I believe + a sentence using the present tense

It seems to me that + a sentence using the present tense

In my opinion + a sentence using the present tense

intermediate phrases

This is just my opinion, but I think (or believe)...

I am not very familiar with this topic, but my first thought on this topic is...

advanced phrases:

I am convinced that...

I feel absolutely certain that ABC is better than XYX

I am quite certain about my opinion regarding LMNOP

an introductory clause plus one of the basic phrases above:

Some people may disagree with me, but I think...

My own preference is to favor EFG, so I believe...

Justifying Opinions in English

basic phrases

because...

the reason is...

the reason I believe that is...

the facts suggest...

the evidence shows...

intermediate phrases

The first reason I believe this is...

The main reason I feel this way is...

There are several reasons I believe this. The first is...

more advanced English phrases

I don't have any special reason for believing this. It just seems right to me.

I could be wrong as I have no special reason for believing this. I just feel this is right.

When you are certain, try one of these phrases:

There is a lot of evidence to support my point of view. For example...

There are many facts in favor of my opinion. One such fact is...
