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Ex-PM Cameron in, Suella Braverman out in U.K. Cabinet rejig

Returning from Deepavali celebrations in his hometown of Southampton, U.K. Prime Minister Rishi Sunak kicked off the week by reshuffling his Cabinet on Monday morning, sacking controversial Home Secretary Suella Braverman and resurrecting the political career of former U.K. Prime Minister David Cameron, whom he appointed Foreign Secretary. Former (outgoing) Foreign Secretary James Cleverly was appointed Home Secretary.

Ms. Braverman's history of provocative statements, including her latest allegations of bias in the Metropolitan Police over their handling of pro-Palestinian protests, which she referred to as "hate marches", had increased pressure on Mr. Sunak to fire her.

Monday's moves, which were reminiscent of the political chaos last year, when the country saw three Prime Ministers in the span of a few months, continued well into the afternoon with Tory divisions playing out live on media as appointments and departures continued to be announced.

Mr. Cameron was made 'Lord Cameron', a life peer (member of the House of Lords) on Monday.

Retail inflation eases to a four-month low of 4.87% in October

Vegetable price rise decelerates to 2.7%; overall consumer food price inflation remains unchanged; inflation faced by rural consumers is 5.1%

India's retail inflation pace eased to a four-month low of 4.87% in October from a tad over 5% in September, with the rise in vegetables prices easing to 2.7% from 3.4%, though overall consumer food price inflation remained virtually unchanged at 6.6%.

While base effects from last October, when retail prices surged 6.8%, helped cool the headline inflation rate, some deceleration was also seen in prices of non-food items such as services, clothing and footwear as well as fuel and light.

der price cuts, fuel and light costs dropped 0.4% from last October's levels.

Rural, urban inflation

Inflation faced by rural consumers eased from 5.33% in September to 5.1%, but urban households saw a fractional in-

crease in inflation at 4.65%. On a month-on-month basis, consumer prices were up 0.65%, while food prices were up 1.06%, with urban food prices rising 1.14%.

Nine dead in a fire in Hyderabad building

Nine people were killed in a massive fire in a four-storey residential building at Nampally in Hyderabad on Monday morning. Fire Department officials suspect that sparks from bursting of firecrackers could have led to the fire.

Fire and rescue services personnel were pressed into service after a distress call was received at the fire control room at 9.34 a.m., stating that sparks were

coming from the still level of Balaji Residence in the Bazaar Guard area, which has 16 flats.

"The firefighters rescued 21 persons in the building. Three were found unconscious and one had burns. Preliminary probe revealed that the local people were bursting crackers till 2 a.m. on Monday," said Y. Nagi Reddy, Director-General of Telangana State Fire Department.

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Cracker ban violation sparks AAP-BJP war of words

Delhi Environment Minister Gopal Rai alleges firecrackers transported into city from neighbouring Uttar Pradesh, Haryana; claims Opposition leaders instigated people to flout ban; BJP says 'all lies'

Delhi Environment Minister Gopal Rai on Monday alleged that air pollution levels in the national capital shot up as Bharatiya Janata Party leaders instigated residents to burn firecrackers, which were transported into the city from BJP-ruled Haryana and Uttar Pradesh for Deepavali.

Reacting to it, the BJP said the ruling Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) in Delhi "should stop peddling lies" and speak up against stubble burning in Punjab, where the party is in power.

Mr. Rai's statement came as city residents woke up to toxic haze after the ban on crackers was flouted on Deepavali night.

Delhi has been grappling with high pollution levels for over a fortnight now, with stubble burning from neighbouring States being the main contributor, according to the Commission on Air Quality Management data.

AAP has been flayed for failing to put an end to the practice of crop residue burning in Punjab, a State which had faced repeated criticism from the party for farm fires when it was ruled by the Congress.

However, the Delhi Environment Minister said the Capital would not have suffered from high pollution after Deepavali had some individuals, including pol-

ice personnel from Uttar Pradesh and Haryana, not permitted the transportation of firecrackers into the city.

"Many citizens were following the apex court ban, but BJP leaders instigated them to burst crackers brought from Uttar Pradesh and Haryana," he said without taking any names.

'Curbs to continue'

He said the pollution control measures imposed under Stage 4 of the Graded Response Action Plan (GRAP) will continue till further orders.

A call on the implementation of the odd-even vehicle-rationing scheme will be taken only after the air quality reaches the 'severe' category, he said.


A reading between zero and 50 on the AQI is considered 'good', 51 and 100 'satisfactory', 101 and 200 'moderate', 201 and 300 'poor', 301 and 400 'very

poor', and 401 and 500 'severe'.

Leader of the Opposition in the Delhi Assembly Ramvir Singh Bidhuri, said residents are paying for the lackadaisical attitude of the ruling AAP. "The ban on crackers was notified by the Delhi government late. Till then, vendors had a long window to sell crackers," he alleged.

Moreover, the Delhi government did not take any steps to enforce the ban, he said. "Gopal Rai should tell how many government teams toured the Capital and sought police help to conduct raids?" the senior BJP leader said.

Delhi BJP chief Virendra Sachdeva said the government should make an all-weather plan to tackle pollution. "For the past month, Delhi is facing the brunt of pollution, but Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal is silent on stubble burning in Punjab," he said.

As fireworks light up night sky, air pollution spikes to 120 times WHO limit

As residents celebrated Deepavali by bursting firecrackers late into Sunday night, data from the Delhi Pollution Control Committee (DPCC) showed that pollution levels in some parts of the city were nearly 120 times the prescribed limit of the World Health Organization (WHO).

As per DPCC data, the level of the key pollutant PM2.5 – particulate matter that is 2.5 microns or less in diameter – at Patparganj as of 1 a.m. on Monday was 1,856 micrograms per cubic metre. This is about 123 times the WHO's permissible limit of 15 micrograms per cubic metre for 24 hours.

At Dwarka, the PM2.5 level was 1,396 micrograms per cubic metre as of 1 a.m. – almost 93 times the WHO limit.

Problem worsens

Violation of the Supreme Court's order against bursting firecrackers on Deepavali, followed by a spike in air pollution the next day, is a regular occur-

'Why raise concerns only during Hindu festivals?'

As several Resident Welfare Associations attempted to dissuade people from bursting crackers, many were seen defying the prohibition.

Shaswat, a resident of Defence Colony, said that Deepavali is the biggest festival of Hindus and "the government and Supreme Court cannot ban the celebrations".

"Why are environmental concerns raised only when it is a Hindu festival and not when people from other religions celebrate their

festivals?" he said, adding that the Delhi government should instead focus on long-term solutions as "citizens will not curtail their celebrations". Some residents insisted that the crackers were not for them but for their children.

However, the bursting of crackers drew complaints from many other residents who observed the ban. Kalkaji resident Shreya Verma said, "Because of some people who do not care about the environment, others have to suffer by inhaling toxic air. People forget that there are other ways to celebrate too."

ence in Delhi. The daily Central Pollution Control Board bulletin showed that the Air Quality Index (AQI) reading for Monday, as measured at 4 p.m., was in the "very poor" category at 358 as against 218 on Sunday.

This was higher than last year's post-Deepavali AQI count of 302. In the last few years, this reading has been dangerously high – 302 in 2022, 462 in 2021, 435 in 2020, 368 in 2019, 390 in 2018, 403 in 2017, and 445 in 2016.

Several studies have linked air pollution with cognitive impairment, said Vijay Hadda. SHIV KUMAR PUSHPAKAR

The condition of many people with existing respiratory issues worsens every time air pollution spikes in the city, said Vijay Hadda, additional professor of Pulmonary Medicine at AIIMS, Delhi. Dr. Hadda told *The Hindu* that he would not stay here during October-November, if given a choice. Edited excerpts:

How does air pollution affect health?

Data from multiple studies

ma, or ILDs [interstitial lung diseases].

There are studies which show that air pollution also increases the chances of a heart attack. Name any organ, it is affected by air pollution.

What have you observed in patients over the years?

During months when air pollution levels are very high, we see an increase of over 10% in the number of patients who come with respiratory problems.

The number of people coming with severe symptoms is also higher compared to the rest of the year.

How is a person affected when the air quality

turns 'severe'?

For any person, including babies and children, it is equivalent to smoking at least 10 cigarettes a day.

What precautions would you suggest?

Avoid exercising early in the morning and late in the evening. Try to use N95 masks. Air purifiers are also helpful.

Would you advise your patients to move out of Delhi during these months?

If somebody can afford to do it, [then] absolutely. But most patients cannot afford that. Given a choice, I wouldn't stay in Delhi.

A former member of the Delhi Commission for Protection of Child Rights (DCPCR) has alleged that the inquiry into the "misuse" of funds by the panel has been ordered under the BJP pressure.

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CBI plea to register FIR against Jain is a mockery of law: AAP

The Central Bureau of Investigation's (CBI) plea to Lieutenant-Governor V.K. Saxena seeking sanction to file an FIR against former Delhi Minister Satyendar Jain "is nothing but a mockery of the law", the Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) said in a statement on Monday.

The probe agency has sought sanction from the L-G to file an FIR against Mr. Jain, who has been in judicial custody since May 2022, and former Director-General of Prisons Sandeep Goel for alleged extortion from high-profile prisoners, including Sukesh Chandrashekar.

In response, AAP said, "The CBI has sought the L-G's permission to conduct an inquiry against Satyendar Jain and others based only on the statement of Sukesh Chandrashekar, the biggest thug and conman of India." The party added that it categorically denies

"any association, communication, let alone any money transaction between Mr. Jain and Sukesh Chandrashekar or any of his associates".

Another request

The CBI has also sought to initiate an inquiry against a jail superintendent, according to sources. When reached for comment, the CBI did not confirm or deny the development.

The alleged conman has been charged with duping several people of ₹200 crore, including the spouse of former Ranbaxy promoter Shivinder Mohan Singh.

Trinamool leader shot dead; houses of CPI(M) supporters set on fire

Locals present at the crime scene nab two miscreants; kin say supporters of Left party behind the murder; violence erupts in South 24 Parganas; police taking help of CID to investigate incident

Violence erupted at Joynagar in West Bengal's South 24 Parganas after a local Trinamool Congress (TMC) leader was murdered in the early hours of Monday.

Saifuddin Laskar was shot dead when he was going to offer prayers at a local mosque. Several houses of supporters of the Communist Party of India (Marxist) [CPI(M)] were set on fire after the murder.

Miscreants on two motorcycles shot the Baman-gachi 'anchal' (zonal) president of the TMC from close range. Locals present at the scene of the crime caught the two miscreants.

deceased said that supporters of the CPI(M) were behind the murder.

Within hours of the murder, several houses of CPI (M) supporters were set on fire. Angry villagers said that Trinamool supporters did not allow firefighters to enter the habitations, loot

the BJP.

CPI(M) central committee member Sujan Chakraborty said that violence was the result of factionalism. "Everyone is aware that in Trinamool, there is a fight for the share. The party won all the 23 seats at the local panchayat polls and yet they are using the incident as an opportunity to target CPI(M) supporters," Mr. Chakraborty said.

Probe in progress

Siddhi Nath Gupta, Additional Director-General of Police, South Bengal, visited the violence-hit village and said that the help of the Criminal Investigation Department (CID) was being taken and that the investigation into the case was at an early stage.

Higher noise level recorded in Mumbai this Deepavali: NGO

Noise levels during Deepavali celebrations in several parts of Mumbai exceeded readings of last year, and firecrackers were burst beyond the 10 p.m. deadline set by the courts, an NGO specialising in noise pollution awareness said on Monday. The maximum noise level recorded in Mumbai during celebrations this year was 117 decibels, up from the top reading of 109.1 decibels last year, Awaaz Foundation said. The decibel levels peaked between 82 and 117 at Marine Drive at 9.55 p.m., the NGO said. PTI

Gujarat man, son stabbed to death over bursting crackers

A man and his 18-year-old son were killed, while his nephew was injured in an attack by a group of people over bursting of firecrackers during Deepavali festivities in Ahmedabad city, police said on Monday. The incident occurred around 10 p.m. on Sunday. The accused fatally stabbed Vijay Shankar Banshilal, 44, a driver, and his son Dharendra Singh. One of the accused has been arrested while efforts are on to nab others. PTI

Man dies after neighbour hurls cracker at him in U.P.

A 35-year-old man died in Ghaziabad's Jhandapur on Deepavali after a neighbour injured him by throwing a firecracker at him, the police said on Monday.

An officer said the incident was reported around 11 p.m. on Sunday, after which a team reached the hospital where the victim, Afzal alias Natu, was admitted. The team discovered that he died on arrival due to heavy blood loss after rupturing a vein.

A case has been filed under IPC Section 304 (culpable homicide not amounting to murder) and teams have been formed to nab the accused Pradeep, whose friends and relatives are being questioned on his whereabouts, he added.

CCTV footage of the incident shared widely on social media showed that Pradeep was among a group of men bursting crackers in the area and he threw one at Afzal on seeing him pass by.

Bhaskar Verma, Sahibabad Deputy Superintendent of Police, said, "Pradeep and Afzal were acquaintances and the death of the latter was an unfortunate accident."

They were migrant labourers belonging to Bihar and Jharkhand, respectively."

Tensions rise in Shinde faction as old warhorses square off over candidature for LS seat

Fissures within the ruling Eknath Shinde-led Shiv Sena faction emerged after two of its senior-most leaders — former Maharashtra Minister Ramdas Kadam and sitting MP Gajanan Kirtikar — fought it out over the candidature of the Mumbai North-West Lok Sabha constituency ahead of next year's election.

Mr. Kadam has accused the 80-year-old Mr. Kirtikar of nepotism and "betraying" the Shinde faction. Incidentally, Mr.

Kirtikar's son, Amol Kirtikar, has remained with the Uddhav Thackeray-led Sena (UBT) after the split.

Mr. Kirtikar, a former four-time legislator and a two-time MP from Mumbai North West, has in a press note, accused Mr. Kadam of anti-party activities in the past, while adding that the former Minister had "a history of betrayal".

"Ramdas Kadam has said I am betraying the party, but Kadam's history of betrayal is old and his list of anti-party activities is long," Mr. Kirtikar said in his press note.

The trigger for their verbal spar was Mr. Kirtikar's recent announcement in which he hinted that he might not be interested in contesting the Mumbai North-West seat. Mr. Kadam promptly said his son Siddhesh Kadam would be willing to contest if Mr. Kirtikar stepped down.

Condemning the note, Mr. Kadam said: "There is no basis to Mr. Kirtikar's allegations against me. He has grown too old. Perhaps, he needs a doctor. He can go to any lengths to defame a colleague, even after 33 years."

Kerala Lok Ayukta rejects plea alleging misuse of CMDRF

The Kerala Lok Ayukta on Monday dismissed a plea alleging that the previous LDF government led by Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan had misused the Chief Minister's Distress Relief Fund (CMDRF) to illegally gratify the next of kin of two late political allies and a deceased bodyguard of a departed ruling party leader. The anti-corruption body found the plea alleging favouritism and maladministration in the 2018 Cabinet decision "not maintainable". The three Upa Lok Ayukta justices passed a unanimous decision, though their separate judgments differed starkly on how they weighed the plea.

Five children drown in a pond in Kaimur district of Bihar

Five children on Monday drowned in a pond at Dhaupokhar village in Kaimur district of Bihar. The deceased have been identified as Annupriya (12), Anshu Priya (10), Apporva (9), Madhupriya (8) and Aman Kumar (11). Their bodies were recovered with the help of divers and sent to Bhabhua Sadar Hospital for the post-mortem. The incident took place under the Karamchat police station. Bhabhua Deputy Superintendent of Police (DSP) Shivshankar Kumar told *The Hindu* that all five children belonged to one family and they had gone to the pond to fish and bathe. Chief Minister Nitish Kumar has also expressed deep grief over the incident.

Amid raging Maratha quota stir, OBC leader Wadettiwar seeks increase in security

Mr. Wadettiwar's request comes in the wake of his sharp criticism of Maratha quota activist Manoj Jarange-Patil's demand that all members of the Maratha community be given Kunbi Other Backward Class (OBC) certificates.

Jarange-Patil flayed

An influential OBC leader from Vidarbha and the Congress's OBC face, Mr. Wadettiwar had recently censured Mr. Jarange-Patil by accusing the activist of seeking political mileage through his demand that the Eknath Shinde govern-

ment give Kunbi OBC certificates to all Marathas by December 24.

Like OBC leader and Nationalist Congress Party (NCP) (Ajit Pawar faction) Minister Chhagan Bhubal, Mr. Wadettiwar said the Maratha youth would not really benefit from being included in the OBC Kunbi category, and that granting Kunbi certificates to Marathas would also be unjust to the 372 sub-castes under the OBC category.

Central govt. will form task force to implement SC categorisation: Reddy

Clarifying the PM's recent announcement aimed at the Madiga community, Telangana BJP chief says panel will monitor daily progress in court, but won't look into whether categorisation is necessary

Prime Minister Narendra Modi's recent announcement of forming a fresh panel on the Scheduled Castes (SC) categorisation at the public meeting organised by the Madiga Reservation Porata Samithi (MRPS) will actually be a task force to follow up the issue legally in the Supreme Court, hold discussions with various stakeholders and ensure speedy implementation of the same, clarified Telangana BJP president and Union Minister G. Kishan Reddy.

30-year-old fight

The Madigas have been fighting for their proportional quota within the SC reservation for about three decades. Constituting around 60% of the SC population in Telangana, political analysts estimate them to be influential in 20-25 Assembly constituencies.

"The proposed task

force will not look into whether categorisation is necessary or not; it will monitor the daily progress of the case in the apex court. For the first time, the Central government has agreed to take up categorisation. Other political parties are making unnecessary comments about the constitution of another committee," he told presspersons on Monday.

Mr. Reddy said the Solicitor-General had moved

the Supreme Court over the issue last month and a seven-member Bench has been formed to look into SC categorisation.

Notices have been issued to all interested parties that filed petitions for and against to respond for hearing on December 14.

The Supreme Court had earlier given two judgments at variance with each other, he said.

Accusing the other political parties, including the

Congress, of dilly-dallying on the issue raging on for over three decades, he hailed the decision of Mr. Modi to come and address the MRPS meeting, lending his solidarity to the cause, and termed it "unprecedented".

'PM convinced'

"It is neither a meeting organised by the party nor a government function, yet the Prime Minister spoke to the community as he was convinced about their cause. The SC categorisation is for social harmony and not against anybody," the State BJP chief said.

Following MRPS founder Manda Krishna Madiga's meeting with Mr. Modi during his visit to Warangal in July, he and other intellectuals from the community were called for a meeting with Union Home Minister Amit Shah in New Delhi, upon which the Central government moved a petition in the Supreme Court to expedite the issue, he explained.

Baghel is kingpin of Mahadev app scam, says BJP

The Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) on Monday launched a sharp attack on Chhattisgarh Chief Minister Bhupesh Baghel and termed him the "kingpin" of the Mahadev betting app case, an issue that has often been mentioned by the party throughout the campaign for the Assembly election in the State.

Speaking during a press conference held in the BJP's national headquarters in New Delhi, party spokesperson Gaurav Bhatia said that the "kingpin of this entire 'gotala' (scam) is Bhupesh Baghel", adding that strict action will be taken against Mr. Baghel.

Forensic analysis

Mr. Bhatia alleged that the recent forensic analysis and statements made by a "cash courier" had led to startling revelations of money, up to ₹508 crore, reportedly being paid out to Mr. Baghel.

"It's known to everyone that a two and a half years' term formula was supposed to be implemented in Chhattisgarh. But after two and a half years, a corrupt Bhupesh Baghel conti-

dues to remain as the Chief Minister. It is because of him filling the Gandhi family's coffers with public money," the BJP leader said while attacking the Congress over the Mahadev app scam case.

'Voters will teach lesson'

"The BJP says 'Har Har Mahadev' (in praise of God Shiva) while Bhupesh Baghel says, 'Ghar Ghar Mahadev app'," he said.

"The people of Chhattisgarh have made up their mind to teach a lesson to a corrupt Baghel in these elections," Mr. Bhatia said.

Polling to the 90-member Chhattisgarh Assembly is being conducted in two phases, the first phase was completed on November 7 and the second will be held on Friday.

TDP-JSP comes up with 'mini manifesto' for 2024 A.P. election

The Telugu Desam Party (TDP) and Jana Sena Party (JSP) have come up with a draft mini manifesto consisting of 11 points at the first meeting of their six-member joint manifesto committee held at the TDP State office on Monday.

The mini manifesto is a combination of the TDP's 'super-six schemes' announced at its annual Mahanadu-2023 conclave, and five points suggested by the JSP on the basis of feedback received by party chief Pawan Kalyan in the course of his public interactions over the last four and a half years.

The committee comprised former Finance Minister Yanamala Ramakrishnu, MLC P. Ashok Babu, and national spokesman K. Pattabhi Ram from the TDP, and retired IAS officer D. Varaprasad, Mutta

Sasidhar, and Prof. K. Sarath Kumar from the JSP.

Briefing the media on the deliberations, Mr. Ramakrishnu said it was a preliminary meeting where the two parties discussed ways to turn Andhra Pradesh into a "progressive State devoid of socioeconomic inequalities and one that offers employment opportunities which the youth had been longing for".

Women welfare

The mini manifesto contains plans for the welfare and empowerment of women (*Mahasakthi*), creating jobs for the youth, giving a subsidy of ₹10 lakh on the cost of projects undertaken by MSMEs and start-up companies (*Sowbhagya Padham*), measures for solving the issues faced by farmers (*Annadaata*), and supplying drinking water to every household, among others.

Odisha Cong. ups pressure on BJD govt. for opening of Jagannath Ratna Bhandar

The Odisha Congress on Monday announced that it would conduct '*Tulasi Yatra*' (collection of holy basil) from December 1, stepping up pressure on the Naveen Patnaik government on opening the doors of the Ratna Bhandar (treasury) of the Jagannath Temple in Puri, in which precious jewellery donated to the deities in different periods have been stored.

The Biju Janata Dal (BJD) government is under huge pressure to open the Ratna Bhandar. The last inventory of jewellery and precious stones was carried out in 1978. The State government has shown a 'reluctance' to open the treasury of the temple.

"By the end of this month, holy basil will be collected from people from different walks of life.

Under the supervision of the district Congress president, basil will be brought to the party's State headquarters in Bhubaneswar.

Subsequently, State Congress leaders and cadre will proceed to offer it at the temple," said Sarat Pattanayak, president of the Odisha Pradesh Congress Committee, on Monday.

The State Congress had taken out massive protest rallies on October 16 in support of their six major

demands, including opening of four doors of the Jagannath Temple, inspection of the Ratna Bhandar, and return of the land acquired in Puri district for the Vedanta University.

The Shree Jagannath Temple Management Committee, the apex governing body of the temple, had recently decided to ask the Archaeological Survey of India to carry out an inspection of the Ratna Bhandar.

Vijayendra defends elevation as Karnataka BJP chief, but resentment brews against 'sonrise'

Facing simmering resentment from some quarters within the party, newly appointed chief of the Bharatiya Janata Party's Karnataka unit B.Y. Vijayendra on Monday sought to allay unease over his elevation, saying that the decision was taken by the national leadership "in the interest of the party".

The 47-year-old son of BJP veteran and former Chief Minister B.S. Yediyurappa was appointed to the post on November 10, and would formally take over on November 15.

The BJP, smarting from a humiliating Assembly poll defeat in Karnataka, is trying to script a comeback by stitching a Lingayat-Vokkaliga alliance, which in the

past has proved electorally formidable. The recent alliance with JD(S), with its Vokkaliga vote base, and anointing Mr. Vijayendra, son of Lingayat strongman Yediyurappa, as party chief fits this pattern.

The attempt at an alliance between the two landowning communities, which have dominated the State's politics for decades, is significant given that Siddaramaiah, an Ahinda (Kannada acronym for Minorities, OBCs, and Dalits combine) leader, is the Chief Minister and his deputy D.K. Shivakumar, a Vokkaliga, is vying for the top post.

As part of his courtesy meetings, Mr. Vijayendra called on H.D. Deve Gowda of the Janata Dal (Secular), which joined the BJP-led NDA in September, and

former CMs S.M. Krishna and Basavaraj Bommai "to seek their blessings".

Speaking to reporters after meeting Mr. Bommai at his residence, the first-time Shikarpura MLA said the senior BJP leader assured him that he would travel across Karnataka to campaign for the party under the leadership of the newly

anointed State chief for the Lok Sabha poll. He said the decision to name him the party chief in the State was taken by Prime Minister Narendra Modi, Union Home Minister Amit Shah, BJP national president J.P. Nadda and BJP general secretary (organisation) B.L. Santhosh. "I am in touch with all the senior leaders and

everybody is happy. It is unfair to draw any wrong conclusion," he added.

Voices of resentment

The elevation of Mr. Vijayendra, who replaced three-time Lok Sabha member from Dakshina Kannada Nalin Kumar Kateel, seems to have ruffled feathers within the party, especially among those opposed to his father.

While Mr. Vijayendra made his electoral debut in the 2023 Assembly poll, contesting from his father's seat, Shikaripura, he made a name for himself during Mr. Yediyurappa's last tenure as CM during 2019-2021, as an efficient election manager. He was made in-charge of three bypolls - K.R. Pet in Mandya (2019), Sira in Tumakuru (2020), and Maski in Raichur

(2021). He was credited for the party's victory in the first two, while the BJP lost in Maski. But, he also faced controversies and allegations of corruption. Corruption charges against him, some made by his own partymen, were cited as one of the reasons for the high command seeking the resignation of his father.

Those believed to be upset over his latest elevation include former national general secretary C.T. Ravi, a Vokkaliga leader who was seen as an aspirant for the post, former Ministers K.S. Eshwarappa and V. Somanna, and MLAs Arvind Bellad and Basangouda Patil Yatnal.

Speaking to reporters in Chikkamagaluru on Monday, Mr. Ravi, a vocal critic of Mr. Yediyurappa, said if the party did not give him

any responsibility, he would campaign for the BJP in his individual capacity.

Saying that he will not be attending Mr. Vijayendra's office-assuming ceremony on November 15 since he will be "busy with election work in Madhya Pradesh", Mr. Ravi added that he had never crossed the "Lakshman Rekha" of the party (party diktat).

"Whenever there were differences in the party, I did raise them within the party. I did not go to anybody else's house to point out my differences," he said.

More fallout

There are also widespread rumours that senior leader Somanna may jump ship to the Congress. While Mr. Somanna and Mr. Bellad had refused to comment when asked about the party's

choice, Mr. Eshwarappa, who was not very happy with Mr. Vijayendra's day-to-day "interference" in the governance affairs when Mr. Yediyurappa was the CM, has already made it clear that "it was not correct to assume that Vijayendra has assumed full leadership of the party". As far as Mr. Yatnal and Mr. Bellad are concerned, it is believed they both are eyeing the post of the Leader of Opposition (LoP) in the Assembly. Apparently, Mr. Vijayendra, hours after his elevation, had announced that the LoP will be elected at the BJP Legislature Party meeting on November 17.

With a lot at stake for many, more churn is expected within the BJP in the coming days, before it jumps headlong into the 2024 Lok Sabha election.

Will Owaisi deny his BJP links, asks Revanth

Flood banks will be built along Godavari river: KCR

Addressing a gathering at an election meeting at Burampadu in the Pinapaka Assembly constituency of Bhadrachalam district on Monday, Telangana Chief Minister and Bharat Rashtra Samithi (BRS) supremo K. Chandrashekhara Rao said, "Flood banks will be constructed along the Godavari river in Bhadrachalam at an estimated cost of ₹1,000 crore to fortify the flood protection system".

Mr. Rao said he had visited the flood-affected areas in Bhadrachalam and

Thanks to a major thrust on the development of healthcare infrastructure, every constituency now has a 100-bed State-run health facility, he said.

Taking a jibe at YSRTP president Y.S. Sharmila and the Telangana Congress party, Mr. Rao at a meeting in Narsampet of Warangal said, "They (Congress leaders) are hell bent on defeating the BRS using money power".

"Will you let their money power win against the welfare schemes of the BRS?" he asked the gathering. Mr. Rao called upon the people to vote with a purpose.

Battery-powered boats to glide over waterways of Srinagar next summer

The waterways that once led Mughal empresses from the city fort in Srinagar to the idyllic gardens – Shalimar and Nishat Bagh – at Zabarwan hills will soon return to their glory days. Battery-driven roofed boats are all set to be introduced on Dal Lake and Jhelum River by next summer. They will reach even the interiors of the city.

"We are all set to introduce water transport on the Dal lake and Jhelum river in Srinagar to decongest and offer an alternative mode of public transport. The process of approving boat samples is in its final stage. Two types of boats – eight-seaters and 20-seaters – will be introduced in the first phase by next year," Anuj Malhotra, general manager of planning, Srinagar Smart City Limited, told *The Hindu*.

Thirty-two boats will serve the lake and river, criss-crossing the old city with temples and shrines dotting the riverfront.

"It will be a zero pollu-

tion and affordable public transport," Mr. Malhotra said.

"It is in no way competition to the leisure rides of *shikaras*," he added.

Also planned are a cafeteria, public spaces, and shelters around the lake. According to the official plan, the new boats will use the traditional causeways to cover the five basins of the lake – Nehru Park, Nishat Bagh, Hazratbal, Nigeen, and Barari Nambal.

This will be the first time since the 1960s that the Dal lake's backwaters will be opened to visitors, especially the Dalgate-Rainawari-Hazratbal waterway. The process of identifying choked canals, the result of rapid urbanisation, is under way.

"We have already made the water canal access to the Shalimar garden navigable. Travellers could just get off in front of the Shalimar garden now," Mr. Malhotra said.

Public transport on the Dal lake is a part of the ₹980 crore Srinagar Smart City project.

'Centre delaying payment of dues to Kerala on technicalities'

Kerala Finance Minister K.N. Balagopal has said the Centre is delaying the payment of what is due to the State on flimsy grounds, citing technical reasons. The Centre owed the State a chunk of what it had already spent as well as its other dues. The denial of payments is a violation of the spirit of the Centre-State relationship, he said.

The State and the Centre are not locked in a slave-and-master relationship, the Minister said addressing a press confe-

rence in Kochi on Monday.

He acknowledged that the State had received some of the outstanding payments under various heads, including social welfare pensions, but pointed out that the present Finance Commission allocation rate had now dipped to 1.9% from the 2.5% and 3.9% previously. Even if the State was paid according to the 2.5% rate, it should get ₹8,000 to ₹9,000 crore extra, Mr. Balagopal added.

The Centre-State relationship was not just mired in financial issues, he claimed and pointed out

that there were political as well as administrative issues involved.

Mr. Balagopal slammed Union Minister of State for External Affairs V. Muraleedharan who had earlier

alleged that the Kerala government's financial problems were its own creations and that it was splurging money without exercising prudence.

"Mr. Muraleedharan is

trying to make a fool of the people of Kerala through his statements," the Finance Minister added.

'Baseless contention' Mr. Muraleedharan on Monday termed 'baseless' the Kerala government's contention that the Centre was primarily responsible for the State's financial problems.

Blaming extravagance and financial mismanagement by the Left Democratic Front (LDF) government for the financial crunch, Mr. Muraleedharan presented a set of statistics on Central transfers.

He added that the State had received funds in all eligible instances. However, funds may have been withheld in instances where the State had either failed to apply within the deadline or adhere to norms.

In the case of social security pensions, the Centre had transferred ₹604.14 crore as its share (widow, disability and old age pensions), including arrears, last month. The State was yet to file its application for the second installment, Mr. Muraleedharan said. (With inputs from Thiruvananthapuram)

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Growth dichotomy

Slowdown in industrial output growth shows low consumer confidence

In September, the Index of Industrial Production or IIP rose 5.8%, almost half the 14-month-high 10.3% growth in August. Most economists anticipated a 7% to 8% uptick in the month that marks the onset of India's packed festive calendar. September's factory output growth was the slowest in three months, but also marked a 2.4% drop in production levels compared to August. Manufacturing led the decline, with year-on-year growth dropping from 9.3% in August to 4.5% in September and production volumes declining 2% month-on-month. In August, just seven of 23 manufacturing sectors had clocked a contraction but that list expanded to nine in September, with furniture dropping 20% and apparel production almost 18%. What is more worrying is that 12 sectors recorded a sequential decline in output this September, belying hopes that firms would ramp up inventories in anticipation of festive spending. Producers' lack of confidence in consumers' impulses is reflected in consumer durables and non-durables, which were up just 1% and 2.7%, respectively, on top of a 5.5%-plus contraction last September. Sequentially, consumer non-durables, what one may broadly consider as fast moving consumer goods involving smaller-ticket spends, were down 3.5% with the lowest output levels seen since November 2022. Electricity generation also fell 6.6% sequentially in September, perhaps due to the higher rainfall recorded over August.

On the whole, September's IIP takes average factory output growth to 7.4% in the second quarter, lifting the uptick in the first half of 2023-24 to 6%. This may still weigh in well with the central bank chief's hopes of Q2 GDP growth outpacing their official projection of 6.5%. But spliced up, the IIP indicates an asymmetry in the economy and a fresh fork lies in the road ahead. Consumer goods' output was just 0.3% higher than pre-COVID-19 levels this September, with durables being the only use-based segment to record a contraction so far this year. By contrast, output has been more resilient in investment-linked sectors such as infrastructure/construction goods and capital goods, up 12.1% and 6.7%, respectively, this year. Public capex on infrastructure sectors has surely lifted output of items such as steel and cement through the first half of the year, while high inflation has eaten into all but the high-income consumers' propensity to spend. Going forward, capex spends that have been front-loaded this year may moderate and additional revenue spends ahead of the Lok Sabha election are likely, especially with sensitive commodities such as fuel, urea and food facing fresh volatility in prices. That infrastructure and construction goods' output in September was the lowest since March 2023, suggests one growth tide may be ebbing, which makes the other, more fragile consumption story even more critical to watch.

Knockout blows

India has so far played its part as the favourite in the cricket World Cup

The cricket World Cup finally enters its business end, having criss-crossed India since the first match involving England and New Zealand at Ahmedabad on October 5. In their backyard, Rohit Sharma's men have exuded a dominant aura, brushing aside opposition units, be it the fancied ones or the emerging outfits. Nine wins on the trot is a remarkable achievement. The Men in Blue have batted with elan, and bowled with zest; they rode smooth in all their contests to top the league phase with 18 points. Having won the World Cup in 1983 and 2011, India is eyeing a third tryst with glory. New Zealand is the hurdle in the semifinal at Mumbai on Wednesday. During the 2019 edition in England, India wilted against New Zealand in the semifinal. However, this time around, having defeated their doughty rivals at Dharamshala in the league stage, Indian cricketers believe that they can get past Kane Williamson's men. New Zealand qualified from a mid-table clutter involving Pakistan and Afghanistan, and has a new-generation star in prolific batter Rachin Ravindra. Always a team in which the whole is greater than the sum of the parts, New Zealand can be a tricky opposition and India, despite its current form, is aware of the knockout stage pitfalls. In the 2015 edition too, India lost in the semifinal.

Currently, Rohit's men are in such ominous form that even the absence of injured all-rounder Hardik Pandya has not affected their plans. Rohit, Virat Kohli, Shubman Gill, Shreyas Iyer and K.L. Rahul have prospered, while the bowling, helmed by Jasprit Bumrah, has run through startled opposition ranks. India, though, is yet to win an ICC title since the last triumph at the Champions Trophy in 2013. A 10-year drought needs to be addressed and there could be a shot at redemption when the dust settles at Ahmedabad's Narendra Modi Stadium after the final on November 19. South Africa and Australia, the other semifinalists, at different points have displayed form and fragility. Powered by Glenn Maxwell's unbeaten 201 against Afghanistan, Australia has the x-factor while South Africa has depth even if skipper Temba Bavuma's runs have dried up. That defending champion England and past powerhouses like Pakistan and Sri Lanka have crashed, is a pointer to the flux within cricket. Even as the host flourished, the most heartening story of this World Cup is the growth revealed by a pugnacious Afghanistan and to some extent, the Netherlands. To widen its footprints, the willow game needs these teams to evolve.

Enhancing representation, for a just electoral system

An Indian Member of Parliament (MP) is said to represent 2.5 million citizens, on average. In comparison, a U.S. House of Representatives member typically represents approximately 7,00,000 citizens. Similarly, in Pakistan, a member of the National Assembly is a representative of approximately 6,00,000 citizens, while the ratio in Bangladesh is closer to approximately 5,00,000 citizens. In this year so far, India had around 4,126 Members of the Legislative Assembly, 543 Lok Sabha MPs and 245 Rajya Sabha MPs. There are far too few parliamentarians/Assembly members responsible for citizen welfare in India. Limited representation, in a democratic setup, seems to be our default preference.

While India does have innumerable grassroots politicians, 1,000-plus municipal councils/corporations with between 50 to 100 wards and approximately 2,38,000 panchayats (according to Press Information Bureau data) with between five to 30 members on average at the national/State level, there is a clear deficit in terms of their adequate representation in order to raise critical issues and enable law-making.

Meanwhile, our political system is riven with malapportionment, with legislative weight being skewed towards the citizens of select States. Unlike India, the United States has a political system that seeks to engender malapportionment, with each State given two senators in the U.S. Senate, enabling a block on legislation. Disproportionate allocation of power is encouraged. This is easier in a homogeneous country with a bi-party political system, where the same parties compete across all States. In India, with its heterogeneous political system across States, malapportionment can mean empowering select political outfits over others. With a sense of a different political culture in south and north-east India growing, one must tread carefully.

On delimitation

Delimitation could be a potential solution to restore proportionality – it has been utilised in the past. The Commission was set up four times in the past as an independent body, to enable redistricting. In 1976, during the Emergency, the number of Lok Sabha seats was frozen, with delimitation pushed out to 2001, citing ongoing family planning policies, with a push to avoid punishing select States with effective population control measures in place.

Delimitation may have resumed when States had reduced their fertility rates, enabling parity. In February 2002, the 84th Amendment Act of the Constitution was introduced, which froze the number of Lok Sabha seats until the first Census after 2026 (i.e., 2031). With the 2021 Census delayed (now likely to be conducted in 2024, with

results potentially published by 2026), there is a window to conduct delimitation earlier. However, unleashing delimitation will have its consequences. Between 1971 and 2011, Rajasthan and Kerala, at 25 million and 21 million in population in 1971, respectively, have seen a widening to 68 million and 33 million, respectively. Similarly, in the 2019 elections, each MP from Uttar Pradesh represented approximately three million voters, while an MP from Lakshadweep represented about 55,000 voters. Assuming the number of parliamentary seats goes up to say 753 seats, States such as Tamil Nadu, Andhra Pradesh, Telangana and Kerala might see an increase in seats of about 6%, with Karnataka potentially seeing an 11% rise. Meanwhile, northern States such as Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Madhya Pradesh, and Rajasthan would see their seats rise by 63%. Delimitation, in its historical form, would engender a bias towards a Hindi-speaking northern population while enabling select national parties to rise to power. States which have performed well in reducing their population growth, such as Tamil Nadu and Kerala, may be punished. Delimitation is inevitable, but its deleterious consequences can be minimised. First, the number of seats in Parliament needs to increase significantly (at least around 848 seats to avoid any State losing seats), helping to enhance democratic representation ratios. Delimitation should not be driven only by factors based on population. Geographical determinism, economic productivity, linguistic history, and a sense of fairness should also play a part. In simpler terms, Sikkim's voice must also be heard in Parliament even if Bihar has a greater population. The fiscal impact of delimitation on future transfers to States will also need to be rethought.

Promoting federalism

Beyond this, our electoral system must be reformed. Federalism needs to be promoted (past decades of centralisation that have impacted Centre-State relations), and we need to give States a better voice and a platform to represent their interests.

The Rajya Sabha can play this role; however, it is currently elected by State legislatures, giving disproportionately more representation to larger/more populous States. Constitutional reform can be pursued to give each state the same number of Rajya Sabha MPs. At the same time, direct elections for Rajya Sabha MPs should be promoted while ensuring that a domicile requirement is added and stringently adhered to.

Proportional representation can also be considered, especially for the Lok Sabha and State Assembly elections. In Australia, lower-house elections have voters rank candidates on an alternative preference ballot – if a candidate does not win a majority of votes in

the first round, the weakest candidate is eliminated, with their votes redistributed to the next preferred candidate. This goes on until there is a clear majority behind a candidate. In France, a double ballot system is conducted for National Assembly elections; if no candidate wins in the first round, the second round sees only candidates with over 1/8th of total votes in the prior round competing. India's first-past-the-post system may ensure quicker election results. But still, it does ensure that a legislator often represents a constituency without a majority of votes.

Having more States

We need more States as well. The largest State (highest resident population) in the United States, California, has a population of just 39 million, with the average State having a population of about five to six million. Around 22 Indian States/Union Territories have a population higher than that. The States Reorganisation Commission was set up in 1953, creating nearly 14 linguistic States and six Union Territories. There is potential for India to have more States (moving up from 29 to say 50 or even 75 States); for example, a State such as Uttar Pradesh, is simply too big to be governed well as a single unit. A concern about North Indian or large States dominating the polity would be alleviated if we had more and smaller-sized States. A New State Reorganisation Commission may be set up after the next election to evaluate the socio-economic and administrative viability of select to-be States (for example, Bundelkhand, Gorkhland, Jammu, Karu Nadu, Kongu Nadu, Mithila, Saurashtra, Tulu Nadu and Vidarbha). We have enough linguistic States – States must be split up/redesigned to enhance administrative efficiency and democratic accountability.

India has 8,000-plus urban settlements, but the number of mayors remains in the low hundreds. Every Census town may have a fixed-tenure mayor elected in direct elections. Direct elections could enhance democratic representation while improving efficiency in urban governance. Such mayors must also be empowered, with decision-making ability over 18 critical functions – for example, urban planning, water supply, fire, land use regulations and slum improvement), as outlined by the Constitution (74th Amendment) Act. Select States such as Bihar and Rajasthan) must be pushed to loosen their grip on city-level authorities/functions.

Enhancing local democratic representation will help strengthen India's democracy. Such measures might help alleviate the concerns of citizens in varied parts of India and to enhance its democracy. Any child from the northeast or south of India could aspire to become a Prime Minister. One hopes our policymakers have the wisdom to ensure a just electoral system.

Remission of diabetes, desirable, but not essential

The concept of a reversal of diabetes has become very popular recently. Several commercial organisations have jumped on the bandwagon of a 'reversal of diabetes' and are making tall claims. Therefore, it is important to consider the pros and cons of a reversal of diabetes.

First, the term 'reversal' of diabetes is scientifically incorrect; the appropriate term is 'remission' of diabetes. Reversal implies that the condition has permanently reverted to normal and a cure has been achieved. 'Remission' implies that diabetes has only gone away temporarily. We know for instance that cancer can go into remission, but can come back in a more virulent form.

Remission and type 2 diabetes

Diabetes is not a single condition but consists of several types. When we talk of remission of diabetes, we are referring most often to type 2 diabetes. However, there are other forms of diabetes such as type 1 diabetes where long-term remission is very unlikely to occur.

Can everyone with type 2 achieve remission? Some diabetes reversal programmes claim that they can reverse type 2 diabetes at any stage of the disorder. This is not true.

There are certain individuals with type 2 diabetes who are more likely to achieve remission. This can be identified by the letters ABCDE. A refers to A1c (glycated haemoglobin) which should not be very high; B refers to Body Mass Index (BMI) or body weight. If it is high, you are more likely to achieve remission due to weight loss; C stands for C-Peptide, a measure of insulin secretion. If it is good, you can achieve

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remission more easily; D stands for Duration of diabetes; the shorter the duration, the greater the chances of remission; and E stands for an Enthusiastic individual who is keen to achieve remission.

One should remember that even if one achieves remission of diabetes only for a few months or years, it is still worthwhile because it leads to a good 'legacy effect' which provides protection from complications caused by diabetes.

What about those who cannot achieve remission? Should they be disheartened? Definitely not. Indeed, in my experience, the majority of people with type 2 diabetes would find it difficult to achieve long-term remission of their diabetes. Even among those who do so, in the majority of cases, diabetes returns after a few months; the severity of the diabetes is often much worse than when it was before the person went into remission.

Leading a long and healthy life

I would like to reassure people who do not achieve remission that nothing is lost. My experience over the last four to five decades has taught me that all that is needed to have a long and healthy life despite diabetes is to follow another set of ABCD-linked mantras: A: A1c or glycated haemoglobin should be below 7% (or if possible even below 6.5%); B: Blood Pressure should be less than 130/80 mm/Hg L or as appropriate for the age; C: Cholesterol (LDL cholesterol) should be less than 50 mg/dl or at least below 70mg/dL; D: Discipline which includes healthy diet, exercise and frequent check-ups with your diabetologist.

It may not be possible to make India 'diabetes free', but a 'diabetes complications-free India' is within reach

Realism, not machismo, to counter terror

There are animated discussions on social media on the Israel-Hamas conflict, with a large number of people sympathising with Israel, which suffered an unprecedented attack by Hamas on October 7. This is perhaps because India went through the trauma of the Mumbai attacks in 2008 (known as 26/11), among others. Opinion, however, became more strident when *The New York Times* columnist, Thomas Friedman, published an article last month praising former Prime Minister Manmohan Singh's "remarkable act of restraint" in not attacking Pakistan immediately after the Mumbai attacks. Some social media warriors were outraged, condemning India's past inaction as an act of cowardice. This is perhaps because India prides itself on its air strikes on Balakot in Pakistan in 2019 to avenge the Pulwama terror attack.



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world leaders condemned the attacks, and India was praised for being a "responsible nuclear power". The path-breaking India-U.S. Civil Nuclear agreement was operationalised just a month before the attacks in Mumbai. In addition, there was another issue. The global financial crisis had just hit, with the collapse of the Lehman Brothers. In India too, the stock market crashed by 41% between June and December. A war would have been disastrous.

Second, it is vital to frame an issue in terms of the prevailing international circumstances and how that can best be used to achieve one's own objectives. Delhi decided to ally itself with the 'war on terror', which was being fought across continents. The result of a war would have been not just finger-wagging from the international community, but also the loss of international money. Investors hate instability.

Pakistan's fortunes began to tumble soon after 26/11, furthered by an internal mess of its own making. The country, under General Pervez Musharraf, milked 9/11 for all it was worth: the U.S. military's aid rose exponentially during this period in order to enable Pakistan to fight Taliban and al Qaeda militants. Joe Biden, who was Senator, repeatedly called for reducing this aid in 2008. Real GDP growth crashed after 2008-09 and later recovered briefly, but it never recovered to previous growth rates. Foreign Direct Investment, which had risen in the 9/11 period, dropped by 42% by 2010, as Pakistan became identified with the 'war on terror'. The focus on Pakistan increased further when the United Nations designated the Lashkar-e-Tayyiba (LeT) as a terrorist organisation in 2010. In 2009, the U.S. Senate passed the revised version of the Kerry-Lugar Bill, which tripled U.S. non-military assistance to Pakistan worth \$400 million to \$1.5 billion annually for the next five years, with clauses that Pakistan considered offensive. For instance,

the bill said that Pakistan must show that it is "ceasing support" for terrorists and that it must prevent groups such as LeT from carrying out attacks on "neighbouring countries." Pakistan was furious. This narrative began to build as notable scholars such as Stephen Cohen began to call it "America's most dangerous ally". India was de-linked from Pakistan as it drew closer to the U.S., while Pakistan's future was evaluated entirely by its terrorist antics.

It can be argued that the collapse of present-day Pakistan is in part due to India's decision not to attack and instead craft an international response. Alongside, India created a path for a \$3 trillion economy, while Pakistan's economic fortunes continue to tumble. None of this might have happened if India had gone to war.

Showing strength

However, this does not reduce the vital importance of the air strikes on Balakot. Those were carried out when India's defence capability had vastly improved, its economy was strong, and it enjoyed a solid relationship with the U.S. The strikes were carefully calibrated to send a signal to Pakistan that its terrorism was not cost-free. Importantly, it freed Indians from a defensive mindset. Strong leadership matters. But strength can come from a deliberated move rather than the kind of chest-beating that Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu has adopted.

Finally, whether then or now, there is no question of having 'boots on the ground' given that India and Pakistan are nuclear powers. Pakistan can be punished, but without being invaded. Those calling for India to be as "decisive" as Israel miss the point. Mr. Netanyahu has just given Hamas the priceless gift of publicity; now, support for the Palestinian cause has swelled everywhere. The trick is to outwit a country, even as the threat of a slashing sword is seen to be ever-present.

As India showed after the 26/11 attacks, counter-terrorism can be carried out with due thought and realism, not raging machismo

A well-thought-out strategy But counter-terrorism is a delicate act; it is to be carried out with due thought and realism, not raging machismo, as India showed. First, terrorists strike in the hope of eliciting a response that will highlight their cause. Hamas attacked Israel when the Saudis and Israelis were on a path to peace, which would have led to the Palestinian cause taking a back seat. With Israel's violent response, the Palestinian issue has taken centre stage now. Let's assume that after 26/11, India had bombed major cities and cantonments in Pakistan. That would have led to a nuclear stand-off, with the international focus shifting to how to 'solve' the India-Pakistan issue, which centres around Kashmir, rather than terrorism itself.

Here is what happened by doing nothing. The gravity of the 26/11 attacks was equated to that of the 9/11 attacks in the U.S. Soon after the attacks, U.S. President George W. Bush sent a strong statement of support to India,

The BJP is reaching out to Yadavs using the Gaza war and Dalits through folklore

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On October 22, the ongoing Israel-Hamas conflict found political resonance in Uttar Pradesh when Sudarshan News, a pro-Hindutva channel known for its shrill and provocative programmes that have come under judicial scrutiny in the past, aired two episodes that drew parallels between Yadavs and Yahudis (Jewish people) and alluded to similarities between the lives of Moses and Lord Krishna.

Days later, while addressing an election rally in the Tijara constituency of Rajasthan where the Congress has fielded a Muslim candidate, Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath equated the Israel-Hamas war with the fight between the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) and the Congress.

In the programme titled 'Kya Yadav Hi Yahudi Hain (Are Yadavs Yahudis?)', the prime-time voice of Sudarshan News, Suresh Chavhanke, said most Yadavs affirmed the channel's "research", except the political ones because they needed Muslim votes. It was obvious that he was pointing to the leadership of the Samajwadi Party (SP), the principal opposition party, which managed to galvanise Yadavs and Muslims in the post-Mandal-era and emerged as a major player in Uttar Pradesh despite the Hindutva wave after the Ram Janmabhoomi movement.

The channel's clickbait hashtag 'YahudiYadavHai' is meant for the Yadavs, a backward agrarian group whose representation in police and other armed forces went up after reservation for Other

Backward Classes (OBCs) came into effect in the 1990s. It is intended to provide mythical links that give a sense of upliftment to the community in the social hierarchy and bring it under the Hindutva umbrella. It is interesting to note that despite the folk theory that lies at the core of the Yadav community, which says that all pastoral castes descended from the Yadu dynasty to which Lord Krishna belongs, the community hasn't shown any concerted interest in pushing the cause of the Krishna Janmabhoomi movement. A post-poll study conducted by the Centre for the Study of Developing Societies indicated that 83% of Yadavs voted for the SP in the 2022 Assembly polls.

Mr. Adityanath, who directed officials to take strict action against those spreading hatred over the Israel-Palestine conflict, showed little restraint while addressing the election rally in Rajasthan. Using some low-hanging metaphors, he said that a Taliban mindset could only be cured through Bajrangbali's (Lord Hanuman's) mace. Hailing Israel and accusing the Congress of Muslim appeasement, he added, "We are seeing how Israel is crushing the Taliban mindset in Gaza." At a time when the SP and the Congress are drumming up support for a caste census, the BJP seems to be repurposing the Israel-Hamas war and diluting the

opposition's cry for social justice. In its brand of social harmony, reason and intellect are often superseded by emotion.

Last month, while addressing Dalit conferences in constituencies where Scheduled Castes (SCs) form a sizeable number, Mr. Adityanath emphasised the Dalit origins of the poet Valmiki and the sage Ved Vyasa, who composed the Sanskrit texts of the Ramayana and Mahabharata, respectively, while talking about social cohesion in Hindu society. This came after the SP's non-Yadav face, Swami Prasad Maurya, repeatedly attacked Santana Dharma and the Ram-charitmanas by describing certain sections in the text as being 'anti-Dalit' and 'anti-women'. Moreover, the Nishad Party, a BJP ally which represents the politically influential boatmen community that considers Ved Vyasa as their ancestor, is invoking the community's role in the Ramayana and Mahabharata to demand a place of pride in the Hindu pantheon as well as reservation under the SC category.

This is a test case for the ruling party as the contentious issues of assimilation of all Hindus under Hindutva and the reassertion of caste identity overlap. The U.P. government has sanctioned a huge statue of Lord Rama embracing Nishadraj (the head of the riverine clan who helped Lord Rama cross the river during his exile) near Prayagraj, but the community, while appreciating the gesture, seems more keen on being accorded SC status. While the BJP is trying to woo Dalit votes, in March this year, citing data of the National Crime Records Bureau, the Centre told Parliament that of the 1,89,945 cases of crime registered against Dalits in India 2018 to 2021, the highest (49,613) were in U.P.

Madhya Pradesh in the bottom half of all State-level rankings

Poll-bound Madhya Pradesh lags behind most States in all economic and social indicators

The Madhya Pradesh Assembly elections are scheduled to take place on November 17. A comparison of the economic, social, and environmental indicators of the poll-bound State with the indicators of other States shows that Madhya Pradesh features at the bottom half. Also, its relative ranking among the States remained stagnant in most of the indicators between 2015-16 and 2019-21.

Table 1 lists Madhya Pradesh's rank in social indicators and its actual score in an indicator in 2019-21, 2015-16, and 2005-06. It also shows the change in rank in 2019-21 from 2015-16. The performance of the top three States in the indicator are also given for comparison. For instance, Madhya Pradesh had 35.7% stunted children (low height-for-age) in 2019-21, and ranked 25 out of 30 States. The three best-performing States that year were Kerala (23.4%), Punjab (24.5%), and Tamil Nadu (25%). In this indicator, Madhya Pradesh's ranking improved by just one spot in 2019-21 from 2015-16, the year when the State was placed 26th out of the 30 States.

Across most social indicators, there has been no notable improvement in the last few years. For instance, the share of girls/women who attended school was 64% in 2015-16 and improved to only 67.5% in 2019-21. Only those aged six and above were considered. The share of underweight children (low weight-for-age) improved marginally from 42.8% to 33%, while the infant mortality rate recorded a small improvement from 51.2 to 41.3. The State's ranking in the parameter of underweight children improved only by two spots (from 28 to 26), and in the parameter of infant mortality rate only by one spot (28 to 27),

among the 30 States considered.

In fact, a comparison with data from 2005-06 shows that the rankings have hardly improved since. In that period, Madhya Pradesh ranked at the bottom of the table in many social indicators. It no longer holds that dubious distinction. For instance, in 2005-06, the State ranked at the bottom of the list in the share of wasted children (weight-for-height) and underweight children. In 2005-06, only 28 States were considered for comparison; the data of Telangana and Andhra Pradesh were ignored.

Given the inferior social rankings, Madhya Pradesh's rank in the Human Development Index (HDI) remained poor in 1990 and 2021 as well. In 1990, its HDI ranking was 26 of 30 States; this slid to 27 in 2021. (**Table 2**).

Madhya Pradesh's economic performance is among the worst in the country. In fact, its ranking worsened between 1993-94 and 2021-22. In 1993-94, the State ranked 19 of 27 States in Per Capita Net State Domestic Product (current prices), as seen in **Table 3**. This declined by two spots in 2021-22. Notably, over half the population in the State belongs to the lowest two wealth quintiles (**Table 4**).

Madhya Pradesh's manufacturing sector employed around 7% of the State's workforce and the sector's share in total Gross Value Added was about 9%. The State ranks at the bottom half of the table in both measures (**Table 5**).

In educational indicators, in 2020, Madhya Pradesh ranked over 20 of the 30 States on indicators such as enrolment in elementary, higher secondary, and college-level education. The Gross Enrolment Ratio in higher education was only 21.5%. (**Table 6**).

While the State lags behind the country in terms of economic performance, it is better in environment-related indicators (**Table 7**). The State generated a relatively lower amount of hazardous and plastic waste and featured at the top half of the State lists.

FIFTY YEARS AGO NOVEMBER 14, 1973

Israelis defy U.N. forces' efforts to replace checkpoint

Cairo, Nov. 13: The Commander of the U.N. peace-keeping forces in West Asia flew to Tel Aviv to-day to meet Israeli officials on a growing crisis over highway checkpoints that threaten to break down the West Asia ceasefire. Maj. Gen. Ensis Siilvasvuo made the trip after an urgent early morning visit to the scene of a melee yesterday afternoon in which Israeli and Finnish troops engaged in a fist fight triggered by the Finns' attempt to replace an Israeli checkpoint on the Cairo-Suez highway with one of their own. A U.N. spokesman indicated that the Israelis had refused to give up their own checkpoint on the highway, despite the U.N. forces' attempt to replace them, as called for by the ceasefire agreement signed on Sunday by Egypt and Israel. Sources in both Egypt and Israel said the controversy over the road was blocking full implementation of the six-point ceasefire agreement and they predicted no progress until the controversy was settled. Earlier, in an effort to find a solution, Maj. Gen. Siilvasvuo, had met the Israeli Defence Minister, Gen. Moshe Dayan, near the Egyptian ceasefire lines. An Israeli officer said there was some pushing and shoving yesterday between the United Nations troops and Israeli soldiers who dismantled a U.N. checkpoint near Suez Town. An Israeli military communique said the checkpoint put up on the Cairo-Suez road, was taken down because it cut off Israeli forces from those west of Suez Town, which Israel claims its troops encircle. The incident, which came just after dusk last night, followed a refusal by the U.N. peacekeeping troops to reopen the road, the communique said.

A HUNDRED YEARS AGO NOVEMBER 14, 1923

The colour bar

Pretoria, Nov. 13: An important decision declaring the colour bar repugnant to the general law of the land was delivered at the Supreme Court arising from the application of the Attorney-General for a ruling in the case of a mine manager charged with contravening the mining regulations by permitting a native to take charge of a locomotive. 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Community rights and forest conservation

What is the Forest (Conservation) Amendment Act, 2023? What did the 31-member Joint Parliamentary Committee decide with respect to the amendment Bill tabled in Parliament? Why do the Central and State governments insist on the right to convert forest land for non-forest purposes?

The story so far:

The Forest Conservation Amendment Act of 2023 has received limited attention and little discussion about its impact on forests and its inhabitants. From the colonial forest law in 1865 to the Forest Conservation Amendment Act, 2023, more than fifteen laws, Acts, and policies have been formulated interlinking forests with legal and policy frameworks. However, there is little to no recognition of the rights of indigenous communities in these Acts, who are the rightful inhabitants of forest lands.

What is the new amendment?

At first glance, the amendment primarily aims to tackle the critical issues of climate change and deforestation's adverse effects, focusing on effective management and afforestation. The law further aims to determine how forests can be utilised for economic gain, and the manner in which it seeks to achieve this goal is outlined in the legislation. The primary method used to achieve this objective involves removing forests from the law's jurisdiction, thereby facilitating various forms of economic exploitation. As per the amendment, the forest law will now apply exclusively to areas categorised under the 1927 Forest Act and those designated as such on or after October 25, 1980. The Act will not be applicable to forests that were converted for non-forest use on or after December 12, 1996 and land which falls under 100 kilometres from the China and Pakistan border where the central government can build linear projects. To establish security infrastructure and facilities for surveillance, the central government is authorised to construct security measures in areas up to ten hectares. This provision also applies to areas (up to five hectares) which are designated as vulnerable. Within these regions, the government, with the necessary approvals, can implement security protocols as described above. Initiatives like ecotourism, safari, environmental entertainment, and more may be implemented in these areas. The main objective of these initiatives is to improve the livelihoods of those reliant on forest resources, a goal that has drawn criticism from tribal communities and human rights activists.

Why was the amendment brought in?

The *Godavarman Thirumulkpad* case, a prominent legal dispute that came before the Supreme Court in 1996, led to an interpretation of forest land in accordance with its 'dictionary meaning'. Subsequently, all private forests were brought under the ambit of the 1980 law. This has been a subject of debate as it was argued that the legislation primarily aims to restrict forest land from being used for various non-forest purposes, including the conversion of land for large-scale industries. The law has faced significant opposition, especially from private landowners, individuals, and organisations involved in forest conservation, for its perceived adverse impact on the country's industrial progress. In other words, the need to exclude forest land from the legal framework was mainly driven by the requirements of the industrial classes in the country. It is in this context that concerns regarding the Forest Conservation Act tend to resurface periodically, echoing the apprehensions

of indigenous communities and human rights activists. These factors came to the forefront again when the Forest (Conservation) Amendment Bill was introduced in Parliament in March, triggering extensive discussions and debates. The Parliament then referred the Bill to a 31-member Joint Parliamentary Committee (JPC).

What did the JPC recommend?

Of the 31-member JPC addressing the issue, only six individuals were from the opposition. The JPC submitted its report to Parliament on July 20, within three months. The critical comments from the committee members and public appear to have been largely disregarded; reduced to dissenting notes, holding a minority viewpoint on the Bill.

Therefore, the Bill successfully passed in both houses of Parliament without any substantial debates or discussions. There have been no collaborative discussions with the southern States concerning matters related to their specific geographical locations. A few days after the Act was enacted, the Odisha government revoked the "deemed forest" status in the State but had to later cancel the order due to public outrage and cited that it is waiting for detailed rules and guidelines from the concerned Central Ministry. If the government were to remove the forests from the purview of the Forest Conservation Act, it would effectively obstruct indigenous communities from asserting their rights.

What happened to the stipulation of 'prior consent'?

The Forest Conservation Act underwent important amendments in 2016 and 2017, which stipulated that prior consent from the tribal grama sabha was mandatory for any alterations to forests for non-forest purposes. However, the recent revisions to the legislation have removed the necessity for such consent. Nevertheless,

in this situation, State governments can proactively engage in specific activities within this framework through the inclusion of grama sabhas, particularly in matters of land acquisition for various purposes, by establishing State-level steering committees. But numerous State governments might hesitate on this aspect, as they hold a preconceived notion that Adivasi grama sabhas are "anti-development," and they fear that their decisions could hinder economically lucrative afforestation initiatives.

What is compensatory afforestation?

Compensatory afforestation, as outlined in the new legislation, encompasses various projects and schemes that can be undertaken by both private individuals and organisations (including large corporations) for afforestation or reforestation purposes. The Compensatory Afforestation Act encountered significant challenges in the past, primarily due to ambiguities in the original legislation and shortage of available land. The goal of the new amendment is to streamline the process. However, there is apprehension regarding the potential environmental implications of this amendment. The law mandates that for every parcel of land that is lost due to afforestation efforts, an equivalent amount of land must be afforested elsewhere. It does not specify the type of trees that should be planted, leaving room for discretion.

How does this affect the Forest Rights Act (FRA)?

The FRA has had notable impacts in various regions, such as the Mendha-Lekha in Maharashtra, Loyendi in Odisha, and Malakkappara in Kerala. Despite the initial enthusiasm, it appears that both the Central and State governments have become less enthusiastic about implementing the FRA in their States. Many consider the Act as

an impediment to convert forest land for non-forest purposes. The State government and its bureaucracy hold the view that granting community rights under the FRA could weaken the State's authority over the forest. They anticipate potential legal challenges to any such endeavours. To navigate this situation, the government has opted to reduce or dilute the extent of forest areas, rather than amend the FRA, thereby limiting the potential for additional Adivasi claims. The amendment also fails to address the growing issue of human-animal conflicts in forest areas, particularly in the Adivasi hamlets of the Western Ghats region. This conflict not only endangers the livelihoods of the Adivasis but also poses a threat to wildlife.

What are the problems?

When examined superficially, the law appears to address issues without complications. However, once the law is put into practice, it presents substantial challenges to forest dwelling communities and government agencies. The concept of afforestation, which offers considerable financial incentives to private individuals and institutions for afforestation projects, fundamentally clashes with the idea of forest governance. Furthermore, it contradicts the concept of decentralised forest governance as forests in the country fall under the concurrent list. Such governance practices are against the spirit of federal norms. Moreover, defining strategic linear projects becomes exceptionally complex and vague. Unlike external security threats like border disputes and cross-border skirmishes, internal environmental security should also be considered a significant concern, especially in States that consistently face natural disasters. Regrettably, this priority is not guaranteed.

Congress's online campaign more robust in Madhya Pradesh

As the State heads for the polls, the Lokniti-CSDS analysed social media posts on X by both major parties in the State to understand the kind of content online campaigns spread and generate

Madhya Pradesh has mostly been a Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP)-ruled State since 2003, with the Indian National Congress (INC) forming the government for a brief period between December 2018 to March 2020. As the State goes for elections on November 17 for all 230 assembly seats, social media has become an important platform for campaigning and garnering votes. The purpose of this study by the Lokniti-CSDS is to understand and contrast the kind of posts made in the run-up to the elections by the two major parties and their members.

Categorising posts

A total of 24 accounts were monitored, 12 from the BJP and 12 from the INC. These accounts included the handles of senior party leaders, Opposition party members, MLAs, party workers, State official accounts and party supporters. All the posts recorded were from the social media platform, X (formerly known as Twitter). The recorded posts were categorised as positive, negative, neutral, and mixed. The posts were categorised as positive if they were about the accomplishment of the party and negative if it included posts criticising the other party for their shortcomings. Neutral posts included general updates about visits and greetings. The mixed category had posts which were simultaneously commending the party and attacking the other party (Table 1).

The reach of the Congress

Out of the 1,000 posts recorded, 500 were by the INC and 500 were by the BJP. From the posts, it can be observed that the INC had a more robust social media presence in Madhya Pradesh as compared to what was observed by Lokniti in its studies in Rajasthan and Chhattisgarh. Around 34% of the total posts recorded were videos and 49% were photos.

One of the most active accounts overall was the party's official State account – @INCMP on X. Out of the total posts made by the account, 42% were negative, 42% were positive, and 15% were neutral. The online campaign of the @BJP4MP seems to be rather subdued and more focused on positive propaganda, which is in stark contrast to its vigorous approach in the States of Chhattisgarh and Rajasthan. The most active informants in the BJP sample in Madhya Pradesh were the Chief Minister's handle accounting for 33% of posts, senior party leaders (30%) followed by the official party account @BJP4MP (17%) and others. The party appears to be primarily focused on amplifying its schemes and achievements.

The top categories of INC's positive posts were about the manifesto, public speeches, poll results, and personal image. The positive posts about the manifesto included various schemes and decisions the INC will bring into fruition in the State if it is elected. The manifesto includes healthcare schemes, job opportunities, provisions for education, the Old Pension Scheme, distributing cylinders for ₹500, free 100 units of electricity and so forth. Among the most frequently used slogans by the party were

'Badhaiye Haath, Fir Kamal Nath' and 'Congress Ayegi, Khushali Layegi' (Table 2).

The negative posts by the INC were overwhelmingly about corruption in the State, misgovernance, and about internal strife within the party. The rampant corruption in the State was one of the major criticisms taken up by the INC against BJP. Such posts included allegations about the 50% commission taken by the Shivraj Singh Chouhan's administration, the Patwari recruitment scam, the midday meal scam, the mahakal lok scam, the sarva shiksha abhiyan scam etc (Table 3). Hashtags and slogans such as '#Shivraj_Ghotalaraj' and 'Madhya Pradesh Ne Thana Hai, Jungle Raj Hatana Hai' widely used by INC party accounts further focused upon the issue of corruption within the State.

The governance under BJP, or the lack thereof, was another case in point

highlighted by the INC in its social media campaign. The issues taken up by the party included a myriad of problems such as the delay in salaries for guest teachers and MGNREGA employees, inflation, farmers' concerns, unemployment etc.

A look at the bright side by the BJP

The BJP appears to have a different campaign strategy online. Out of the total positive posts made by the BJP, about 25% were about its achievements in governance. A lot of focus seems to be on central government schemes such as the PM Awas Yojana. Another 25% of tweets were party fanfare, with several video excerpts of roadshows, rallies and testimonials of the general public being posted frequently. In a strategy similar to the BJP in Chhattisgarh and Rajasthan, Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Union government schemes seemed to be the

anchor of the campaign. Almost 15% and 13% of the total positive posts were about him and central government schemes respectively (Table 4). Hashtags like '#MP_ke Mann Mein Modi', 'MPwithModiji' '#LadliBehna' and 'CorruptionNath' were trending on X.

Almost 8% of the tweets were about women and their empowerment. These tweets were almost always posted in the light of the MP government flagship scheme "Ladli Behna Yojana" which promises a monthly assistance of ₹1,250. There were mentions of several other schemes and policies for the welfare of women. The 2% of religious posts were mostly about the inauguration of the Ram Mandir, while 2% posts were about caste. Multiple posts featured PM Modi's statement in a rally in Sidhi wherein he said, "Poori congress mujhe gaali dekar poore OBC varg ka apmaan kar rahi hai" (Congress has insulted the entire OBC community by insulting me).

Almost 47% of the negative posts made by the BJP were predominantly attacks on the Congress party and its leadership on the grounds of misgovernance and shoddy politics. The allegations of corruption were featured in almost 21% of posts (Table 5). The BJP made multiple posts levelling corruption allegations, such as the *Karzamaafi Ghotala* to the tune of ₹3000 crore, *Jai Sansadhan Ghotala* and *Krishni Ghotala* among others. There were almost 13% posts on religion with a majority of the posts targeting the party for being 'anti-Sanatani'. The negative posts about caste were targeting the divisive politics of the INC.

More focus on women, religion, caste

There was an emphasis on women by both the INC and the BJP. This can be better understood in the light of the fact that the female voter base in Madhya Pradesh is a whopping 2.72 crore (48%) according to the 2018 Assembly Election figures.

The BJP made several posts regarding the welfare of women. The party amplified its Ladli Behna Yojana through its online campaign. In order to outdo this move by the Shivraj Singh-led administration, the INC has promised to provide a monthly aid worth ₹1,500 to women as a part of its larger blueprint for empowering women in the State. Despite this the BJP has given tickets to only 25 female candidates whereas the Congress has given tickets to 30 women, which is less than 15% of the total seats.


Additionally, both parties have made significant number of posts criticising each other by highlighting the internal strife within the parties. There have been multiple instances wherein party workers on both sides protested against candidature and senior party members. One of the most notable cases is that of Jabalpur where BJP party workers heckled Union Minister Bhupendra Yadav.

Moreover, on the other side of the court, alleged INC party supporters burned effigies of former Chief Minister Digvijaya Singh in Bhopal.

The parties posted a significant volume of tweets with religious undertones. The BJP tweets were pertaining to Ram Mandir and the "anti-Sanatani" Congress. There were also multiple tweets regarding caste by both the parties. The BJP has given tickets to 68 OBC candidates whereas the INC has given it to 59.

With the elections just around the corner, these trends and observations may be subject to change. These findings thus provide a preliminary overview of how political parties use social media platforms as a means of communication and campaign tool in the runup to the elections.

Retail inflation eases to 4.87% in October

The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) is unlikely to lower interest rates anytime soon especially as the food price situation remains sticky and reversed its sequential direction from a 2.2% month-on-month drop in September. The RBI has recently vowed to remain focused on price rise till it sustains around its 4% target, rather than be satisfied with inflation prints between the 4% mark and the upper tolerance threshold of 6%. While there was some slight relief in the inflation rates for cereals (from 11% in September to 10.65% in October), meat and fish (from 4.1% to 3.3%), milk (down 6.44%) and spices, which remained elevated at 22.8% in October, these were offset by gains on other fronts. The pace of price rise in key protein sources like pulses and eggs accelerated sharply to 18.8% and 9.3%, respectively, inflation in fruits and sugar picked up pace to hit 9.34% and 5.5%.

Ex-PM Cameron in, Suella Braverman out

Members of the British government are normally also members of one of the U.K. Houses of Parliament. Although he had been away from active politics for seven years, his experience as Prime Minister and Conservative Party leader would help him in assisting Mr. Sunak meet "vital" global challenges, Mr. Cameron said.

"Though I may have disagreed with some individual decisions, it is clear to me that Rishi Sunak is a strong and capable Prime Minister, who is showing exemplary leadership at a difficult time. I want to help him to deliver the security and prosperity," Mr. Cameron wrote in a lengthy statement posted on X (formerly Twitter). He had recently criticised Mr. Sunak's decision to cancel the remainder of the High Speed Rail 2 project in the North of England.

Mr. Cameron's tenure as Prime Minister between 2010 and 2016 was most noted for the deeply divisive Brexit referendum which resulted in the U.K. leaving the E.U. In a more recent controversy, BBC Panorama had reported in 2021 that Mr. Cameron had received approximately \$10 million in return for promoting discredited finance company Greensill Capital. Mr. Cameron also continues to be criticised for his close ties with the Chinese government, having presided over a different era (a "golden era" as per his then Chancellor George Osborne) of U.K.-China ties when he was the Prime Minister.

More to say: Braverman

After news of her sacking spread, Ms. Braverman said it was the highest privilege of her life to have served as Home Secretary.

"I will have more to say in due course," she said, according to news agency PA Media.

The former minister's track record of controversial comments include remarks made earlier this month that many homeless people were living in tents as a "lifestyle choice". In October 2022, Ms. Braverman, the daughter of migrants of Indian descent from Africa, had said it was her "dream" and "obsession" to see asylum seekers being taken in a flight from the U.K. to Rwanda. Her comments on Indian citizens comprising the largest group of overstayers in the U.K. ruffled feathers in the Indian government, complicating trade talks between the two countries.

The criticism of Ms. Braverman is not uniform across her party, however, and she continues to enjoy support from the right flank of the Conservative Party - including from members of the backbench Common Sense Group and the New Conservatives. There is also speculation that the former Home Secretary may have her eye on the top job at No. 10 Downing Street. Significantly, the U.K. Supreme Court will rule on the legality of the Rwanda policy on Wednesday.

Even with Ms. Braverman out, the Home Office will continue to seek to reduce illegal migration in line with the Sunak government policy.

"The goal is clear. My job is to keep people in this country safe," Mr. Cleverly said in his new post. He said he was "absolutely committed" to another one of the Conservative government's pet projects - stopping boats carrying migrants across the English Channel from arriving in the U.K. Other changes made by Mr. Sunak involved appointing former Financial Secretary Victoria Atkins as Health Secretary, replacing Steve Barclay who in turn replaced Therèse Coffey as Environment Secretary. "New titles, same old Tories," London's (Labour) Mayor Sadiq Khan wrote as he called for a general election to be held now. The U.K. is heading towards the polls with Mr. Sunak required to call elections before January 2025.

Nine dead in a fire in Hyderabad building

40 workers trapped in tunnel in Uttarkashi safe; rescue efforts on

Oxygen and food being supplied to the workers; multi-agency rescue operation involving NDRF, SDRF, ITBP and police under way; the trapped men have also received a walkie-talkie and communicating with rescue personnel, say officials

Rescue teams are racing against time to save the 40 labourers trapped after a portion of an under-construction tunnel collapsed in Uttarkashi district of Uttarakhand early on Sunday.

The tunnel, being built by National Highways and Infrastructure Development Corporation Ltd. (NHIDCL) in Silkyara, is part of the Char Dham all-weather road project, which aims to reduce the distance between Uttarkashi and Yamunotri town by 26 km.

Officials of the National and State Disaster Response Forces have established contact with the trapped labourers. The labourers, who sought food, told the officials they were safe and had adequate water inside for a few days. Oxygen is being pumped into the collapsed area through a pipe.

The State Disaster Response Force (SDRF) said the tunnel collapsed at 5.30 a.m. on Sunday. The rescue teams were immediately rushed to the spot. They pushed a pipe through the debris through

which they sent a walkie-talkie to the trapped workers.

Superintendent of Police Arpan Yaduvanshi said communication was established with the trapped workers within hours of the accident. "Initially, the workers panicked, but we managed to pacify them by explaining our rescue operations. They said there is no shortage of oxygen as no one is complaining about breathing issues. We are sending raw food materials," he added.

"There are 75 police personnel involved in the res-

cue operations along with 25 fire services personnel, one platoon of PAC (Provincial Armed Constabulary), 25 people from the SDRF, 35 from the NDRF, and 25 from the Indo-Tibetan Border Police. Our teams are running against time in the chilly weather to ensure that every worker trapped inside the tunnel is evacuated safely," Mr. Yaduvanshi said.

NHIDCL officials said that by their duty roster, of the 40 workers, 15 are from Jharkhand, eight from Uttar Pradesh, five from Odisha, four from Bihar, three

from West Bengal and two each from Uttarakhand and Assam. One is from Himachal Pradesh

Speaking about the rescue operations, the technical team of the NHIDCL said debris was being removed at a fast pace.

"We are removing the loose earth continuously along with shotcrete [concrete or mortar sprayed with either a dry or wet mix process] to push through a 900-mm diameter steel pipe to evacuate the workforce through it. An expert team from the Irrigation Department is

reaching the project site for assistance," it said.

Till Monday night, 21 metres of collapsed area was cleared, but falling debris posed a hindrance in the work.

The State government said the 4,531-metre-long tunnel was being constructed for the benefit of the Char Dham pilgrims as it would save their travelling time by around one hour, avoiding steep, mountainous and narrow roads prone to accidents and landslips.

The existing road, if widened, would have completely destroyed the rich flora and fauna of the Radi top mountains with thick cover of rhododendrons.

Ranjeet Kumar Sinha, State Disaster Management Secretary, said the accident happened as the area had soft rock that collapsed under pressure.

"We will see what can be done about the rock nature, but currently our primary task is to rescue people safely, which is expected by Wednesday morning," Mr. Sinha said.

Chief Minister Pushkar Singh Dhami visited the site on Monday to take the stock of the situation. The CM directed the officials to speed up the rescue work.

Mahua Moitra appointed Trinamool district chief

The Trinamool Congress on Monday appointed Mahua Moitra president of the party's Krishnanagar unit. Ms. Moitra has been given the task of strengthening the party at a time when she is facing recommendations from the Ethics Committee of the Lok Sabha for expulsion from the House in a cash-for-query row.

She has replaced Kallol Khan as the district president of Krishnanagar in Nadia district. The MP took to social media and thanked party chairperson Mamata Banerjee. "Thank you @MamataOfficial and @AITCofficial for appointing me District President of Krishnanagar (Nadia North). Will always work with the party for the people of Krishnanagar," she said on X.

Ms. Moitra won the Krishnanagar Lok Sabha seat in 2019 with a margin of over 60,000 votes and the new appointment was an indication that the party may field her again from the same seat in the Lok Sabha election.

The Trinamool leadership on November 9 put its weight behind Ms. Moitra by raising questions on the decision of the committee, alleging that it was a move to stifle the MP's voice in the House.

Centre extends UAPA ban on eight Meitei extremist organisations

The Union Home Ministry on Monday extended the ban under the Unlawful Activities Prevention Act (UAPA) against eight "Meitei extremist organisations" for advocating secession of Manipur from India through armed struggle. It declared the eight outfits "unlawful associations" for inciting indigenous people of Manipur for such secession, a notification said.

The organisations include the Peoples' Liberation Army, known as PLA, and its political wing, the Revolutionary Peoples' Front (RPF); the United National Liberation Front (UNLF) and its armed wing, the Manipur Peoples' Army (MPA); the Peo-

ple's Revolutionary Party of Kangleipak (PREPAK) and its armed wing, the 'Red Army'; the Kangleipak Communist Party (KCP) and its armed wing, also called the 'Red Army'; the Kanglei Yaol Kanba Lup (KYKL); the Coordination Committee (CorCom); and the Alliance for Socialist Unity Kangleipak (ASUK).

It added that the Central government is of the opi-

nion that the outfits have been engaging in activities prejudicial to the sovereignty and integrity of India; employing and engaging in armed means to achieve their objectives; attacking and killing the security forces, police and civilians in Manipur; indulging in acts of intimidation, extortion and looting of civilian population for collection of funds; making contact with sources abroad for influencing public opinion and for securing their assistance by way of arms and training for the purpose of achieving their secessionist objective and maintaining camps in neighbouring countries for the purpose of sanctuaries, training and clandestine procurement of arms and ammunition.

It said that the government is of the opinion that the activities of the organisations are detrimental to the sovereignty and integrity of India and that they are unlawful associations.

It said if there is no immediate curb and control on the activities, they will take the opportunity to "mobilise their cadres for escalating their secessionist, subversive, terrorist and violent activities; propagate anti-national activities in collusion with forces inimical to sovereignty and integrity of India; indulge in killings of civilians and targeting of the police and security force personnel; procure and induct illegal arms and ammunitions from across the international border; and extort and collect huge funds from public."

1,400 Myanmar citizens take refuge in Mizoram, one dead

Some 1,400 Myanmar nationals took refuge in Champhai district of Mizoram early on Monday morning following an intense gunfight between the Myanmar Army and pro-democracy militias in Chin State across India's border.

Among the refugees were 16 people injured in the shelling by the Myanmar Army, while one Myanmar national was killed on the Indian side of the border in the district's Zokhawthar area after being hit by shrapnel, officials said. The person was hit by a "metallic object" after a bomb exploded across the Tiau river that marks almost half the 510-km border between the

two countries, officials said.

Champhai Deputy Commissioner James Lalrinchana said the fighting across the border started on Sunday evening and ended on Monday morning. He confirmed reports of bombing close to the International Border and said officials have been asked to assess the situation in Zokhawthar, about 42 km from Champhai, the district's headquarters.

Assam Rifles officials said the situation along the border has been tense with many people from villages and towns in the bordering areas of Myanmar having crossed over. A local police officer said a Myanmar national, hit by shrapnel, died soon after crossing the border.

T.N. to drop prison rules derived from British-era laws

Tamil Nadu will soon replace its decades-old prison manual derived from the jail laws of the British era with a new set of rules that will be guided by the Model Prisons and Correctional Services Act, 2023.

The draft of the new prison manual will be sent to the State government for approval. Amaraesh Pujari, Director-General of Police, Prisons and Correctional Services, is hopeful the process will be completed in a few months.

The Tamil Nadu Prison Manual, which governs the administration and management of prisons, is derived mainly from the Prisons Act, 1894, and the Prisoners Act, 1900.

Votes on UN draft resolutions criticising Israel were 'routine', regular stance maintained, says Union govt.

India's position on the United Nations votes that dealt with draft resolutions criticising Israel last week were 'routine' and reflect its position on the same resolutions that are passed regularly each year, officials said, differentiating these from the UN General Assembly ceasefire resolution in October, when India had abstained.

On Thursday, the Fourth Committee of the UNGA had voted to clear six resolutions that criticise Israel and support aid for Palestinians in the Occupied Territories and refugees elsewhere. India voted in favour of five of the six resolutions, abstaining in one resolution that deal with investigating Israeli practices and opera-

tions for human rights violations.

Of most significance was the vote criticising "Israeli settlements in the Occupied Palestinian Territory, including East Jerusalem, and the occupied Syrian Golan" that "condemns" Israeli demolitions of Palestinian villages and calls the occupation of those villages by Israeli settlers 'ille-

gal', which India voted in favour of. The vote by India came despite statements by the envoys of Israel and the U.S., who called upon members to vote against the resolutions which will be taken up at the UNGA plenary session, most likely in December.

The U.S. envoy called the resolutions "one-sided". "This year, we call on

you to vote against the resolutions because of what is not mentioned in the resolutions despite the Hamas terror attack against Israel on October 7. There is no mention of war crimes by Hamas. So vote against the resolutions," the Israeli envoy said.

India's vote in favour of most of the resolutions on November 9 had led to speculation and commentary that the government had had another 'rethink' on its UN voting policy. On October 26, India had abstained from the resolution at the Special Emergency Session, calling for an immediate ceasefire to Israeli operations, which was a shift in position seen as favouring Israel. At the time, the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) had said that it had changed its vote from the past, to an 'abstention',

to demonstrate its "zero tolerance" policy on terrorism, and that it could not vote in favour of resolutions that didn't directly reference the attack.

When asked about why India had voted for the five draft resolutions last week that were critical of Israel, and which did not refer to the issue of Hamas attacks or the return of hostages, an official explained that the draft resolutions are "annual, regular resolutions" that were routine, adding that the October 27 ceasefire resolution was a special vote that had taken place against the backdrop of the October 7 and Gaza incidents. However, former diplomats said that India has shifted its stand to a more 'transactional' one, balancing ties with Israel and the traditional policy on Palestine.

Cong. nurtures hatred towards OBCs, says Modi

Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Monday accused the Congress of nurturing hatred towards the Other Backward Classes (OBCs) and failing to provide reservation to OBCs despite being in power. Addressing poll rallies in Chhattisgarh, Mr. Modi said that by abusing him, Congress leaders had been abusing the entire OBC community.

Without naming anyone, he took a jibe at Congress leader Rahul Gandhi, saying some "mahaganyani leaders are nowadays publicising my caste in their gathering; they go on saying that Modi is an OBC". "What the Congress did for five years to the Sahu community of the State is not hidden from anyone," he said. The Sahu community is one of the key OBC communities in the State. The Congress pegs the OBC population at just over 43% and has promised a caste survey if voted to power.

Udaipur tailor's killers were BJP workers, alleges Ashok Gehlot

Accusing the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) of whipping up communal passions ahead of the Assembly election, Rajasthan Chief Minister Ashok Gehlot said Udaipur tailor Kanhaiya Lal was killed by BJP workers who had been released from police detention under party pressure a few days before the murder in June last year. "The culprits have links with the BJP. The police had arrested them in some other case, but BJP leaders visited the police station to get them released," Mr. Gehlot said at a meeting of Congress workers in Jodhpur on Sunday. He said the accused were caught by the police within three hours of Mr. Lal's murder, but the NIA took over the case the same night. Prime Minister Narendra Modi had said at an election rally in Udaipur last week that the Congress was "sympathetic to terrorists", and accused the State government of pursuing a policy of appeasement that helped terrorists. Mr. Modi was referring to Mr. Lal's murder by two assailants.

Mr. Gehlot said the progress in the case was not known since the NIA took it over from the State police.

"Had the Special Operations Group (SOG) of the Rajasthan police handled the case, the probe would have reached a logical conclusion by now," he said.

The Chief Minister said the pace of investigation had been "purposefully kept slow", as the BJP intended to turn the case into an election issue to polarise the voters on communal lines. The two clever-wielding men, who had allegedly murdered Mr. Lal in broad daylight at his shop, had accused him of supporting those who had made some controversial remarks.

Mr. Gehlot pointed out that the BJP leaders, including the Leader of the Opposition, had left for a conference in Hyderabad immediately after the Udaipur incident, while the Congress acted with all seriousness. "I cancelled all my programmes in Jaipur and left for Udaipur the moment I came to know of the incident," he said.

Mr. Gehlot said the BJP's Hindutva agenda would not work in Rajasthan, as the Assembly polls were being fought with development at the centre stage. "They exploited Lord Hanuman in the Karnataka election but had to bite the dust. They will not succeed here with this strategy, as Rajasthan has emerged as a model State following the State government's welfare measures."

BJP refutes allegations

Denying the allegations, the BJP's election in-charge for western Rajasthan, Rajendra Gehlot, asked if the accused had been caught by the police, why were they let off.

"It is the State government's weakness if they were let off by the police. The State government has information and complaints had been given to the police but in spite of that, such a heinous crime was allowed to take place," the BJP leader said.

An *alaav* (bonfire) is lit around 9 p.m. outside a *dhaba* in Shahpur of Betul district with some men gathered around it. While the *alaav* announces the arrival of winter, the conversations around it vary. However, with the Madhya Pradesh Assembly election approaching fast, the polls dominate the conversations in these gatherings.

Manohar Wagadre, an electronics shop owner in Shahpur town, who hails from the Other Backward Class (OBC) community, expresses his disapproval for an exercise to find out the caste-based population in his State or the country. He says, "It will again promote enmity between people and take us back to the days of caste-based politics. It can get really ugly."

Dubbing it as the party's "primary agenda" for the November 17 Assembly polls, the top leadership of the Congress has promised a caste-based population survey if voted to power in Madhya Pradesh. In the past one month, almost all of Congress leader Rahul

Gandhi's speeches in Madhya Pradesh have been dominated by the poll plank, aimed at winning over the OBCs and the tribal people who make up nearly 50% and 21% of the State's population, respectively.

While he calls the exercise an "X-Ray" to detect the problems of the tribal people, Dalits and Backward Classes, Mr. Gandhi has devised a simple example to explain the need of a caste census to the OBC and tribal voters of the State. At a rally on November 9, Mr. Gandhi said, "The budget of Madhya Pradesh is approximately ₹3.5 lakh crore and Shivraj Singh Chouhan and his 53 officers decide how the budget will be spent. Out of these 53 officers, only one officer is from the Backward Class."

"You [the tribal people and OBCs] are unemployed because your people are not making decisions in the government," Mr. Gandhi had said at a rally soon after the Bihar government released its report of a caste-based survey. *The Hindu* spoke to people in many regions of the State, including Gwalior-Chambal, Bhopal-Hoshangabad and Mahakoshal, and found that the issue

has gained little to no momentum among the voters and local Congress workers.

Pawan Sharma, a local Congress leader in Shivpuri, who is campaigning with the party candidate K. P. Singh, says that the caste census issue is not being discussed during the local campaigning. "Our campaigning mostly focuses on local issues. People don't know much about caste census here and we also don't try to explain it to them," Mr. Sharma told

The Hindu.

"Let the big leaders talk about it from the stage, there are different issues on the ground," he said.

At Sasai village in the Kolaras constituency, Gopal Rathore, a farmer, says that he supports the idea of caste-based counting of population but does not trust the Congress

Chhotu Jatav, a second-year BA student at a government college in Kolaras, does not know what a caste census is. He, however, has little hopes of get-

ting a job after his graduation. "There are barely any jobs here. Instead of wasting my time in preparations, I will rather join my father in the field," he said.

There are also some who fear an emergence of a new age of caste politics in the Hindi heartland.

Chandrakant Jain, a pharmacy shop owner in Betul district's Sarni, said, "We remember the time after the Mandal commission report was implemented and we certainly do not want that time back. It will

only bring in more divide among people."

A source in the Congress's Madhya Pradesh unit admitted that the issue had not been "as impactful among the masses as the party thought it would be".

"This issue was properly picked up by the top leadership after the Bihar report came out. Although we knew that it was difficult to make it the main poll issue on the ground, we had hoped to start a conversation ahead of the 2024 Lok Sabha polls," the leader said on condition of anonymity. The leader said the caste census was a bigger issue at the national level and that local issues were dominating the political space in the State.

"This is the reason you must have noticed that while other leaders do mention the promise of caste census in their addresses, it is only Rahul ji who talks about it in detail," the leader explained, adding that Mr. Gandhi was preparing the ground for the next year's Lok Sabha polls.

Meanwhile, the BJP has kept relatively quiet on the subject and is expected to observe its impact in the Assembly polls before devising a strategy to counter the Congress' narrative.

Modi, Shah address rallies in M.P., take jibes at Cong. over crime, Ram Temple

A day after Deepavali and with just four days to go for the Madhya Pradesh Assembly election, top two Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) leaders, Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Union Home Minister Amit Shah, addressed rallies in the State to seek votes for the party as the campaigning enters its final phase.

Addressing a rally in Barwani district of Madhya Pradesh, Mr. Modi attacked the Congress and said that slogans such as "sar tan se juda" (head removed from the body) were only possible under the Congress rule.

"Could we have ever imagined hearing slogans like sar tan se juda in India? But this took place in the misrule of Congress, in the land of brave Rajasthan and in front of a camera," the Prime Minister said, referring to the murder of a tailor, Kanhaiya Lal, in Rajasthan's Udaipur last June.

The slogan, which is reportedly ascribed to the punishment for blasphemy in Islam, had been heard on multiple occasions in the country in the wake of the derogatory remarks on the Prophet by now-sus-

pended BJP spokesperson Nupur Sharma. The tailor was also beheaded in front of a camera for allegedly extending his support to Ms. Sharma.

While Madhya Pradesh will go to the polls on November 17, polling in Rajasthan will take place on November 25.

Mr. Modi said, "The Congress has one more identity and the youth need to understand this. Wherever the Congress comes to power, crime reaches a high there and riots become common. It becomes difficult for people to celebrate their festi-

als. You see in your neighbourhood of Rajasthan. What all has not happened there in the past five years."

Mr. Shah took on the Congress and its leader Rahul Gandhi over the issue of Ram Temple construction. He accused the Congress of "delaying, misleading and hindering" the issue of temple construction since Independence.

Saying that the Ram Temple is going to be inaugurated on January 22, Mr. Shah said, "Rahul Baba used to taunt [the BJP] every day that 'the temple will be built there but will

not tell the date'. Congress leaders should listen with open ears, Ram Lalla is going to be seated in his temple on 22 January 2024."

Mr. Shah said that his party has promised to take every citizen of Madhya Pradesh to Ram Temple free of cost. "The people of Madhya Pradesh will not have to spend even a single rupee to visit Ram Temple," he added.

Top leaders of both — the BJP and the Congress — have been launching scathing attacks at one another with just three days left for the campaigning to conclude.

Attacks on BRS leaders bear mark of Prashant Kishor: Revanth Reddy

Telangana Congress president A. Revanth Reddy said the series of sudden 'attacks' on Bharat Rashtra Samiti (BRS) candidates has a mark of poll strategist Prashant Kishor. He said it was a bid to generate sympathy for the ruling party candidates after having realised that the BRS was losing the Telangana Assembly election.

"Prashant Kishor is known to plan such incidents to generate sympathy. Irrespective of the political party he has worked with, the attacks are part of a common strategy. We have seen this in West Bengal also," he said at a press conference.

Referring to the knife attack on Dubbak BRS candidate Kotha Prabhakar Reddy and assault on Achampet candidate Guvvala Balaraju, he said the BRS tried to blame the Congress and create a narrative as per the directions of their poll strategists.

Mr. Reddy wanted to know why the police is not revealing the remand report of the accused in the Kotha Prabhakar Reddy

case. "Right after the attack, even Chief Minister K. Chandrashekharao blamed the Congress in public meetings, trying to link the Congress to the attack. The BRS leadership took the same line. However, the Siddipet Police Commissioner told the media that the accused wanted to create a sensation with the attack," he said, asking why the BRS is resorting to such a campaign if not for the fear of losing elections.

The State Congress chief said Municipal Administration Minister K.T. Rama Rao claimed some attacks on the BRS are likely part of social media campaigns to defame the government.

The Election Commission of India and the local election officials should find out the information KTR has about these 'impending attacks', he said.

"For the international round, invitations were extended to all G-20+9 nations and an impressive 23 international teams have indicated their interest to take part in it at New Delhi on November 19," the Navy said in a statement. "The grand finale is set to take place at the iconic India Gate, New Delhi on November 23, offering these bright school students a global stage for intellectual exchange and competition." THINQ, conducted by the Navy and NWWA (Navy Wellness and Welfare Association) has grown in popularity and numbers over the years.

Defence Minister holds talks with his U.K. counterpart

Defence Minister Rajnath Singh on Monday held a telephonic conversation with the U.K. Secretary of State for Defence Grant Shapps, during which the two Ministers discussed a range of defence and security issues with particular emphasis on the Indo-Pacific. They briefly reviewed the ongoing engagements and discussed possible cooperation in new domains, a Defence Ministry statement said. "Both Ministers explored ways and means to develop closer defence relations." Mr. Shapps invited Mr. Singh to visit the U.K. in the near future.

Delhi most polluted city in world: Swiss survey

Mumbai and Kolkata were other Indian metropolises on the list of 10 most polluted cities after Deepavali; data show that pollution in parts of the capital was 30 times higher than safe limits

On Monday, the day after Deepavali, three Indian metropolises figured on the list of the most polluted cities in the world compiled by the Swiss air purifier company IQAir.

Delhi was the most polluted city in the world with an air quality index (AQI) of 287 followed by Lahore, Pakistan, at 195. Mumbai, at 153, and Kolkata, 166, were among the top 10. The IQAir's AQI measures data from 109 countries, and the readings change hourly. It follows a U.S. methodology and varies slightly from the Indian one.

The values are a measure of the quantities of PM [particulate matter] 2.5, considered most harmful for respiratory health. Though pollution from firecrackers are short-lived compared with those from persistent sources such as vehicle emission and waste and biomass burning, the spike in pollutants has a pronounced effect on health.

Air pollution in parts of Delhi was 30 times the safe limits prescribed by the World Health Organization (WHO), contributed in part by the firecrackers lit on

Sunday night, show figures from the Delhi Pollution Control Committee. This is despite a ban on firecrackers in the city.

Continuing worry

The most updated readings from these cities, as of Monday, suggested that air quality is deteriorating, with several monitoring stations reporting a value of 400, classified as the "severe" category.

The air quality of Delhi is likely to be in the "severe" category on Tuesday and Wednesday, according to the Centre's Air Quality Early Warning System for

Delhi. Air pollution in the "severe" category "affects healthy people" and "seriously impacts those with existing diseases", says the Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB).

Another joint analysis by Climate Trends and Respiratory Living Sciences, which analysed all-India pollution levels on Deepavali day in several cities, reported that the highest average PM 2.5 pollution was reported from Patna, Bihar, at 206 microgram per cubic metre. Just as the IQAir ranking, it too reports Delhi as being the most polluted city on the

day after Deepavali. Meanwhile, Bengaluru reported the lowest levels of PM 2.5 among 11 cities analysed and their figures were lower than last year's Deepavali (October 24), the report added.

'Phase out firecrackers'

"Already poor average PM 2.5 levels crossed limits due to firecrackers in several cities. Our analysis shows that widespread burning, in defiance of the Supreme Court orders, took away the gains (in reducing pollutants) that were made due to rain. The cracker industry must be phased out," Aarti Khosla, director, Climate Trends, said. "Delhi and other major cities must not continue to bear the burden of public health in the name of hollow support for traditions. We can look at community fireworks or lighting of lamps, as done in Ayodhya."

Last week, the hazardous air quality in Delhi, which the Centre attributed to stubble burning in Punjab, prompted emergency measures to be imposed, including plans to impose odd-even rules on the use of cars as well as experiments with artificial rain. An unexpected rain improved air quality by over 100 percentage points.

Jaishankar meets newly appointed U.K. Foreign Secretary

External Affairs Minister S. Jaishankar's official visit to London had a surprise twist on Monday, when he met with former U.K. Prime Minister and the country's newly appointed Foreign Secretary David Cameron. Mr. Jaishankar was scheduled to meet with James Cleverly as Foreign Secretary, but Prime Minister Rishi Sunak had undertaken a major Cabinet reshuffle on Monday morning prior to Mr. Jaishankar's meeting.

Congratulating him on his appointment, Mr. Jaishankar said he looked forward to working with Mr. Cameron closely, adding that the two Ministers had held a detailed discussion on realising the full potential of the strategic partnership between the two countries. "Also exchanged views on the situation in West Asia, the Ukraine conflict and the Indo-Pacific," he said.

Mr. Jaishankar will meet Mr. Cleverly in his new avatar as Home Secretary on Monday.

Earlier on Monday, Mr. Jaishankar posted on X that he had met with another former British Prime Minister - Tony Blair, with whom he said he had discussed bilateral ties, Africa and West Asia.

With U.K. Defence Secretary Grant Shapps, Mr.

Jaishankar said he had discussed perspectives on global security challenges and convergences in the two countries' approaches.

Defence cooperation

He also discussed enhancing security and defence cooperation between India and the U.K. and opportunities for manufacturing (defence-related goods) in India.

On Sunday, Mr. Jaishankar and his wife, Kyoko Jaishankar, met with Mr. Sunak and his wife, Akshata Murty. The Jaishankars also visited the Swaminarayan temple in London for Deepavali.

Mr. Jaishankar has moderated a discussion organised by the Indian High Commission, London, and the Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office's (FCDO) Wilton Park. The Minister is in the U.K. until the end of Wednesday.

Centre asks States to use tracking devices on prison inmates released on parole

The Union Home Ministry has said States may use tracking devices on prison inmates when they are released on parole. It also called for segregation of hardened criminals from other category of criminals.

"The State may use electronic monitoring technology on prisoners under temporary release/leave from prison, by making use of inmate tracking devices," the suggestion which is part of the Model Prisons and Correctional Services Act, 2023 that was circulated to all States in May said.

On Monday, a copy of

the Act was published on the Ministry's website. "Prisoners may be granted prison leave on the condition of their willingness to wear electronic tracking devices for monitoring the movement and activities of such prisoners. Any violation by the prisoner will at-

tract cancellation of prison leave, in addition to disqualification from any prison leave being granted in future, as may be prescribed under the rules," it said.

Earlier this month, the Jammu and Kashmir Police introduced GPS tracker ankle for monitoring a terror accused out on bail.

The Act said that appropriate and advanced security infrastructure and procedures shall be in place for the high-risk prisoner ward in all central and district prisons. It also asks the States to digitise the prison administration and integrate the database with the Interoperable Criminal Justice System.

'Foreign degrees in Indian institutions may require equivalence'

The University Grants Commission (UGC) has gazetted the regulations for foreign universities that plan to set up campuses in India. But many educators wonder if the degrees offered by foreign universities will be accepted by the UGC, and how the commission will proceed with the issue of equivalence for the degrees.

The UGC's 2021 regulations permit foreign universities to collaborate with Indian higher education institutions to offer twinning, joint, and dual-degree programmes. It states that qualifications awarded under the regula-

tions "shall be equivalent to any corresponding degree awarded by the Indian Higher Educational Institution".

The regulations, gazetted on November 8, stipulate that "there shall be no further requirement of seeking equivalence and the degree shall have all benefits, rights and privileges as obtained in case of a degree awarded by an Indian higher education institution". Educators in private universities wondered how the regulation has been introduced when the UGC Act makes no such provision. "Through its regulations, the Ministry of Education is trying to allow the entry of foreign institutions," an educator said.

Veteran parliamentarian and CPI(M) leader Basudeb Acharia passes away at 81

Basudeb Acharia, veteran MP, trade union leader and Central Committee member of the Communist Party of India (Marxist), passed away on Monday in a private hospital in Hyderabad. He was 81 and is survived by two daughters and a son.

CPI(M) general secretary Sitaram Yechury took to social media to express 'deepfelt condolences to his family members'.



Eight pro-Iran fighters dead in U.S. strikes in Syria

At least eight pro-Iran fighters were killed in U.S. strikes on eastern Syria, a war monitor said on Monday, a day after Washington carried out raids in response to attacks on American forces.

The toll is "eight pro-Iran fighters dead, including at least one Syrian, and Iraqi nationals", the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights said, following the strikes late on Sunday near the Iraqi border.

It was the third time in less than three weeks that the U.S. military has targeted locations in Syria it said were tied to Iran, which supports various armed groups that Washington blames for a spike in attacks on its forces in West Asia.

The surge is linked to the war between Israel and Hamas.

Battles around hospitals in Gaza force Palestinians to flee

Critically wounded patients, including newborn babies and their caregivers, are left stranded in hospitals as a result of these attacks that have further led to dwindling supplies and no electricity

Battles around hospitals forced thousands of Palestinians to flee from some of the last shelters in northern Gaza, stranding critically wounded patients, including newborns, and their caregivers with dwindling supplies and no electricity, health officials said on Monday.

The Israeli military has urged Palestinians to flee south on foot through what it calls safe corridors. But its purported drive to separate civilians from Hamas militants has come at a heavy cost, with more than two-thirds of the territory's population of 2.3 million having already fled their homes.

Thousands fled Gaza's Shifa Hospital over the

weekend as Israeli troops encircled it, but hundreds of patients and displaced people remained, according to officials. Shifa "is not functioning as a hospital anymore," World Health Organization Director-General Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus said. A second Gaza City hospital faces

evacuations after running out of fuel.

For Palestinians, Shifa evokes the suffering of civilians. For weeks, staff running low on supplies have performed surgery there on war-wounded patients, including children, without anesthesia. Up until days ago, tens of thousands

of people driven from their homes by airstrikes lived in and around the complex, hoping it would be safe.

Israel says Hamas shields itself among civilians, and that the hospital, Gaza's largest, is a prime example. It says the militants have a command center in and beneath the medical compound. Israel has released maps and diagrams showing what it says are bunkers and other Hamas installations and around Shifa, but has not provided any evidence.

Israeli officials recently released photos and footage showing what they described as the opening of a tunnel next to another hospital, as well as gunmen firing from inside the building.

Both Hamas and Shifa hospital staff deny the Israeli allegations.

Days before new Maldives President assumes office, Nasheed quits as Speaker

The Maldives Speaker of Parliament, Mohamed Nasheed, resigned on Monday, days before the swearing-in of a new President following a fiercely contested election in the Indian Ocean archipelago.

Parliamentary elections are not due until the second quarter of next year, meaning that President-elect Mohamed Muizzu — who takes power on Friday after winning September polls — will have to work with an Opposition-controlled parliament.

Mr. Nasheed, who is also a former President, decided to quit from the number two position in the country to head off a no-confidence motion by ruling party legislators, a close aide told AFP.

"He didn't want a no-

trust vote against him and decided to resign," the aide said.

Mr. Nasheed caught international attention for holding a 2009 Cabinet meeting underwater to highlight the threat of global warming, signing documents as officials wore scuba gear with coral reefs in the background.

He was toppled in a military-backed coup in 2012, convicted on a terrorism charge and jailed for 13 years.

He left the country on medical leave and sought refuge in Britain, returning to the Maldives after President Ibrahim Mohamed Solih won the presidency in 2018 with his backing.

In 2019, Mr. Nasheed became Speaker after his Maldivian Democratic Party (MDP) won parliamentary elections, but he quit the party in June over differences with Mr. Solih.

Mr. Nasheed, a world-renowned climate campaigner, survived an assassination attempt in May 2021, spending five months in Germany for treatment after a bomb blast.

There has been no claim of responsibility, but the MDP has blamed religious extremists in the tiny Islamic republic of 3,80,000 Sunni Muslims, which practises a liberal form of the religion and is known for its upmarket tourism.

Ranil presents Budget aimed at aiding economic recovery in Sri Lanka

Sri Lankan President Ranil Wickremesinghe on Monday unveiled the country's Budget for the fiscal year of 2024, outlining a significant increase in expenditure while setting ambitious revenue targets as he attempts to steer the island nation out of last year's debilitating economic crisis.

Termining the task of economic revival following bankruptcy a "formidable" one, Mr. Wickremesinghe, who is also the Finance Minister, told Parliament: "Our country's situation is now better than what it was a year ago. I am not saying that the economy has recovered completely. It has become comparatively better."

The largest component of government expenditure, Mr. Wickremesinghe said, went towards three areas — public sector salaries, pensions and public welfare, and payment of interest on the government's debt. According to figures published in the Budget document, the highest expenditure among those will be incurred on servicing the country's debt and paying the interest. On the other hand, while Mr. Wickremesinghe acknowledged the government had "failed to generate" the targeted revenue of LKR 2.8 trillion for 2023, his Budget set an even higher target of LKR 4.1 trillion for 2024.

Commenting on the proposals, Umesh Mura-

Overlooked problems The Feminist Collective for Economic Justice, an island-wide group of researchers and activists studying the impact of the crisis on women and the working people, said that its concerns over the government's social security programme excluding many of the poor, remain. Further, the Budget does not offer any substantive policy intervention or budgetary allocation to address challenges such as increasing malnutrition among children or food insecurity, while many Sri

Lankans, especially children, continue to survive on just one meal a day, observed Niyanthini Kadirgamar, a member of the Collective.

"On the expenditure side, we see a considerable chunk of the Budget going towards the repayment of interest on the government's loans. As for revenue, the government appears to have high expectations, mainly by collecting indirect taxes. But that would only further increase the burden on the poor," she said.

Multiple studies, including by the World Bank, have pointed to growing poverty levels in Sri Lanka. While Mr. Wickremesinghe pointed to the reducing rate of inflation, he admitted that "we still could not correspondingly increase salaries and income to match the high cost of living which increased due to this severe crisis. The increase in prices of fuel and electricity adversely impacted all households."

Authorities frequently point to the drop in the rate of inflation — 1.5% in October 2023 — but rarely mention that it is over and above the 70% witnessed last year.

Leader of Opposition Sajith Premadasa called the Budget as a "media circus", while prominent Opposition voice and Leader of the National Peoples Power (NPP) Anura Kumara Dissanayake said the Budget was based on "seeking [more] loans" and "selling state assets".

Pakistan and China Navies to carry out joint sea patrol

China and Pakistan are conducting the third edition of the Sea Guardian-3 bilateral naval exercise in the northern Arabian Sea with Chinese media reporting that the two sides will also hold their maiden joint maritime patrol. The exercise is scheduled from November 11 to 17.

The exercise comes just a day after the 2+2 Ministerial dialogue between India and the U.S. where maritime security in the Indo-Pacific was in focus and New Delhi announced its decision to become a full-member of the Bahrain-based U.S.-led multilateral grouping Combined Maritime Forces (CMF), of which Pakistan is also a member.

The exercise also comes days after Russia and Myanmar held their first naval exercise in the Andaman Sea.

China's People's Liberation Army (PLA) Navy has deployed a Type-093 Song class diesel-electric subma-

The exercise comes just a day after the 2+2 Ministerial dialogue between India and the U.S.

rine for the exercise. "China and Pakistan will conduct their first joint maritime patrol and will also exchange observers. The Chinese observers will participate with a Pakistani anti-submarine patrol aircraft," the official Chinese Army news portal reported.

Other armaments In addition to the conventional submarine, the PLA Navy has deployed guided-missile destroyer Zibo, guided-missile frigates Jingzhou and Linyi along with two shipborne helicopters and supply ship Qiandaohu, lead ship of the Type 903 replenishment ships. Pakistani Navy has deployed nine vessels along with three shipborne helicopters, four fighter jets and one maritime patrol aircraft.

Iran hangs three over 2019 bombing attacks

Iran hanged on Monday three men who were convicted of carrying out the 2019 bombing attacks in the restive southeastern province of Sistan-Baluchistan, the judiciary said.

The three men were sentenced to death after they were found guilty of bombing attacks targeting a police station and a patrol vehicle in Zahedan, the capital of Sistan-Baluchistan province.

The defendants were also convicted over "receiving military training, transferring and hiding bomb-making materials".

They were also found guilty of being part of the Sunni jihadist Jaish al-Adl (Army of Justice) group, which was formed in 2012 and is blacklisted by Iran as a "terrorist" organisation, the judiciary's Mizan website said. Iran executes more people per year than any other nation except China, according to human rights groups including Amnesty International.

The Wall Street brokerage expects India's real economic growth to be 6.5% in 2023 and 6.3% in 2024—the highest among large economies in the region, but slightly below the Indian central bank's target of 6.5% for fiscal 2024.

The benchmark Nifty 50 jumped about 31% between March 2021 and October 2023, a period during which domestic investors remained net buyers each month, helping tide over sustained sales by foreign investors.

While the domestic par-

icipation was a healthy sign, said Goldman, it also noted the market's surge has pushed valuations to an elevated 20 times the next 12 month's expected earnings. Still, that valuation had some support after earnings growth of 17% in 2023, it said.

The brokerage said concerns over China's economy could lead to countries shifting their supply chains, which could benefit India. The Nifty 50 has gained roughly 7% in 2023 so far, compared to a 3.75% drop in the MSCI Asia ex-Japan index.

'One-fourth infra projects hit by ₹5 lakh cr. cost overruns in Sept.'

About 417 infrastructure projects, each with investments of ₹150 crore or more, have been hit by cost overruns of more than ₹4.77 lakh crore in September, mentions the latest report by the Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation.

The Ministry, which monitors infrastructure projects worth ₹150 crore or more, said out of 1,763 projects, about one-fourth (417) reported cost overruns and half (842) have been delayed.

"Total original cost of implementation of the



1,763 projects was ₹24,86,402.70 crore and their anticipated completion cost is likely to be ₹29,64,345.13 crore," which reflected cost overruns of almost 20% of the original cost, the report mentioned.

For 298 projects neither the year of commissioning nor tentative gestation pe-

riods have been reported and the average time overrun in these projects is reported to be more than three years.

Reasons for time overruns as per implementing agencies include delays in land acquisition, obtaining environment clearances, lack of infrastructure support and linkages; delays in project financing, finalisation of detailed engineering and change in scope.

Project executing agencies are not reporting revised cost estimates and commissioning schedules for many projects, suggesting time/cost overrun figures are under-reported, the report added.

Wheels India eyes 20% export growth in current fiscal

Wheels India Ltd. (WIL) is eyeing 20% growth in exports in FY24, and expects to win orders for light and medium construction wheels; larger tractor wheels, and the fabrication and hydraulic cylinder business, managing director Srivats Ram said in a call with analysts.

"We expect to win these orders from Q4 this year. These wheels are used in Europe and North America. So these are three areas where we see export po-

tential," he said. WIL is also looking to grow its fabrication and hydraulic cylinder business in the next fiscal.

Emphasising that new orders were needed to maintain export growth, he said: "We have had strong export growth so far this year; next year would be challenging, we may need new businesses to ensure we show growth and do not degrow exports."

In the first half, WIL posted decent growth in exports, despite the slowdown in Europe. Asian markets were strong, Mr. Ram noted.

Dabur sees 'very good recovery' in rural markets

The recovery is expected to continue led by the hike in MSP, good sowing of winter crops, and the election season.

Diwali sales sparkle, bringing cheer to retailers and manufacturers

On Dhanteras this year, gold jewellery sales rose 15-25% compared with last year, said Colin Shah, MD, Kama Jewellery.

There was a surge in low-ticket purchases, which contributed to the overall growth in festival

sales. Strong demand came in from Tier-2 cities along with metros.

H. Mohanlal Jain, Director, All India Gem and Jewellery Domestic Council and proprietor of Lalchand Hastimal Jewellers in Secunderabad, said, "Gold jewellery, silver, diamonds, and bullion sales were very good. Sales were 30% more than last year, quantity-wise. Value-wise, it will be more."

This year, gold and silver coins were available on instant commerce apps. Blinkit founder and CEO Albinder Dhindsa posted on X (Twitter) an image of 100 silver coins going out on a single order, saying the coins were flying off

the shelves.

Cars and bikes vroom

Automakers reported strong festival demand. Manish Raj Singhania, President, Federation of Automobile Dealers Associations (FADA), said, "Discussions among dealers suggest Dhanteras and Diwali this year are poised to experience exceptionally strong retail performance. The momentum observed in the two and three-wheeler segments mirrors Navratri, while there is a modest increase in passenger vehicle sales compared to Navratri period."

Soon the crowd was on its feet when Virat Kohli got Scott Edwards to feather

an edge. There was delight all around and this emotion lingered through the night even as the Netherlands stretched its innings.

In the afternoon, Rohit won the toss, elected to bat and the Netherlands immediately employed spinner Aryan Dutt.

The Indian skipper proved equal to the task and swept two fours. Seamer Logan van Beek kept it tight for a bit and Rohit and Shubman Gill sought relief by lashing at Aryan.

Gill pounded a six and when Ackermann ambled in, Rohit square-drove and lofted with elan. Paul van Meekeren then felt the heat of Gill's bat. The opener etched his 50, India got its 100 and the batter then fell to Meekeren. The stadium soon erupted with vociferous cheers as Kohli walked in.

Rohit, meanwhile, raced to his 50 and went down the route that Gill had taken, failing to get past a fielder in the deep. India was 129 for two in 17.4 overs and Kohli and Shreyas Iyer stitched a partnership. Kohli pulled Bas de Leede and the crowd began its 'RCB' chants, an obvious reference to Kohli's IPL link with the city since 2008.

Kohli's 50 had an air of inevitability and just like Gill and Rohit, he too fell

Fielding awards is about effort and attitude: Dilip

Through this World Cup, the behind-the-scenes videos of the fielding awards initiated within the Indian dressing room, has been a subject of widespread interest. India's fielding coach T. Dilip, the architect of this movement, spoke about the rationale behind these awards during the course of the post-match press conference at the M. Chinnaswamy Stadium here on Sunday.

Shortly after India defeated the Netherlands by 160 runs in the World Cup game, Dilip addressed the media. While he offered a guarded 'wait and watch' answer when asked about who is the latest winner of the fielding medal, he was more elaborate about other aspects linked to fielding and the team.

"We have won nine matches and we have the momentum. We defeated New Zealand at Dharamshala and we take that as a positive and as for the semi-final, we will deal with it on game-day," he said.

What about the awards and the idea behind this concept? "Basically it is about judging attitude, yes

there are statistics for catches taken but we look at the overall contribution.

An innings has 300 balls, how do you handle them on the field. This is not just about one brilliant catch, it is about the overall effort.

We have been doing this for a while, atleast for the last four months, but only now it has gone on social media, and people have noticed it and it is hearten-

ing," Dilip said.

There remains a lingering worry about Mohammed Siraj, perhaps the weakest fielder in the unit, but the coach was quick to defend the speedster: "The bowlers are committed to fielding and they work hard. There is nothing specifically wrong with Siraj, he has put his body on the line often while fielding, shown good attitude and he will get better."

We are confident with the style we play, says Edwards

The Netherlands ended its World Cup campaign with a 160-run defeat against India.

The Dutch captain, Scott Edwards, chose to focus on the positives. "It's a little bit of a tricky one at the moment, where we want to be. We are pretty confident with the style we play. The tournament was always going to be tough," said Edwards after the match.

He also touted India as a favourite to win a third World Cup title.

"They are a very well-balanced side. Match winners all the way through, and they've shown in this World Cup thus far just how good they are. South Africa has match winners too, while Australia and New Zealand have been very consistent. That said, India does shape up well."

Rahul smashes fastest ton by an Indian in World Cup

K.L. Rahul recorded the fastest century (62 balls) by an Indian batter in the ODI World Cup. He broke the record held by Rohit who hit a century in 63 deliveries against Afghanistan earlier in the tournament.

Rahul also became the second Indian wicketkeeper-batter after Rahul Dravid to score a World Cup century.

India is the first team to have five of its batters score fifty runs or more in an innings in the ODI World Cup. India (16) also hit the second most sixes in an innings in ODI World Cup. The highest was 18 against Bermuda in 2007.

Rohit Sharma surpassed South Africa's A.B. de Villiers (58) with his 59th six and record the most sixes in a calendar year. He is also the first Indian captain to score 500 or more runs in a single edition.

The previous best was Sourav Ganguly's 465 in the 2003 edition. Virat Kohli (594) became the leading run-scorer of World Cup 2023.

Rohit (24) has hit the most sixes by a captain in

an edition, overtaking Eoin Morgan (22 in 2019).

India (410/4) registered its second-highest ODI World Cup total. It is also the fourth-highest total in ODI cricket.

India (91/0) also registered its joint second-highest PowerPlay score in the ODI World Cups. It is also India's joint-third-highest score in the PowerPlay in all ODIs.

The hosts became the third team to use nine bowlers in an ODI World Cup innings. India (nine wins) recorded its longest streak in a single edition of the

World Cup, improving its eight-match run in 2003.

Ravindra Jadeja surpassed Anil Kumble (15) with his 16th scalp, becoming the Indian spinner with most wickets in a single WC edition.

India (215) surpassed West Indies (209) to hit the most sixes by a team in a calendar year. The 160-run win over the Netherlands was India's 24th victory in 2023, equalling its 1998 tally for most wins in a year.

Logan van Beek (107 in 10 overs) conceded the third most runs in an ODI World Cup innings.

'The pitch will be different again'

Three of the four 2023 World Cup matches at the Wankhede Stadium have seen a team batting first amass totals of 350-plus. And the only time a sub-300 score was registered, the chasing team won the game, thanks to Glenn Maxwell's brilliant innings.

With New Zealand yet to play a game at Wankhede in this edition, the 22-yard strip will certainly be in focus. It did not come as a surprise then that head coach Rahul Dravid and his two trusted lieutenants – batting coach Vikram Rathour and bowling coach Paras Mhambrey – headed

straight to the Wankhede Stadium after the team checked into a south Mumbai hotel. Dravid, Rathour and Mhambrey took a long and hard look at the pitch while the rest of the squad took it easy.

Interestingly, even before the Kiwis reached the stadium for a training session, the pitch had been covered. After persisting with the ground authorities for a long time, assistant coach James Foster was allowed to inspect the pitch.

The *Hindu* understands that the surface for Australia's game against Afghanistan will be used for the India-New Zealand clash also. It is likely to be slow as it has been used for a match only last week.

Lockie Ferguson, the Kiwi pacer, didn't read too much into the pitch and

the conditions.

"A lot of Indian grounds have been high scoring, but that's just the nature of one-day cricket in this part of the world. But from our point of view, it's trying to understand what the pitch will be like and try to read what a good score on it is because of course those big overs, 10 runs here, 10 runs there can cost you at the back-end of the innings," Ferguson said.

"From a bowling point of view, we are trying to I guess shut down those big overs, try to understand what we think is a good total on the score. The pitch will be different again, that's the joy of cricket. We play on a different pitch each time, so it's hard to read two days out. We have got to adapt as quickly as possible come Wednesday."

It will be a good challenge in the semifinal: Ferguson

No team has been able to take a game deep against India in the 2023 World Cup league stage. If at all a side has asked some questions of Rohit Sharma's men, they are the two trans-Tasman teams (Australia and New Zealand).

The lesser-fancied of those two has emerged as the bogey team for India in ICC tournaments, especially the knockouts, of late. No wonder, the Kiwis are hoping to build on not only the recent history but also the league game in Dharamshala three weeks ago.

"It was a hard-fought game. I thought that went extremely well, to get a great total on that. And, of course, with one-day cricket and playing against India, there is a lot of ebb and flow," said Lockie Ferguson, the New Zealand pacer, ahead of the team's first training session at the Wankhede Stadium on Monday.

While India has been

unstoppable, New Zealand has had a roller-coaster ride so far in the tournament. After beginning with four wins, New Zealand lost the next four before taking the fourth spot with a convincing win against Sri Lanka even as Pakistan lost to England.

Ferguson indicated that the patchy form in the league stage will have no bearing on Wednesday. "Part of tournament cricket and certainly World Cup cricket. Every team we play here is an exceptional one and have done their homework, done their scouting... we had a couple of close games that didn't quite go away and a rain-affected one too," Ferguson said.

"That's the joy of tournament cricket and nice to bounce back in our last round.

"From our point of view, those nine games have got us to this position and we kind of all start from zero again. It will be a good challenge in the semifinal."

Pakistan bowling coach Morkel quits after WC flop

Pakistan's bowling coach Morne Morkel on Monday became the first man to quit the team's backroom staff following the former champion's exit from the World Cup in India.

The Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) said the 39-year-old has tendered his resignation. "Morkel has resigned as the bowling coach of the Pakistan men's team," said a PCB release.

"He was given a six-

month contract in June this year."

PCB said his replacement will be announced before the team's three-Test tour of Australia starting next month.

Enjoying the stint

Pakistan's team director Mickey Arthur said Morkel had enjoyed his brief stay in the job. "Morne was only contracted until January 2024 but his work with other leagues does not allow any more time unfortunately," said Arthur.

"He loved his time with

us and is very sad that he can't continue."

Skipper Babar Azam and Arthur are also under fire for the poor show of a team which was ranked as the world's top ODI side before the tournament. This is the fifth time in the last six World Cups that Pakistan failed to reach the semifinals.

Arthur's contract as head coach was not renewed after Pakistan's failed campaign in 2019. He is back in a second spell, this time as team director.

Sehwag, Diana Edulji and Aravinda inducted into ICC Hall of Fame

Former captain Diana Edulji on Monday became the first Indian woman cricketer to be inducted into the ICC Hall of Fame.

Legendary India opener Virender Sehwag and Sri Lankan World Cup winner Aravinda de Silva were also made members of ICC Hall of Fame for their stellar achievements during their playing career.

Trailblazer

A trailblazer in women's cricket, Edulji made just as big an impact on the field during her playing days when captain of India as she did as an administrator after her playing career.

"It indeed is a great honour to be the first Indian women cricketer to be inducted and join a galaxy of players, male and female from across the world," the 67-year-old said in an ICC release.

She played 54 matches for India across three decades (between 1976 and 1993) and made her mark as a slow left-arm orthodox spinner taking more than 100 wickets.

In her role as administrator with Western Railways, Edulji worked hard to increase employment opportunities for talented female cricketers in India, and helped shape the sports policy of Western and Indian Railways.

A destructive batter

Sehwag, one of the most destructive batters of the modern era, donned India colours between 1999 and 2013. He scored 23 Test

centuries during his illustrious career – the fifth most by an India men's player. His highest score of 319 against South Africa in Chennai in 2008 is the best ever by an Indian player.

The batter from Delhi, now 45, totalled 8,273 runs for India in 50-over cricket at an average of 35.05 and his 219 against the West Indies in Indore in 2011 remains the third-highest score achieved by a male cricketer in ODI. He also had 96 wickets from the 251 ODIs he played between 1999 and 2013.

Sehwag also played a pivotal role in helping India claim its second World Cup title in 2011. "I would like to thank the ICC and the jury for inducting me with this honour," Sehwag said. "I feel extremely grateful for having spent a great part of my life doing what I loved most, 'hitting the cricket ball'," he said.

Sri Lankan icon

A key member of Sri Lanka's 1996 World Cup-winning side, de Silva is an icon in the island nation. The stylish batter scored

20 Test centuries during a 19-year international career (1984 to 2003) – the third most hundreds by any Sri Lanka men's player – and was just as adept against the white-ball with another 11 centuries coming in 50-over cricket.

"I am filled with profound gratitude as I accept the immense honour of being inducted into the Hall of Fame. This achievement is a tribute to the dedication, sacrifice, and love that have shaped my cricketering journey," said de Silva.

Jhulan's tribute to Edulji, Jayawardena salutes Aravinda

Jhulan Goswami paid tribute to Diana Edulji who has been inducted into the ICC Hall of Fame.

"It is an absolute honour for you, but also a very proud moment for women's cricket in our country and a proud moment for India as a whole. It is so well deserved, you have been a pioneer for women's cricket in our country.

Your contributions over the years have been immense. It is not too much to say that the game would not be where it is in India without all your efforts.

From a personal perspective, one of the biggest regrets of my career was that I never got to play against you. Like many young cricketers in India, I had grown up reading about you in the record books. Women's cricket in India started in Mumbai in 1971 and you were there from the start.

We would read about your exploits, how you led the team and were so important to that side. As a player, your performances for the Indian cricket team in the 1970s and 1980s were legendary.

By 1997, you had retired from international cricket, but were still playing domestically. I remember playing in a tournament against Railways, but you did not play that game. I was just so excited to get the opportunity to meet you. After the game, I asked you what you thought of my bowling and you told me about the hard work it would take to

make it as an international.

Five years later, I made my debut for India, and it was fitting that you were one of the national selectors. From there, our relationship often involved you giving me advice when I was struggling, picking out what I needed to work on. Every time you made a point, it would turn out to be valid.

Mahela Jayawardena was all praise for Aravinda de Silva for being a big influence on his career, on and off the field.

"It is an honour to welcome you as the fourth Sri Lankan to be inducted to the ICC Hall of Fame though I can't help thinking that if you asked any of the three of us already there – Sanga [Kumar Sangakkara], Murali [Muttiah Muralitharan] or myself – we would all agree that it should have been you first.

We all grew up watching you and were part of a generation inspired by what you achieved. I remember the first time I met you, collecting your autograph when I was nine or 10. You were the new kid in the Sri Lankan team then but before long, you were our best batter. As young kids, we all looked at how you went about playing and tried to model our games on it.

I had coaches who told me to play a certain way but you showed the importance of adapting. Whether it was your stance or your backlift, it felt like you were consistently changing – it made it difficult to keep up!

Djokovic sinks Rune, stays top of the world

Novak Djokovic will finish the year as World No. 1 for a record-extending eighth time after beating Holger Rune 7-6(4), 6-7(1), 6-3 in his opening Green Group match at the ATP Finals on Sunday.

The 24-time Grand Slam champion needed just one win or a defeat for young rival Carlos Alcaraz in order to secure top spot in the ATP rankings for 2023 and prevailed in a three-hour Green Group clash with spirited debutant Rune.

Djokovic, on a run of 19 straight wins, has had an age-defying year, winning three Slams to become the all-time record winner of Major titles.

The 36-year-old came into the Finals in Turin off the back of his seventh triumph at the Paris Masters, his 40th victory at a Masters 1000 event.

Seventh crown beckons

Djokovic is also hunting a seventh Finals title which would take him one ahead of retired great Roger Federer.

"It means a lot. You could see that there were a lot of emotions on the court," said Djokovic.

"I could feel it, I was very eager to win the match and get that monkey off my back... Obviously a big objective, a big goal has been achieved, everything else now is a bonus."

Home hope Jannik Sinner got off to a near-perfect start by beating Stefanos Tsitsipas in straight sets, 6-4, 6-4, delighting the crowd in Italy's northwest.

Zverev bests Alcaraz

Meanwhile in the Red Group, Alexander Zverev got off to a winning start by battling back from a set down to beat Carlos Alcaraz 6-7(3), 6-3, 6-4.

Premier League leader Manchester City and Chelsea slugged out a magnificent 4-4 draw at Stamford Bridge with former City youngster Cole Palmer levelling for the host with a stoppage-time penalty on Sunday.

City scored first when Spanish defender Marc Cucurella pulled Haaland's shirt to concede a VAR-checked penalty which the Norwegian coolly converted in the 24th minute. Five minutes later Chelsea's 39-year-old Brazilian defender Thiago Silva headed the ball into the net.

Former City forward Raheem Sterling tapped in after a Josko Gvardiol stumble in defence allowed Reece James to cross in the 37th minute.

But Chelsea's lead lasted less than 10 minutes before defender Manuel Akanji rose to head City's equaliser in first-half injury time.

Haaland bundled in his second a minute after the restart, but in the 67th minute of a breathless second

half, the home side equalised through Nicolas Jackson.

Rodri's 86th-minute strike seemed to have won it for the champions only for them to concede a 94th-minute penalty that Palmer blasted home.

to reach 200 goals in English football and become the first player in the club's history to score in each of their first six home league games of a season.

Canada completed a team-tennis double on Sunday as the women took the Billie Jean King Cup for the first time, winning both singles rubbers to build an unassailable lead over Italy. Canada's men are the reigning Davis Cup champion after winning their first title in Malaga last November.

Marina Stakusic, an 18-year-old, opened the final in Seville with a 7-5, 6-3 victory over Martina Trevisan, capping a stunning week for the rookie. Leylah Fernandez then beat Jasmine Paolini 6-2, 6-3, to spark jubilation from the Canadian team.

"I'm extremely happy, ecstatic," said Fernandez. "Leylah played her role as leader and that made all

We are well prepared for 2026 World Cup Qualifiers: Chhetri

Talismanic India striker Sunil Chhetri believes his team is "strong" and "more prepared" than previous occasions to make it to the next round of the FIFA World Cup 2026 Qualifiers.

The 39-year-old will lead India in Round 2 of the World Cup Qualifiers and AFC Asian Cup Saudi Arabia 2027 Joint Qualification campaign when it takes on Kuwait in the opening away tie on Thursday.

"I think it is just the morale of the team, or what has happened in the last 6-8 months. A lot of boys have taken their places in the team. And that is why we are probably more prepared," Chhetri told AIFF on Monday.

"Also, the World Cup

Qualifiers are happening at a time when a lot of us have a decent amount of game time under our belts. All

these things do matter." India will play matches against Kuwait, Qatar and Afghanistan, and the cap-

tain said the team will not be taken aback by the playing styles of their opponents.

"We played Kuwait twice a few months back, so we have better knowledge of them. We have played Qatar at least thrice in the last three years. And we always know Afghanistan. Barring the away tie in Kuwait, we are aware of the atmosphere for the away matches against Afghanistan and Qatar," said Chhetri.

Chhetri also added that India will rely more on teamwork than individual flair to give a tough fight to its rivals.

"I think we are at the right stage. This team probably is a strong side. It's a team that has played together for some time. And a lot of youngsters are

there."

Chhetri, though, said that to translate home success on foreign soil, hard work and tweaks in method would be an absolute necessity.

"At home, we have done decently well. In away games, we haven't. If we have to go to the next round and be among the 18 best teams in Asia, we have to rectify our method," Chhetri said.

India had beaten Kuwait 5-4 on penalties to clinch the ninth SAFF Championship title earlier this year but Chhetri warned that playing the side in its home could be tougher.

"Now the local fans are probably going to be hostile against us. Kuwait will be different because all teams are different when they play at home."

The short ball – Shreyas Iyer’s nemesis no more

It may feel strange to mention Shreyas, short-pitched, and pull in the same sentence, but the former got him to his first World Cup century while the latter turned out to be his most productive shot in the match against the Netherlands

Shreyas Iyer got his first World Cup century on Sunday, off 84 balls, against the Netherlands at the M. Chinnaswamy Stadium in Bengaluru. This hundred, his fourth in the format, came on the back of his 82 against Sri Lanka and 77 versus South Africa.

Shreyas reached the landmark with a single off a short ball, and his most productive shot of the evening was the pull shot. It may feel strange to mention Shreyas, short-pitched, and pull in the same sentence in a piece extolling his innings.

After all, Shreyas's problem with the short ball has been well documented. The issue, it seemed, was that he didn't have a defensive option against it, so he either went for an unconvincing pull or hopped awkwardly to defend instead of just swaying out of the line.

However, the story has been different this ODI World Cup. Trusted by captain Rohit Sharma and coach Rahul Dravid to deliver as India's No. 4, Shreyas has been the team's designated middle-order aggressor, whose job has been to take risks against specific bowlers.

"When you say it's a problem for me, what do you mean?" Shreyas had asked at

the post-match press conference after the win against Sri Lanka that sealed India's place in the semifinals. "Have you seen how many pull shots I've scored, especially those that have gone for four?"

Shreyas, though, didn't get off to the brightest of starts in this tournament, having been dismissed for a duck in the campaign opener against Australia in Chennai.

He was, in fact, out to the short ball against New Zealand and England. But there has since been an uptick in form for the Mumbai right-hander, thanks in part to his "temperament," as Dravid pointed out on the eve of the Netherlands game.

Shreyas has worked closely with Dravid since 2015 when the latter was with the Delhi Daredevils (now Delhi Capitals) as mentor. The association extended to the India A setup thereafter.

"Everyone will have areas that they need to work on and need to improve. There's no complete batsman who can say that I know everything or that I'm very good at everything," Dravid said.

"You're always going to have areas to improve. But at the end of the day, you have to be judged by the results you produce. And the runs you score and when you score them. And I think with Shreyas, [that's] one of the things that does stand out," he added.

From the time he came to bat against the Dutch, Shreyas was given a fair share of back-of-a-length deliveries. But it was no problem for him on a slightly easy-paced wicket.

The challenge for the opposition is that once Shreyas is set, you have to wait for him to manufacture a dismissal. If not the short ball, the next best way to get him out is when he steps out to a spinner and misses, or when he has scored more than a hundred and is looking to inflict more damage. Unfortunately for the Netherlands, none of the above transpired.

Brutal response

The pacers resorted to the slower balls, which became predictable after a point and were dealt with brutally. When it was on his legs, Shreyas flicked it or just worked it around to rotate the strike.

He may not be the best player of the short ball, but you will not find Shreyas lacking in willingness to strive harder.

That quality in a flamboyant batter such as him is rare to find.

"My last few innings have given me a lot of confidence. It wasn't an easy wicket to start on, so I knew I had to make the most of getting a good start," Shreyas said after the win against the Netherlands.

Shreyas had recently argued that since

he has played most of his cricket on the high-bounce pitches in Mumbai, he was confident of facing the rising deliveries.

"Coming from Mumbai, especially from Wankhede, the bounce is pretty much even, and it bounces way more than any other pitches. I've played the majority of my games here, so I know how to tackle it. It's just that when I go to hit some shots, you are bound to get out, and sometimes it may work, sometimes it may not.

"And the majority of the time it hasn't worked for me; maybe that's the reason you think it's a problem for me, but in my mind, I know there's no problem," Shreyas had said.

There was evidence that Shreyas had worked on how he played the short stuff. Admittedly, most bouncers by the Netherlands quicks were not the best Shreyas has had to face, but there were signs he had made a conscious attempt to get inside the line and shown enough patience before unfurling an array of pull shots.

On Sunday, as he walked back to the dressing room, unbeaten on 128 off 94 balls, Shreyas would know he had repaid the faith with yet another show of strength. But sterner tests await in the first semifinal against New Zealand in Mumbai on Wednesday.

Sinner's red-orange hair, the carrot idea and the Carota Boys' club

They've quickly become some of the most recognisable fans in tennis. And what began as a spur of the moment idea between six supporters of Jannik Sinner to dress up as carrots has turned into a fully sponsored globe-trotting enterprise.

After first appearing at the Italian Open in May, the orange-clad 'Carota Boys' quickly picked up support from one of Sinner's sponsors and were sent to cheer for their favourite player at the French Open, Wimbledon and the U.S. Open.

Orders for T-shirts featuring the Carota Boys' logo have come in from Brazil, Greece, Switzerland, France and the United States.

"It's all been far beyond anything we could have imagined," said Carota Boys member Enrico Ponsi.

Last week, the group of six boyhood friends were treated to a private meeting with their idol.

"They're almost more famous than I am," Sinner said. "I got the names but I still got a little bit confused because they have these good-looking costumes with the carota.

"It's great to have this dedicated fan club. It's growing, so I'm happy for them," Sinner added. "It's funny."

The carrot idea is partly a tribute to Sinner's red-orange hair and how he ate carrots instead of the more common banana during a changeover at a tournament in Vienna in 2019. "Carota" is the Italian word for carrot.

Closer to their roots

While they've been around the globe recently, this week the carrots are staying closer to their roots.

That's because the ATP Finals in Turin is located just an hour's drive from the Carota Boys' hometown of Revello.

"Whereas at other tournaments we've had to leave after a few days, this one we can attend all week," Ponsi said before Sinner opened the tournament with a convincing win over Stefanos Tsitsipas on Sunday.

So who are the Carota Boys? They're all in their 20s – only slightly older than the 22-year-old Sinner.

Besides Ponsi, there's Gianluca Bertorello, Alessandro Dedominici, Lorenzo Ferrato, Francesco Gaboardi

and Alberto Mondino.

Ponsi and Dedominici are into agriculture, Bertorello is a baker and the others are office-goers.

"We bought the costumes on the Internet," Ponsi said.

Since the Carota Boys made their debut in Rome, Sinner has risen from No. 8 to No. 4 in the rankings – making him the highest-ranked Italian man since Adriano Panatta nearly a half century ago.

But it's not just Sinner's performance that the Carota Boys appreciate. "He's a simple guy like us," Ferrato said. "He's a very humble guy. So we love this aspect of him."

"We appreciate his modesty and his simplicity. He behaves well on the court and he never says anything out of place off the court. He's a very respectful kid," added Ponsi.

Expect to see the Carota Boys out in full force when Sinner takes on top-ranked Novak Djokovic on Tuesday. Other fans have also been getting involved with the orange theme by wearing orange-colored wigs.

"It fills us with pride that others are following our lead," Ponsi said, "We're hoping to color the entire arena orange."

Unravelling the secrets of swing in cricket with physics

A study found that the coefficient of friction doubles when humidity is increased by 20% and decreases only thereafter, thanks to hydrogen bonds. So in moist weather, the coefficient of friction can increase. This may be why India's batters lost three early wickets against Australia in Chennai

Cricket matches under day-night conditions are associated with shifts in humidity and moisture. However, most cricket teams' captains have not displayed awareness that choosing to bowl first in a day-night game - because dew is expected later - carries specific risks.

Fans of the sport are aware of the 'dew factor': water vapour condenses on the ground in the evening, creating a slippery surface. As a result, spinners have a harder time getting the ball to grip and fast bowlers have more trouble producing swing and seam. Fielding on a slippery ground is also obviously harder.

As a result of these changes in ground conditions, batters appear to have an advantage under dew, as they face less swing, less spin, and less lateral movement of the ball. (Sometimes, fast bowlers release the ball at a certain angle into its flight path. As a result, air flow is turbulent on one side of the ball and streamlined on the other. This causes a sudden pressure difference that causes the ball to deviate from its path in a motion called its swing.) Batters also expect the ball to skid off the bat under dew, and expect opportunities to maintain a higher run rate with less effort.

For these reasons, most captains winning the toss in day-night matches prefer to bowl first and bat second.

Friction isn't so straightforward
A closer analysis of the physics of friction suggests that the belief that dew always increases slipperiness is scientifically flawed. Friction is reduced only when the water film in between is thick enough to reduce the amount of physical contact between two surfaces. When the thickness is below a certain threshold, it increases the overall friction because the water molecules interact more strongly with the two surfaces due to adhesive forces.

A recent study led by Liang Peng of the University of Amsterdam found that the coefficient of friction doubled when humidity was increased by 20% and decreased only thereafter. The scientists attributed this to hydrogen bonds that formed as a result of electrostatic forces. Thus, in moist weather, the coefficient of friction increases, advantaging the bowler. This may have been why India's batters lost three early wickets in the match against Australia in Chennai.

Bowling speed also has some impact on the friction. The work of German physicist Richard Stribeck on friction has shown that for a given layer of lubricant - such as a film of water on a bat or a ball - friction increases when the speed of interaction between two surfaces is higher than a threshold value. So in wet conditions, fast bowlers can use this feature to force the ball to grip more by launching it at a higher speed.

Effects of weather conditions
Cricketers have also displayed the belief that the dew content negatively influences swing. In specific weather conditions, there is one optimum bowling speed, one optimum seam angle, and one desirable spin rate. If the

delivery speed is less than the optimal value, the spin will need to be increased to generate a certain amount of swing.

The ball's trajectory through the air also creates an asymmetric flow field around its surface, which produces the so-called Magnus force. The strength of the force increases when the temperature is lower and there is more moisture in the air. That is, changes in air density have a strong influence on the swing.

For example, if the temperature drops from 25° C to 15° C, the air density will increase by 4%, and the ball's deviation due to swing can increase by an inch. The effect is minor but the outcomes can be significant.

Here's another relatively less-known fact: when the air temperature drops, sunlight causes less turbulence in the air above the pitch, giving bowlers more control. The success of Indian bowlers Mohammed Shami and Jasprit Bumrah in the ongoing ICC Men's Cricket World Cup may well be due to this effect.

Instead, their chances can improve if they maintain a particular level of moisture content on their gloves and soles, while avoiding six-hitting.

Ins and outs of the DLS method
Cricketers playing a game in wet weather also need to contend with the peculiarities of the Duckworth-Lewis-Stern (DLS) method. The prospect of rain forces captains to prefer risk-free play that preserves wickets. This is because the DLS method works with the ratio of runs scored to resources used, and the resources are the number of overs and wickets available.

According to the DLS method, when setting a target, Team A's score per unit resource is multiplied by Team B's resources. The 'worth' of a ball and wicket in percentage terms are derived from data in a sliding four-year window.

For example, if Team A batting first scores 150 runs in 25 overs and loses four wickets, it will have used 50% of its resources according to the DLS method. If the team had known that it would bat only for 25 overs, its members may

have tried to score more even at the expense of the remaining wickets. In this setting, the DLS method assumes that Team B has more resources, and sets it a higher target to compensate for the denial of resources to Team A.

If rain shortens the game such that Team B has 25 overs left plus 10 wickets in hand, the method estimates Team B to have 66.5% of its resources remaining. So it is expected to score 16.5% more runs than Team A did in 25 overs. Thus we have a target of 175 in 25 overs for a draw and 176 runs for a win.

Key drawbacks of the DLS method are that it can't factor in the quantitative values of each team and that it favours teams that maintain a low run-rate and keep wickets in hand. In addition, the method also neglects the fact that, when after rain, Team B will have to play with a very damp pitch, which will influence its run-making abilities even while advantaging Team A, which can reap more gains if it knows how to use friction to achieve its goals.

For these reasons, our cricketers must be made fully aware of the intricacies of playing with dew and moisture, and ensure future wins.

Starry Euclid images spur probe of 'dark universe'

European astronomers have released the first images from the newly launched Euclid space telescope, designed to unlock the secrets of dark matter and dark energy, hidden forces thought to make up 95% of the universe.

The European Space Agency (ESA), which leads the six-year mission with NASA as a partner, said the images were the sharpest of their kind, showcasing the telescope's ability to monitor billions of galaxies up to 10 billion light years away.

The images spanned four areas of the relatively nearby universe, including 1,000 galaxies belonging to the massive Perseus cluster just 240 million light-years away, and more than 100,000 galaxies spread out in the background, ESA said.

Scientists believe vast, seemingly organised structures such as Perseus could only have formed if dark matter exists.

Tell-tale signs of the hidden force exerted by dark matter include galaxies rotating more quickly than scientists would expect from the amount of visible matter that can be detected.

Its influence is also implicated in pulling together some of the most massive structures in the universe, like clusters of galaxies.

Dark energy is even more enigmatic. Its

hypothetical existence was established only in the 1990s by studying exploding stars called supernovas, resulting in a 2011 Nobel Prize shared between three U.S.-born scientists.

Thanks in part to observations from the earlier Hubble Space Telescope, they concluded that the universe was not only expanding but that the pace of expansion was accelerating - a stunning discovery attributed to the new concept of dark energy.

After initial commissioning and technical teething problems, including stray light and guidance issues, Euclid will now start piecing together a 3D map encompassing about a third of the sky to detect tiny variations attributable to the dark universe.

By gaining new insights into dark energy and matter, scientists hope to better grasp the formation and distribution of galaxies across the so-called cosmic web of the universe.

Although the mission is designed to last six years, ESA hopes Euclid has another six months of propellant to keep it in solar orbit some 1.5 million km away from the earth at Lagrange point 2, or L2 - a position of gravitational stability that is also home to NASA's James Webb Space Telescope.

Other images released by ESA included an irregular galaxy thought to resemble building blocks of the universe and a spiral formation known as the "Hidden Galaxy": a lookalike of our home galaxy usually obscured by light and dust within the Milky Way.
