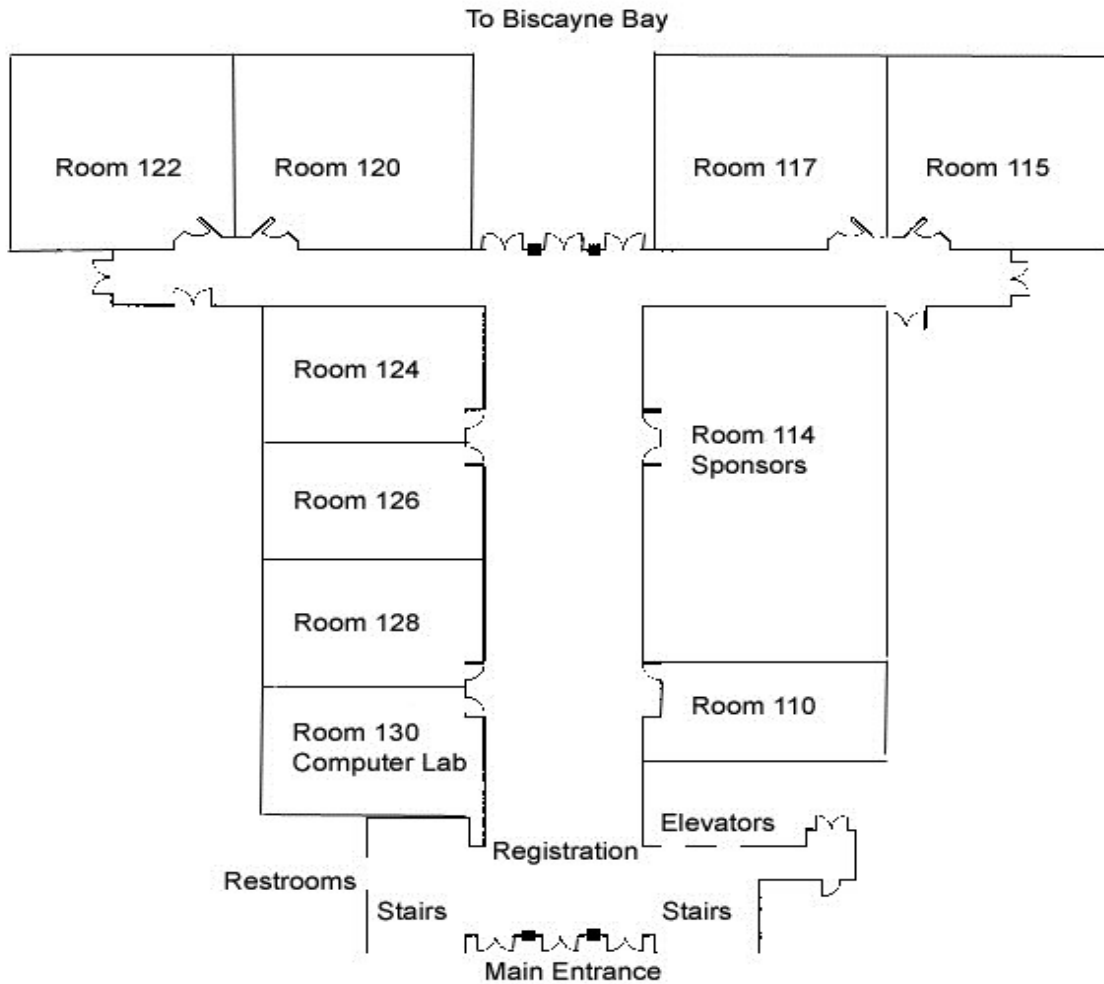

The Fall of RadioShack and the Renaissance of the Public Library

After 94 years of business, the RadioShack Corporation recently filed for Chapter 11. RadioShack gave us one of the first personal computers and was a tinkerer's paradise for young inventors such as Steve Wozniak, who went on to found Apple computers. What factors led to the downfall of RadioShack and how are these factors lessons for public libraries? How are libraries working to meet the changing demands of the public and integrating emerging technologies into their services?

Stephen Grubb (sgrubb@broward.org) has been an E-services and Marketing Manager at Broward County Library since 2011. His innovations include creative uses for technology, such as a "QR Quest," which involve library users in a scannable scavenger hunt and the transformation of "Broward County Library" into "BCL WoW," which stands for "Broward County Library Without Walls." He was a member of the team that designed and launched the Creation Station makerspace at the Broward County Main Library. In 2014, he was named a Library Journal Mover and Shaker as a Change Agent.

General and subject-specific instruction videos can be combined into unique modules to form short, discipline specific information literacy courses. The RSA's newly revamped website, Research Station, and blog provide mobile access to over 100,000 song tracks, discography, and background information.

Room 122 An Innovative Tool for Enhancing Student Engagement

Due to the ever-changing environment of libraries, librarians are developing new interests and skills to best meet the needs of diverse populations. Librarians are taking on new roles to include those of educators and facilitators. There has been a positive response to using FlipQuiz, a Jeopardy-style, freely available, online game, in a traditional, face-to-face lecture. This has popularized it and its many possible uses as an educational tool.

Amanda Chiplock (achiplock@health.fau.edu) is the Senior Medical Librarian and Department Head at S.E. Wimberly Library at Florida Atlantic University where she is working with IT and the College of Medicine Curriculum Committees to implement innovative programming to facilitate learning.

Allison Deluca (adeluca@fau.edu) worked as a Medical Librarian for Florida Atlantic University for a year and a half before transitioning to her current position as a Systems Librarian.

Lib Analytics: Creating Statistics in Order to Improve User Experience

Lib Analytics is a statistical web application created by Springshare. It allows librarians to collect and analyze data pertaining to their users' information needs. The Johnson & Wales University Reference Department collects data in order to measure how students are responding to academic and library instruction. The data also allows them to find specific academic programs in which further collaborative efforts will benefit their students.

Ramces Marsilli (rmarsilli@jwu.edu) is a Reference and Instruction Librarian at Johnson & Wales University with an interest in user experience. Ramces uses Lib Analytics to collect data in order to improve the academic relationships between students, professors, and librarians.

Library Hours Plugin

This plugin is designed to work with multiple branches, departments, programs, etc. enabling users to create multiple calendars that can be displayed on any Wordpress post using a Wordpress shortcode. It allows users to quickly create daily hours while incorporating holidays and other exceptions including shortened hours, as well as add linked events. It is mobile friendly and easy to install.

Charles Brown-Roberts (charlesbrownroberts@miami.edu) has been a Programmer at the University of Miami for seven months. Prior to this role, he was a Developer and Web Accessibility Specialist at California State University in Sacramento for 12 years.

Low Barrier Cloud Archives: APTrust Automation at the University of Miami Libraries

This open source application is used by archivists at the University of Miami to submit collections to the Academic Preservation Trust. It is based on open standards such as the Library of Congress BagIt specification and Amazon S3 cloud storage. It can be easily modified by other institutions to submit digital collections to the APTrust or to their own S3 storage.

James Little (j.little@miami.edu) was the primary developer of this project. In 2014, he was a recipient of the Society of American Archivists CFW Coker Award for RAMP (Remixing Archival Metadata Project) along with Tim Thompson, Matt Carruthers, Andrew Darby, and David Gonzalez.

Springing Ahead with LibGuides

The Hodges University Library is using the LibGuides content management system to build its entire library website, curate information for students and faculty, and host other department sites. Learn how Hodges librarians designed, developed, and marketed LibGuides to be useful and usable for all stakeholders.

Michael Rodriguez (mrodriguez8@hodges.edu) has upgraded the Hodges University Library to LibGuides 2.0 and integrated the entire previous site, into LibGuides. He has performed user testing to assess the new design's usability and promoted the new system university-wide.

Creating an Institutional Repository from scratch creates a multitude of both opportunities and pitfalls in the establishment of workflow, content creation, outreach and marketing policies, and stakeholder support. Nova Southeastern University's Digital Commons based repository, NSUWorks, completed its first year in February 2015. During this session, the triumphs and tribulations of the first year will be discussed, along with future plans in order to give attendees a glimpse into one particular IR experience. Archival collection digitization, outreach/marketing, journal/book publishing, reporting tools, and collection development will also be covered.

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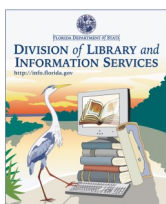

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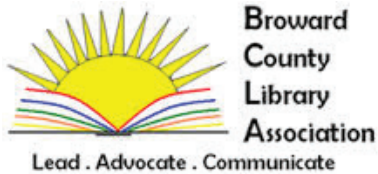
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
