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Introduction

This course will introduce the methods of micro-econometrics and cover the topics in development economics. The goals of this course are (1) to get the sense of applied micro-econometrics and (2) to understand the frontier of the each topic in development economics. The main targets of this course are students who want to be researchers, but other students, for example, those who want to be policymakers, business/NGO leaders, or data scientists, are also welcome.
