## 'Love is in the Air' (AI)

The technique of AI in mares has gone from strength to strength in recent years. Early organisation is essential as one must choose a stallion early in the season – now is the time to start planning! Decide which stallion you wish to use and liaise with them early, as nearly all reputable studs require a valid CEM/EVA (+EIA possibly) certificate. These tests take between 7 and 10 days to run, so please avoid that last minute panic. We are again offering discount packages for fresh and frozen semen for your mare. If you're interested or have any queries regarding the process of AI please call the clinic and speak to David Holman. We also offer frozen semen storage (cryothermy) here at the clinic for a monthly charge.

#### **Update on Surgical Equipment.**

In recent months Abbey Equine has been able to expand its range of veterinary diagnostic and treatment equipment. A new portable digital xray processing system now allows us to take and develop radiographs at the owner's premises where necessary e.g. laminitic horses or ponies where we do not want them to travel or pre-purchase examinations which require multiple xrays. The system is able to develop the xrays in seconds for viewing and we can easily send the pictures to farriers or other veterinary surgeons if needed. Although this machine is portable we do still prefer our lameness investigations to come to the clinic where we have a dedicated safe xray room to help us take the best quality pictures. We have recently purchased a 3m long endoscope which allows us to visualise the horses' stomach – a process known as gastroscopy. This is essential for diagnosis of gastric ulcers, a common problem found in many performance horses. This endoscope shares the viewing screen with our normal respiratory endoscope which gives owners and vets an excellent view of the whole stomach lining. Gastroscopy will need to be undertaken at the clinic following a period of overnight fasting. Having our own gastroscope will reduce the waiting time previously encountered whilst having to book a visit from external veterinary surgeons and will enable treatment, if needed, to be started much sooner. Our vets have recently spent the day with Dr Tim Brazil (leading internal medicine expert) learning how to safely use the gastroscope. A second motorised burr system for equine dentals has also been added to the practice armoury which will allow two vets to be performing routine procedures on a daily basis so we are able to offer this service during our 'Zone Days' as well as specific 'Dental Days'.

During the time Sarah Carr is on sabbatical she will be here for specialised 'Dental Days' at the clinic for any of the more complicated cases we encounter. Having trained up all of our vets with the new equipment before she left your horses' teeth will be in great hands.

Abbey Veterinary Centres continues to invest in equipment for the equine division to allow us to continue offering a high standard of care for your horse.
