OUR COVER ARTIST



Timothy Cummings, represented by Catharine Clark Gallery in San Francisco and Nancy Hoffman Gallery in New York, journeyed to a French Quarter pied-àterre over-looking Armstrong Park in the Fall of 2017 as part of a My Good Judy Residency. The My Good Judy Foundation provides residencies for artists seeking to produce a body of work or performance in New Orleans that address culture making from an

LGBTQ perspective. The residency was established to also honor the work of author and activist Judy Grahn. The subjects of

Cummings' work are often children and adolescents struggling with issues of sexuality and sexual orientation in an adult world. In 2013, he was an artist-in-residence and subject of a solo exhibition at Transarte in Sao Paulo, Brazil. His paintings are also part of the collections of Rufus Wainwright, Whoopi Goldberg, and Tomaso Bracco and Sara Davis in Milan, Italy.

We're excited that Timothy will be creating an original cover for the 2020 Tennessee Williams/New Orleans Literary Festival. He enjoyed his time in New Orleans, where he received inspiration from the spirits of his favorite writers Tennessee Williams and Truman Capote. "They shaped my early adolescence. They offer a magical telling of the spirit of this place. The darkness and humor of life and the queer Southern aesthetic shows up in my work as well. Williams' "garrulous grotesque," replacing the bleak mundane of the world with a lush queer poetic eye for the shadows is part of my focus," Cummings said. He resides in a tiny house in Corrales, New Mexico.



MEMOIR MASTER CLASS WITH JUDY GRAHN

Foremother Dr. Judy Grahn is internationally known as a poet, activist and cultural theorist. Her writings have fueled cultural movements since 1965 and include *A Woman Is Talking To Death* (considered by many to be her masterpiece), *The Common Woman Poems* (foundational to the

development of cultural feminism), Another Mother Tongue (first published gay cultural research, early in the canon of creative nonfiction), Blood, Bread, and Roses (a new origin story), and most recently Hanging On Our Own Bones, described as "Contemporary Lamentations in Nine Parts." Always a community-based artist, Grahn's award-winning memoir, A Simple Revolution: The Making of an Activist Poet, took on the task of interviewing countless collaborators as she sought to recount the untold social movement histories interwoven



with her own. In this memoir-writing workshop, Grahn teaches how to bypass your inner critic, how to access deep memories and turn them into stories. She focuses on how to work with difficult subjects and enjoy making meaning out of your unique life experiences.

STROLL BACK INTO HISTORY...

The house was built in 1826 by architect François Correjolles for a wealthy auctioneer by the name of Joseph Le Carpentier. In 1833 the house was sold to John Ami Merle who later became the Swiss Consul to New Orleans. His wife, Anais Merle designed the House's first parterre garden. General



Pierre Gustav Toutant Beauregard rented the home with his two sons upon his return from the Civil War in late 1865.

The last resident of the B-K House, was the author Frances Parkinson Keyes. In the "Authors Note" of her book, Madame Castel's Lodger, she gives her own account of how she became fortuitously involved with the Beauregard House.

"My original tenancy of Beauregard House was apparently a happy accident. I stumbled on it when I was searching for temporary headquarters and nothing seemed available. But I have long since ceased to believe that such occurrences are accidental; I am convinced that they are part of a pattern in which a power higher than ours has had a Hand."



With the help of the architect Sam Wilson, Mrs. Keyes undertook the restoration of the House and established the Keyes Foundation which has maintained the House as a museum since her death in 1970.



Historic House and Garden Tours

Tour of 1826 raised cottage and surrounding gardens in the heart of the French Quarter. A grand example of Federal Style, the house features both Creole and American influences and is filled with period furniture and decor.

Franklin Abbott is a poet, musician, and psychotherapist who lives in Atlanta. He is an original radical faerie and founded the Atlanta Queer Literary Festival. He is author of *Mortal Love* and *Pink Zinnia*, and editor of three anthologies on men and masculinity, including *Boyhood: Growing Up Male*. His papers are archived in the Gender and Sexuality Collection at Georgia

State University. His latest project is *Don't Go Back To Sleep*, 44 poems and 14 original songs. He is a frequent contributor to *Atlanta INtown*, *Khabar*, and *RFD*.



Dorothy Allison is the author of *Bastard Out of Carolina*, a finalist for the 1992 National Book Award, and *Cavedweller*, a national bestseller and a *New York Times* Notable Book of the Year, as well as a collection of short fiction, *Trash*. Her short stories have appeared in *The Best American Short Stories* and *The Best of the South*. A novel, *She Who*, is forthcoming from

Viking Penguin.



Before **Eric Andrews-Katz** moved to Seattle in 1994 nothing much happened. Since then he has authored the "Agent Buck 98" spy-series (*The Jesus Injection* and *Balls & Chain*), and the award-winning *Tartarus* (all from Bold Strokes Books). His work can also be found in several anthologies including *Best Gay Love Stories 2015*, and the Saints & Sinners Anthologies

(2014 & 2015).



Christian Baines has written on travel, theatre, film, television, and various aspects of gay life, factual and fictional. Some of his stranger thoughts have spawned novels, including queer urban fantasy series *The Arcadia Trust*, the horror novella *Skin*, and *Puppet Boy*, which was a finalist for the 2016 Saints and Sinners Emerging Writer Award. Born in Australia, he now

travels the world whenever possible, living, writing, and shivering in Toronto, Canada on those odd occasions he can't find his passport.



Leona Beasley is a writer and a Southern lesbo warrior king. She writes about eccentric, funny, and often queer characters from the South. Her debut book *Something Better than Home* was a 2018 Lambda Literary Award finalist in Lesbian Fiction and depicts the life of a young lesbian coming of age and coming out in the 1970's South.



Blanche McCrary Boyd is an American novelist, journalist, essayist, and the Roman S. and Tatiana Weller Professor of English and Writer-in-Residence at Connecticut College. She is the author of five novels and a collection of autobiographical journalism, *The Redneck Way of Knowledge*. Her newest novel, *Tomb of the Unknown Racist* (2018), completes The Blacklock

Trilogy, which also includes *The Revolution of Little Girls* and *Terminal Velocity*.



Rob Byrnes is the Lambda Literary Award-winning author of six novels, including *When the Stars Come Out, The Night We Met*, and the Grant Lambert/Chase LaMarca series of crime capers. His work has been included in several anthologies, including *Equality: What Do You Think When You Think Of Equality?, Best Gay Romance 2014*, and *Men of the Mean Streets*. Gay Books. His newest book, Shadow Puppet, sixth in the Dan Sharp series, is an imagined account of eight serial killings that rocked Toronto's gay community from 2010-2017.



Steven Sanchez is the author of *Phantom Tongue* (Sundress Publications, 2018), selected by Mark Doty as the winner of Marsh Hawk Press's Rochelle Ratner Memorial Award. He is also the author of two chapbooks: *To My Body* (Glass Poetry Press, 2016) and *Photographs of Our Shadows* (Agape Editions, 2017). A CantoMundo Fellow and Lambda Literary Fellow, his

poems have appeared in *Poet Lore, Nimrod, Muzzle, Crab Creek Review,* and other publications.



Richard Schneider Jr., editor, is the founder and editor-inchief of *The Gay & Lesbian Review Worldwide*, having launched the magazine in 1994 as *The Harvard Gay & Lesbian Review* (the name changed in 2000). 
"Bayou Diaries". His first book, Lot, is forthcoming from Riverhead in March.

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Empowering awareness of visual and queer arts through the work of John Burton Harter

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

Backed to the Wall, Self-Portrait, 1977




