

Katara Cultural Village Foundation



Launched in 2010, the Katara Cultural Village Foundation is considered Doha's cultural hub, encompassing an openair amphitheatre, an opera house, a drama theatre and a series of well-frequented international restaurants.

Katara presents a varied range of regular performances and exhibitions by international and local artists, orchestras, and opera and theatre companies. Katara is home to the Doha Film Institute year-round offices and many Qatari associations; as well, several important visual and performing arts organisations have their offices in Katara.

Giffoni Film Festival



The Giffoni Film Festival is one of the most relevant international cultural events for youth. Named after the town in the south of Italy where it originated, it was launched in 1971 by then 18-year-old Claudio Gubitosi, and has made

its mark internationally thanks to its unique ability to select and present the best in films for young people. Giffoni's main focus is making children and young adults, who attend from 50 countries worldwide, the protagonists of the event by providing them with the opportunity to sit on the juries that decide the festival's winners. The event has developed over the years, becoming a truly global experience for children, youth and their families. Capable of attracting celebrities and industry professionals from around the world, Giffoni is now a comprehensive, year-long cultural event that is exported worldwide.

Festival Overview



Ajyal Competition

The stars of our festival are our young Ajyal Jury. From ages 8 to 25, they form the juries of the Ajyal Competition and select the festival's ultimate award winners. By providing young people access to acclaimed international cinema and renowned filmmakers, Ajyal helps them develop their understanding of the world around them and grow into confident and mindful global citizens. The Ajyal Competition inspires creative thinking, cooperation and selfexpression—leading to friendships that will last a lifetime.

Ajyal Jury

The Ajyal Competition Jury is divided into three sections by age group. The three juries are:



Mohaq

Mohaq means 'New Moon' in Arabic, and these are Ajyal's youngest jurors, aged 8 to 12. They will get to watch one programme of inspiring short films as well as four captivating featurelength films.



Hilal

Ajyal's jurors aged 13 to 17 make up the Hilal jury, which means 'Crescent Moon' in Arabic. Four compelling feature films and one programme of fascinating shorts make up this jury's film selection.

Bader

The most mature of Ajyal's juries, Bader—Arabic for 'Full Moon'—jurors are aged 18 to 25 and will select their favourite films from five thoughtprovoking features and two programmes of engaging short films.

Awards

Each of the three Ajyal Juries awards a Best Film prize to their favourite short and featurelength films, for a total of six awards. The directors of the winning films are granted funding toward their next film, so jurors are empowered to support and promote future content that is relevant and meaningful to them. Our youngest audiences will vote for their favourite film in the Bariq short film programme. A jury of regional industry professionals will decide the Best Film in the 'Made in Qatar' presented by Ooredoo section. While the general public will determine our Ajyal Audience Award.

Special Screenings & Events

In addition to our incredible selection of films for this year's Ajyal Competition, we are once again delighted to host an array of special screenings and events at the festival.

Msheireb is home to Ajyal's Creativity Hub, including our ever-popular events such as Geekdom, the multimedia art exhibit 'We Will Not Leave' and Ajyal Tunes.

Always a crowd-favourite, the Ajyal Drive-in Cinema experience returns to Lusail with something for everyone on this year's programme—from classic family favourites to our terrifying midnight screenings. Ajyal also returns to VOX Cinemas, Doha Festival City, with an exciting selection of internationally award-winning features and compelling short programmes for audiences to enjoy.

In partnership with the Translation and Interpreting Institute of the College of Humanities and Social Sciences at Hamad Bin Khalifa University, we are delighted to bring our popular inclusive experience back to the silver screen at Katara with a DFI supported film, Oualid Mouaness' critically acclaimed '1982'.



A Hero

Iran, France / Farsi / 2021 127 mins / Colour



Rahim finds himself in jail for incurring a business debt he is unable to repay. While on a two-day leave, his girlfriend offers him a gilded opportunity to secure his freedom, albeit at a dubiously immoral price. Unable to balance the weight of his newly ill-gotten gold coins with his conscience, Rahim does the ethical thing and attempts to find their rightful owner by putting up posters around town. But no good deed goes unpunished, and he soon finds himself caught up in a quagmire of increasingly complex moral dilemmas—all stemming from a single, seemingly inconsequential falsehood.

Thrust into the limelight as social media's latest celebrity, Rahim quickly finds expectations and responsibilities building around him, higher than the walls of his medium-security jail ever were. Confronted at every turn, our hero's journey is certainly not the archetypal, obvious circle. While it may appear a simple story on the surface, the twists of fate unfold to create a rich tapestry of human (mis)behaviour and deep philosophical quandaries. His other directorial credits include 'Fireworks Wednesday' (2006), 'About Elly' (2009), 'The Past' (2013), and 'Everybody Knows' (2018).

Sheila Vand Head of the Jury

Sheila Vand is an actress and artist who has appeared in numerous award-winning films such as 'The Rental' (2021), 'We the Animals' (2018), 'A Girl Walks Home Alone at Night' (2014), and the Academy Award-winning 'Argo' (2012). Sheila can currently be seen as the lead of internationally-acclaimed artist Shirin Neshat's feature film 'Land of Dreams', which premiered at the 2021 Venice Film Festival, and is showing at this year's Ajyal. Sheila has served on juries of the Sundance Film Festival and the Vimeo Film Festival.



Ahmed Al Baker

'From Dream to Reality' was the title of Ahmed Al Baker's TED speech back in 2010, in which he spoke about changing his career from oil and gas to the Film industry. Now, a decade later, Ahmed has worked on two science-fiction shows-"The Pact' and 'Medinah'as a showrunner and produced several feature films, shorts, documentaries, and TV programmes. Since 2011, Mr Al Baker has served as a Film and TV Specialist for Katara Cultural Village. Mr Al Baker is also currently serving as Executive Board Member and CEO at Katara Studios.




Farah Nabulsi

Farah Nabulsi is an Academy Award-nominated and BAFTA Award-winning Palestinian British filmmaker. In 2016 she started working in the film industry as a writer and producer of short fiction films, including 'Today They Took My Son', which screened at the United Nations. 'The Present', her directorial debut, which she co-wrote and produced, premiered at Clermont-Ferrand International Short Film Festival 2020 and won the coveted Audience Award for Best Film. It went on to win over 40 International Film Festival Jury and Audience Awards, a BAFTA Award and an Oscar Nomination. Farah has been invited to serve as a jury member at numerous festivals and is a member of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences.

And Then They Burn the Sea

Doha Film Institute Supported Film Qatar / Arabic / 2021 13 mins / Colour Middle East Premiere



Qatar's first-ever short to be selected in competition at Locarno Film Festival, 'And Then They Burn the Sea' is an elegiac contemplation on familial memory and loss. Filmmaker Majid Al-Remaihi ruminates on the experience of witnessing his mother's gradual and terminal memory loss over the course of many years. Weaving a personal family archive, reenacted dreams and rituals, the film underlines the promise of cinema as a medium for memories even at their most irretrievable.

Majid Al-Remaihi is a filmmaker and film programmer from Doha, Qatar. His short film 'And Then They Burn the Sea' premiered at Locarno 2021. He produced it under the mentorship of Academy Award-nominated director Rithy Panh and with the support of the Qatari Film Fund. Currently, he is developing his next short film. He is also part of the Film Programming team at the Doha Film Institute.

Atlal (Remnants) Qatar / Arabic / 2021

11 mins / Colour World Premiere



'Atlal (Remnants)' is a fictional documentary that follows Bassam, a Palestinian man in his fifties, on a journey between the past and present. An abandoned school, the remains of a beach club, and a dusty cinema hold Bassam's cherished memories from his life in Qatar. Through personal archives and interviews with Bassam and his wife, Laila, we get a deeper look into their stories—slowly revealing the dismaying thoughts behind Bassam's nostalgia.

Tony El Ghazal is a Lebanese director and filmmaker. He has directed several narrative short films, both fiction and non-fiction. His films centre around stories from the Arab world that are universal in their appeal. Tony graduated from Northwestern University in Qatar, where he was awarded two Studio 20Q grants to direct his newest short films, 'Bayt El Omor' (2020) & 'lbn El Ballad' (2021).

Balkees Al-Jaafari is an Iraqi filmmaker and director. She has previously worked on-set as a producer, sound recordist, director, script supervisor, and editor. Al-Jaafari is well versed in screenplays and scripts revolving around non-fiction narratives and issues that occur in the Middle East.

Border

Doha Film Institute Supported Film Qatar / English, Arabic / 2021 12 mins / Colour World Premiere



Mohammed attempts to travel through a border to see his family, but first, he must navigate the new world's rules and regulations. Despite his best efforts in following the complex system, his passage is not an easy one. At every turn, he faces institutionalised apathy and ever-increasing suspicion about his previous whereabouts and future intentions. In a world where we are all colour codes and faceless judgement seems to turn into prejudice easily.

Khalifa Al Thani is a Qatari filmmaker, curator and visual artist. He has worked on a variety of projects, ranging from films to exhibitions. His work focuses on the interdisciplinary exploration of Qatari and identity themes. He has directed, wrote, and produced several films, most notably 'A Tale of a Song' with Al Jazeera Documentary. Al Thani ventured into curatorial works with 'Outbreak', which took place during the Ajyal Film Festival 2020. He attained a BFA in Film and Video from the School of Visual Arts in New York City and is currently a part of the Doha Film Institute.

Don't Get Too Comfortable

Doha Film Institute Supported Film Yemen, USA, Netherlands, Qatar, UAE / English, Swahili, Arabic / 2021 9 mins / Colour Middle East Premiere



Nominated for an Orizzonti Award for Best Short Film at this year's Venice Film Festival, 'Don't Get Too Comfortable' is a heartfelt, introspective letter to the filmmaker's deceased grandfather. The letter questions the continuous pattern of movement amongst Yemenis in diaspora. The film fuses archival photographs, sourced footage, parallax animation, and abstract videos to create an audio-visual body of work that calls attention to the collective feeling of statelessness and sense of being felt by Yemeni (or non-Yemeni) migrants.

Shaima Al-Tamimi is a Yemeni-East African visual storyteller based in the GCC. Her work explores migration, identity, and culinary culture through introspection and a deeply-rooted documentary approach. Using photography, film, audio and writing as mediums, she merges historical and family archives with present-day portraits and visuals to create vivid narratives. Challenging mainstream and linear notions of identity, her work offers unique perspectives and calls for a more nuanced understanding of native experiences. Previous projects include the 2020 global "Prints for Yemen" fundraiser and 'Voices from the Urbanscape' (2017).

Fever Dream

Doha Film Institute Supported Film Qatar, Poland, USA / English / 2021 8 mins / Colour World Premiere



Created in DFI's Short Documentary Lab with Rithy Panh, 'Fever Dream' is a documentary about a reality that is stranger than fiction. Sick with the coronavirus, a couple films themselves in a Qatari quarantine facility—a 20th-floor suite in a fivestar hotel with a sea view and sealed windows. From this gilded (and hermetically sealed) cage, the pair look down on the live stream of cars and people below them. Suspended between realities, they pretend to participate in the passing of time as everyone's fate hangs in the balance.

Ania Hendryx Wójtowicz is a Polish/American creative producer and artist whose work emphasises cultural hybridity, blurring the lines between genres and exploring the intersections of film with other creative fields. She has produced multimedia performance installation artworks for the British Council exhibition 'The Place I Call Home' (2019), Qatar Foundation, and Kuwait Pavilion at the Venice Biennale (2016). Since 2015, Ania has worked with DFI, playing a key role in producing nearly 40 shorts and organising the Qumra Shorts film industry programme.

A Lens Under Water Qatar / Arabic / 2021 17 mins / Colour

World Premiere



Passionate about photography since his childhood in Syria, Faisal Jarkas now spends his time capturing the immense beauty of Qatar's coastal waters and the colourful marine life that call it home. Always in a buoyant mood, Faisal shares his best footage from years of dedicated work, for which he was honoured by the Ministry of the Environment in 2021. A short documentary bursting with life and an important environmental message.

Fatma Zahra Abderrahim is a journalist, a voice-over artist, and an emerging documentary filmmaker from Algeria. She is also a recent alumna of the journalism program at the Doha Institute for Graduate Studies. Her filmography includes 'A Lens Under Water' (2021), which she produced, directed, photographed and edited; 'Al Battulah' (2021) (DOP and editor); as well as 'Fann Al Nahma' about Qatar's traditional sea chants, where she contributed as a cinematographer (2021).

Olayan

Doha Film Institute Supported Film Qatar / Arabic / 2021 18 mins / Colour Home Premiere



A Bedouin boy named Hamad forms a strong bond with a newborn camel, who he calls Olayan. When Olayan is later sold to market by his father, young Hamad embarks on a daring mission to rescue his best friend. Set in 1990s Qatar, 'Olayan' is a moving portrait of a young boy on the cusp of adolescence. The film tenderly captures the nuanced relationship between father and son as Hamad begins to establish his sense of self and independence.

Khalifa Al-Marri is a visual artist and filmmaker who has made several contributions to the fine arts community in Qatar. Al-Marri holds a degree in communications from Qatar University and a diploma in directing from NYFA. His debut short film, 'Man of the House', premiered at Ajyal in 2015 and received multiple awards on the festival circuit. His short entitled 'Fragile' participated in DFI's exchange with La Fémis workshop in Paris. Khalifa recently completed an experimental short film called 'Embodiment' before writing and directing 'Olayan', which was produced through DFI's Qatari Film Fund. **There Were People** 'Kan Fe Nas' / Qatar, Lebanon / Arabic / 2021 10 mins / Colour World Premiere



Filmed in the aftermath of the tragic explosion that rocked the city of Beirut last August, There Were People' explores the authentic stories of Lebanese residents as they endure hardships on a daily basis. The insightful and poignant short documentary questions how individuals can stay so resilient in the face of such immense adversity.

Mohamed Al Hamadi is a TV presenter and filmmaker with a particular interest in humanistic and cultural themes. His career began in 2010 at Qatar Television, followed by presenting roles at various local radio stations. He graduated from the Faculty of Law at Qatar University in 2021. Virtual Voice

Doha Film Institute Supported Film Sudan, Qatar / English / 2021 7 mins / Colour MENA Premiere



In this satirical review of our times, Suzi doll is an ego-warrior. An online avatar marching to the algorithms of social media. She is lit by temporary outrage. A trending indignation. A passion that is fashion. A politics of the popular. She copies and pastes and forwards blame. Sometimes uplifting, sometimes bandwagon bullying. Her activism is abstract. Her help is hypothetical. We know many girls like Suzi, and many times we are her—vacuous virtual voices, echoing injustices.

Suzannah Mirghani is a writer, researcher, and independent filmmaker. Mixed-race Sudanese and Russian, she is interested in stories about the complexity of identity. Suzannah is the writer, director, and producer of 'Al-Sit' (2020), which won 18 international awards, including three Academy Award qualifying prizes in 2021: Best of Fest at LA Shorts; Grand Prix at Tampere Film Festival; and Best Short Film at BronzeLens. Her latest short, 'Virtual Voice' (2021), had its World Premiere at Tribeca Film Festival. Suzannah is working on her first feature, 'Cotton Queen', a magical realist tale set in the cotton fields of Sudan.

When Beirut was Beirut

Qatar, Lebanon, USA / Arabic / 2021 12 mins / Colour MENA Premiere



This poetic hybrid documentary introduces us to three majestic, abandoned buildings that witnessed Beirut's tumultuous history—coming to life through a casual conversation amongst themselves. His feature debut 'The Fall from Heaven' premiered at the Antalya Film Festival, where it won Best Film and was later screened at more than 15 festivals and won 10 awards. He also created "Eski Köye Yeni Adet" for FOX as a TV movie, but the film was later released in cinemas around Turkey.

Yusuf and his best friend Memo are pupils at a boarding school for Kurdish boys, secluded in the mountains of Eastern Anatolia. When Memo falls mysteriously ill, Yusuf is forced to struggle through the bureaucratic obstacles put up by the school's repressive authorities to try to help his friend. But by the time the adults in charge finally understand the seriousness of Memo's condition and try to get him to the hospital, the school has been buried under a sudden, heavy snowfall. With no way out, teachers and pupils engage in a blame game where grudges and hidden secrets emerge—as time ticks mercilessly by and threatens to run out.

Through Yusuf's story, the film sets out to examine corrupt systems and the cycles of abuse often found within them. The children are the heroes of the narrative, symbols of purity, innocence and, most importantly, hope. By contrast, it is the metaphor of a boarding school run with an iron fist and unyielding bureaucracy that is used to deftly illustrate the callous nature of corrupt institutions that all too often shirk the responsibilities entrusted to them. Beautifully shot and with a compellingly layered plot, 'Brother's Keeper' is a harrowing coming-of-age story with profound undertones. Captains of Zaatari

After fleeing the war in Syria, best friends Mahmoud and Fawzi have spent the last five years in Jordan's Za'atari refugee camp. Though they both have little sense of what the future may hold for them, they focus their energy on their shared love—soccer. Despite the dire circumstances in the camp, the pair practice day in and day out, firmly believing that playing professional football is their ticket to freedom and a brighter future. When Aspire Academy, one of the world's leading sports academies, arrives to pick players for an international tournament in Qatar, the friends seize their chance.

The visiting scouts quickly identify Mahmoud as a promising talent and fly him to Doha, while Fawzi has an anxious delay due to a selection technicality. Reunited, the friends train hard for the most important day of their burgeoning careers—a televised match that will be watched by their families back in Za'atari thanks to a hastily erected satellite dish. A profoundly authentic and human story, 'Captains of Zaatari' highlights the real struggles faced by people uprooted and displaced by conflict. As Mahmoud himself succinctly proclaims at the post-match press conference, refugees don't need pity; they need opportunities.

Fighter

South Korea / Korean / 2020 103 mins / Colour MENA Premiere



After a courageous escape from North Korea, Jina spends some time in a social inclusion facility in the south before moving to a small studio in Seoul. Free from the regime that controlled every aspect of her life, she takes the first tentative steps towards independence by taking a job as a cleaner. Money she desperately needs in order to rescue her father, who is still trapped in the north. While working at a local gym, she notices female boxers as they train. Awakening a fighting spirit inside her, Jina decides to enter the ring and compete. However, as any first-generation immigrant can attest, Jina's fight is not confined to the ring.

At every corner, she faces challenges from isolation and discrimination to trouble gaining employment, potential exploitation, and the persistent culture shock of living in a modern capitalist economy. Burdened by a sense of abandonment and displacement born of her mother's desertion when she was only twelve, Jina finds herself battling internally as well as externally. Seong-mi Lim, who portrays Jina, gives an award-winning performance in this confronting drama about a refugee's fight for freedom where few seem to be in her corner. School of Hope

In the vast expanse of desert, East of Atlas Mountains in Morocco, seasonal rain and snow once supported livestock, but now the drought seems to never end. Hardly a blade of grass can be seen, and families travel miles on foot to get water from a muddy hole in the ground. Yet the children willingly ride donkeys and bicycles or walk for miles across rocks to a "school of hope" built of clay. Following both the students and the teachers in the Oulad Boukais Tribe's community school for over three years, 'School of Hope' shows students Mohamed, Miloud, Fatima, and their classmates, responding with childish glee to the school's altruistic young teacher, Mohamed.

Each child faces individual obstacles—supporting their ageing parents; avoiding restrictions from relatives based on traditional gender roles—while their young teacher makes do in a house with no electricity or water. The Oulad Boukais Tribe is just one of many rural communities worldwide struggling to establish adequate schooling for their children. 'School of Hope' conveys the passion and commitment of the tribe in securing academic opportunities for their children, despite the roadblocks of their environment and the apparent indifference of their government in this intimate and charming portrait of optimism in the harshest of conditions.

Don't Get Too Comfortable

Doha Film Institute Supported Film Yemen, USA, Netherlands, Qatar, UAE / English, Swahili, Arabic / 2021 9 mins / Colour Middle East Premiere



Nominated for an Orizzonti Award for Best Short Film at this year's Venice Film Festival, 'Don't Get Too Comfortable' is a heartfelt, introspective letter to the filmmaker's deceased grandfather. The letter questions the continuous pattern of movement amongst Yemenis in diaspora. The film fuses archival photographs, sourced footage, parallax animation, and abstract videos to create an audio-visual body of work that calls attention to the collective feeling of statelessness and sense of being felt by Yemeni (or non-Yemeni) migrants.

Challenging mainstream and linear notions of identity, her work offers unique perspectives and calls for a more nuanced understanding of native experiences. Previous projects include the 2020 global "Prints for Yemen" fundraiser and 'Voices from the Urbanscape' (2017).

Night

Based on the true story of a mother the filmmaker met in Palestine, 'Night' is a haunting and superbly crafted stop-animation about war, bereavement, and unimaginable sorrow. But in a city devastated by bombings, it can be difficult to sleep, let alone dream. To ease a women's anguish, Night tricks her into seeing her missing child one last time.

Dear Future Children

With global protests on the rise, 'Dear Future Children' is a film about the new generation at the heart of this seismic political shift. The intimate documentary follows three activists—Rayen protests for social justice in Chile, Pepper fights for democracy in Hong Kong and Hilda battles the devastating consequences of climate change in Uganda. Facing almost impossible odds and grappling with the staggering impact of their activism on their lives, the film captures all the energy, anger, and ingenuity of these inspirational young women as they struggle to create a brighter future for themselves and the world.

Focussing on three strong female protagonists for a welcome change, 'Dear Future Children' examines a side of activism that is usually ignored by mainstream media and traditional ecopolitical documentary filmmaking. The audience is transported to the frontline of each of their respective causes, where we learn just as much about the activists themselves as the movement they belong to. A timely and important film about the power of the individual in addressing some of the world's most pressing issues and the psychological sacrifice they must make in their personal lives to help society as a whole. When a magic trick goes terribly awry at a children's birthday party, the autocratic father of an impoverished family is turned abruptly into a chicken. This ludicrous event causes an avalanche of coincidental absurdities to befall everyone else. The dutiful mother, whose mundane life was dedicated to her husband and children, is now thrust to the forefront as head of the new, unusual household and primary breadwinner for her family. While trying everything to bring her husband back and secure their financial survival, she undergoes a considerable transformation of her own.

Even as a chicken, her husband seems to be demanding as ever, and you get the impression that this henpecking behaviour started long before he became poultry. Treated with darkly humorous absurdity, the film uses its farcical premise to highlight more profound issues of gender and wealth inequality that many households in Egypt face. The wife's place in the family has fundamentally changed, and she will do everything to protect her newfound liberation in this brilliantly composed comedic satire of patriarchy. Filmmaker Omar El Zohairy made history with this film by winning the Grand Prize at Critics' Week in Cannes this year, becoming the first Egyptian film to win in this segment of the festival.

Little Palestine, Diary of a Siege

Doha Film Institute Supported Film Lebanon, France, Qatar / Arabic / 2021 89 mins / Colour Middle East Premiere



The district of Yarmouk in Damascus, Syria, sheltered the largest Palestinian refugee camp in the world from 1957 to 2018. When the Syrian revolution broke out, Bashar Al-Assad's regime saw Yarmouk as a refuge of rebels and resistance, besieging the camp from 2013 onwards. Gradually deprived of food, medicine and electricity, Yarmouk was cut off from the rest of the world. Filmmaker Abdallah Al-Khatib was born in Yarmouk, living there until his expulsion by Daesh in 2015. Between 2011 and 2015, he documented the besieged inhabitants' daily lives, who chose to face bombing, displacement and hunger with rallying, study, music, love and joy.

Countless lives were irremediably transformed by the war and siege—from Abdallah's mother, who became a nurse taking care of the elders of the camp, to the fiercest activists whose passion for Palestine became gradually undermined by hunger. Al-Khatib accompanies each increasingly heartbreaking scene with his odic and often incisive view of the situation. Indeed, 'Little Palestine' can be difficult watch to watch at times because of the deeply affecting subject matter—but a rewarding and poignant experience, one that speaks truth to power and is a testament to the resilience of the beleaguered people of Yarmouk. Enis and Izo are two friends living in the picturesque Old Town area of Sarajevo. Running similar restaurants across from each other, they don't seem overly concerned that they are business competitors. On the contrary, Enis wants Izo to join him in his latest venture. But as Izo warns-if you do business with friends, you either mess up the business or you mess up the friendship. One day, everything changes for the pair when a seemingly harmless courtesy thrusts Izo and his now-famous "Cevapi"-a grilled dish of minced meat-into the national spotlight.

Izo does not welcome the increased attention or even the extra business. He's far more concerned about the pandemic and having time to spend with his daughter and potential new grandkids to chase newfound success or wealth. Enis does not share his same worldview, already drowning in debt and used to flashy cars, he borrows the money for his new business from some unscrupulous gangsters. What follows is a deadpan series of comedic misunderstandings that leaves the whole town in turmoil and wondering who does have the best Cevapi in Sarajevo?

Writing with Fire

Amid a crowded, patriarchal news landscape emerges India's only newspaper run by Dalit (low caste) women. Chief Reporter Meera and her journalists break traditions, be it on the frontlines of India's biggest issues or within the confines of their homes, redefining what it means to be powerful. Following Meera and her journalists' personal and rapidly changing professional worlds, we see them negotiate obstacles and inch closer to their dream of becoming a relevant independent news agency. But how will Meera re-wire the traditional mindsets of a society that has never experienced the power of a Dalit woman with a smartphone?

'Writing With Fire' is a story of our times with modern Dalit women taking centre stage, not as victims of their circumstances but as writers of their own destiny. India now stands at an important crossroads, and the choices made now will define the very future of a nation. As powerful witnesses, Meera and her team diligently interpret and report on this decisive moment in India's history. In bringing together these different but deeply connected layers, the film stays close to its characters while exploring a country's deep, complex wounds and how women like Meera are treating these wounds-with compassion and persistence.





Over the years, he has been involved in influential motion pictures such as 'The China Syndrome' (1979) and 'Traffic' (2000), as well as popular films including 'Romancing the Stone' (1984), 'Fatal Attraction' (1987), 'Basic Instinct' (1992), 'Behind the Candelabra' (2013) and 'Wall Street' (1987) for which he won an Academy Award for Best Actor. He is currently shooting his third 'Ant Man' feature film for Marvel Studios.

In 1998, Douglas was made a United Nations Messenger of Peace by Kofi Annan. His main concentrations are nuclear non-proliferation and the control of small arms. He was the recipient of the 2009 AFI Lifetime Achievement as well as the Producers Guild Award that same year. In 2011 Douglas was awarded the 'Chevalier de Arts et des Lettres' in France by Frederick Mitterand and was awarded a second French Cesar for Career Achievement in 2016, becoming the only American to be given this honour twice.




Mark Mangini



In 'Costa Brava, Lebanon', the free-spirited Badri family escape the overwhelming pollution and social unrest of Beirut by seeking refuge in a utopic mountain home they built for themselves. Unexpectedly, an illegal garbage landfill begins construction right next door, and with it comes the very trash and corruption they were seeking to escape. As the landfill rises, so do family tensions. The Badris are left with a choice—stay off the grid or leave their idyllic home and face the reality they fled, hoping to stay true to their ideals.

Nadine Labaki, whose film 'Capernaum' screened at Ajyal 2018, brilliantly plays Souraya—a well-known singer and activist who toured the world with her music. Her husband, Walid (Saleh Bakri), leads the family to nature and a simpler way of life, but not without sacrifice. The family's escapist fantasy soon begins to unravel, and the external threat to their home dredges up old internal rifts and yearnings that were merely buried by their self-imposed isolation. A confident and compelling feature debut by Mounia Akl, backed by stellar performances, the film is a thoroughly enjoyable family drama and clever political parable all in one.

Land of Dreams

Simin is an Iranian woman on a journey to discover what it means to be a free American. She works for the Census Bureau, which, in an effort to control its citizens, has begun a programme to record their dreams. Unaware of this devious plot, Simin is torn between her compassion for those whose dreams she is recording and a truth she must find within. Haunted by the fact that her father was executed in Iran, Simin has developed a coping mechanism through a world of fantasy and playacting. She captures her interviewees' dreams, secretly impersonates them in Farsi and publishes them on social media, where she finds a growing Iranian audience.

Soon Simin meets Mark; a drifter, a free soul, and a poet who declares his love for her at first sight; and Alan, a cynical cowboy turned detective, full of machismo and the American spirit of adventure. As Simin enters the triad, she finds the two men's competition and conflicts amusing and silently enjoys the ride. Playful and poignant, 'Land of Dreams' acknowledges in a surreal and satirical way, the greatness of the American experiment while offering a warning beacon for what could come.
