

Political Map

- Canada is broken up into provinces & territories.
- Each province/territory hod capital city where the provincial/territorial government takes care of their various responsibilities



Charter of Rights a Freedoms

- Created in 1982 as part of t Constitution Act
- Stated that no one could be discriminated against becare of their race, nationality, cureligion, gender, age or mental/physical disability.

Here are some "talking points" for each of the topics highlighted in the chat stations. You may want to refer to them during the whole class discussion.

7 <u>Queen Elizabeth II</u>

- Before Canada became an official country of its own, England had sent explorers and settlers to make this part of North American part of the "British Empire"
- In 1867 Canada became its own country, but the English royal family is now a 'figurehead' ruler.
