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One voter, two States, two votes

Over 3,000 voters in 14 villages along the Maharashtra-Telangana boundary get to vote in both States, thanks to an ongoing dispute

mid the desolate hilly terrain between Jivti taluk of Chandrapur district in Maharashtra and Kerameri mandal in Kumuram Bheem Asifabad district in Telangana are 14 villages in the Parandoli and Anthapur gram panchayats. Here, 3,023 residents, of a population of nearly 5,000, have the power of the vote in both Maharashtra and Telangana

Both gram panchayats, dependent on the Maharashtra and Telangana governments, and the residents participate in almost all elections on both sides, says Laxman Kamble, the first sarpanch of Parandoli, elected in 1995.

With polling to the Telangana Assembly on November 30, these villages, predominantly occupied by Marathi-speaking Scheduled Caste (SC) communities, will exercise their voting right owing to an unresolved boundary dispute. The population includes Lambada tribespeople and Muslims who had migrated from drought-hit Nanded, Parbhani, Latur, and Jalna dis-

tricts of Marathwada between 1970 and 1971 in search of a livelihood. The candidates are actively campaigning in these hilly areas, recognising the significance of the villages in the electoral landscape.

"We vote in both States' elections, but several of our problems, including road connectivity, healthcare and higher education remain unresolved," says Pundalik Waghmare, a Dalit farmer from Parandoli.

Kumaar Mohalla, a locality in central Kashmir, was abuzz with unprecedented activities this November, kilns running with throughout the day. The only time we would take breaks was during daily namaz," he said.


Kashmir Valley has a minuscule Hindu population. However, with the growing number of jawans, migrant

Atishi initiates inquiry in corruption case 'linked' to Chief Secy.

Vigilance Minister Atishi has initiated an inquiry into a corruption allegation linked to Chief Se-

cretary Naresh Kumar.

The case pertains to a land deal which allegedly led to undue benefits to one of the landowners, who is said to be linked to the employer of Mr. Kumar's son.

The Minister sought all files related to the case while stating that "no files concerning the matter are to be processed through the Chief Secretary since he is the subject of the inquiry and therefore has a conflict of interest"

According to the allegation, a 19-acre parcel in south-west Delhi's Bamnoli village was acquired by the National Highways Authority of India (NHAI) for the Dwarka Expressway project.

CM YK As per media reports, the price of the land was increased from ₹41.52 crore to ₹353.79 crore.

Subsequently, the Union Ministry of Home Affairs initiated action against then South West Delhi District Magistrate Hemant Kumar for approving the enhanced compensation.

The son-in-law of one of the landowners is the director of a firm that employs the Chief Secretary's son, the reports added.

Responding to the allegations, the Chief Secretary had on Friday described the action as a "vendetta", saying it was he who had recommended action against the now-suspended officer who had allegedly approved the enhanced compensation.

The Chief Minister had earlier this week asked Ms. Atishi to launch a probe into the land deal.



rime Minister Narendra Modi on Saturday announced the constitution of a committee soon to empower the Dalit communities and ensure justice for the Madiga community.

The Madigas have been fighting for their proportional quota within the SC reservation for about three decades. Constituting around 60% of the SC population in Telangana, political analysts estimate them to be influential in 20-25 Assembly constituencies.

'Double-engine govt.'

"From today onwards, Manda Krishna, founder of the Madiga Reservation Porata Samithi (MRPS), is my leader in the movement to end the decades of injustice being done to the community. I will be on his side till I ensure justice for all of you," he said, addressing the Madiga community gathered in large numbers at the 'Vishwaroopa Mahasabha' of the downtrodden sections organised by the MRPS in Hyderabad on Saturday.

Reiterating that it was only the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) that would en-

He said that he was committed to take the fight of the Madiga community, which commenced in Telangana (then part of undivided Andhra Pradesh) in

1994, to its logical conclusion.

The Prime Minister announced that the Food Corporation of India would procure 20 lakh tonnes of boiled rice produced in the kharif season from Telangana and asked the Bharat Rashtra Samithi (BRS) government not to delay the procurement process in the name of elections as the model code of conduct currently in force would not come in the way of

helping the farming community.

Targeting BRS, Cong. He accused BRS leader K. Chandrashekhar Rao of "encroaching" upon the CM's chair after promising to place a Dalit on it. Sachin Pilot finds unlikely ally in BSP candidate in Tonk

Former Rajasthan Deputy Chief Minister Sachin Pilot received a shot in the arm on Saturday, when the Bahujan Samaj Party (BSP) candidate Ashok Bairwa announced in the presence of local influential leaders that he would campaign for Mr. Pilot in Tonk in the upcoming State Assembly polls.

Mr. Pilot, who had won from Tonk in the 2018 State elections, has been fielded from the same constituency again by the ruling Congress party, where he is up against Ajit Singh Mehta, the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) candidate.

Wields influence

His new ally Mr. Bairwa, a former Congress member, also heads the Bhim Sena – an Ambedkarite social organisation – in the district, and wields considerable influence among the Dalit community in the constituency.

Mr. Bairwa said he wanted to withdraw his candidature, but could not do it due to paucity of time on the last day of withdrawal of nominations.

"I am impressed with Mr. Pilot's ideology. He is working for the upliftment of the poor. My supporters [in Tonk] will work wholeheartedly to ensure his victory," Mr. Bairwa said.

Mr. Pilot, who has been touring the villages in his constituency for the past

three days, is engaged in a damage control exercise with regard to a handful of Congress rebels who have also filed for nomination. He has so far succeeded in convincing all of them – Naimuddin, Mohsin Rashid Khan, Abul Qadir and Umar Baig – to withdraw their candidature.

Meanwhile, in a blow to the BJP, which is attempting to consolidate the Hindu vote in the constituency, some of its party workers, led by the party's city unit general secretary Ramdayal Bairwa, joined the Congress on Saturday.

Following the withdrawal of nominations by the rival contestants, six candidates are left in the fray against Mr. Pilot. They are BJP's Mr. Mehta, Azad Samaj Party's Mohammed Shoaib Khan, People's Green Party's Ganesh, Social Democratic Party of India's Abdul Lateef, and Independents Sitra Ram and Jagdish Prasad Verma.

Kerala farmer ends life after banks deny loan; blames govt.

A paddy farmer from Thakazhi in Kerala's Kuttanad, died by suicide allegedly after banks denied him agriculture loan. The deceased has been identified as K.G. Prasad, 55.

In a phone call he made to his friend before he died and a note allegedly written by him, which was recovered from his house, Prasad accused the State government and a few banks of pushing him to take the extreme step. He was heard telling his friend that he was in a financial crisis and banks recently denied him a loan for cultivating paddy in the up-

coming *puncha* (first) crop season citing a low CIBIL score. A Credit Information Bureau (India) Limited (CIBIL) score is an indicator of how well one has managed one's finances.

Prasad added he received the paddy procurement price for the last season from a bank as post-harvest credit on the production of paddy receipt sheet (PRS). "It is the government's responsibili-

ty to repay the PRS loan with interest. But it failed to fulfil its responsibility and it affected my CIBIL score. When I approached the banks for a fresh loan, they denied it. I have no money to buy fertilizer. I have failed in my life," he was heard in the voice recording of the phone call.

Prasad was a BJP activist and had served as district president of the Bharatiya Kisan Sangh.

BJP workers staged a roadblock on the Ambalappuzha-Thiruvalla State Highway with Prasad's body in a show against the government's apathy towards farmers.

For Jharkhand Cong., it's yesterday once more

Bracing for the Lok Sabha elections, the Jharkhand Congress has launched a unique initiative to bolster its numbers in the State in the form of a campaign rooted in sentimentality – one that aptly calls itself 'Aa Ab Laut Chalein' (Come, let's return now).

'Clean slate'

Named after the 1999 movie starring Akshaye Khanna and Aishwarya Rai, the campaign targets former Congress leaders who quit the party, or those previously associated with it. These leaders are being invited to return to the party with the promise of a clean slate.

State Congress president

Rajesh Thakur is of the opinion that because the legacy of the 'Grand Old Party' dates back to pre-Independent India, a soft corner for the Congress persists even today. "Ninety per cent of India's population supported Congress before Independence, and after that, several leaders joined other newly formed political parties, but most people's forefathers were Congressmen," he said.

The charm of the campaign has worked on many. One of the former members who has been persuaded to return to the Congress is Geeta Shree Oraon, former MLA from Sisai and daughter of prominent tribal leader and Congress MP Kartik Oraon. She had resigned last January, but upon being wel-

comed back into the fold, said, "I do feel that in the larger perspective, Congress is a very strong party and can defeat the BJP, and prevent a hattrick in 2024."

Praising Rahul Gandhi's 'Bharat Jodo Yatra', she added: "People have taken note of [the *yatra*] and the way he connects with the people. An example is the Karnataka election."

The aim is to bring back former leaders who quit the party, or those previously associated with it

But perhaps the larger appeal of the campaign lies in its outreach to not only former members, but also the general public, the young and the uninitiated. Although the campaign is just over a week old, more than a thousand people have already joined the party.

With regard to a special focus on rural areas, Mr. Thakur said, "Panchayat heads and district council members are joining the party besides just former MLAs. People in rural areas could be great assets at the

time of elections since they have a sense of ground reality. These people were Congressmen, but exploited by other political parties, and now have been given an open platform to return."

The campaign is widely seen as an attempt to expand the party's base ahead of the Lok Sabha and Jharkhand Assembly elections. The Jharkhand Congress has also formed coordination committees in all 14 LS constituencies, and deputed them to work at the grassroot level.

The State party leadership is also working on a national workshop called the Leadership Development Mission to elevate the party's influence in seats reserved for the Scheduled Castes and the Scheduled Tribes.

National capital waits with bated breath as it keeps date with the annual Deepavali test

The air quality in the national capital, which saw a drastic improvement after Friday's downpour, could deteriorate after Deepavali, with many likely to defy the prohibition on bursting firecrackers in the city.

The Capital has been breathing hazardous air for the past week.

On November 5, the Delhi government ordered the closure of all primary schools and restricted the entry of trucks after the concentration of poisonous pollutant PM2.5 in the city was recorded at over 20 times the limit prescribed by the World Health Organization.

A day later, Delhi Environment Minister Gopal Rai said the government would implement the oddscheme in the city for a week starting from November 13.

vehicle-rationing

Decision on odd-evenHowever, after Frida

However, after Friday's rain, Mr. Rai said the government will study the air pollution metrics after Deepavali, based on which it will decide how to go forward with the odd-even policy.

Under the odd-even vehicle-rationing scheme, vehicles with registration numbers ending with even digits are allowed to run on even dates and those with odd numbers are allowed to run on odd dates.

The Delhi police have seized over 10,000 kg of firecrackers in the city till November 8.

The highest number of violations were reported from East Delhi, from

Meanwhile, a 21-yearold man died in a blast in

city to north-east Delhi's Welirsting come while trying to mix sulphur and potash to 1-yearlast in sonal use. High pollution levels have persisted in the city since October 28.

The government subsequently enforced several restrictions to curb air pollution, including a prohibition on construction and demolition.

'Bad air' likely

According to official data, the air quality is likely to deteriorate over the next three days, with no rain expected over the next few days.

According to the Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB), the air quality of Delhi improved to the lower end of the 'poor' category on Saturday, compared with the 'severe' level on Thursday.

Delhi's 24-hour average air quality index (AQI) was 220 at 4 p.m. on Saturday, down from 437 on Thursday.

However, the Central government's Air Quality Early Warning System has predicted poorer air quality from Sunday till November 14, with pollution likely to reach the 'severe' level on Monday, a day after Deepavali.

According to the CPCB, an AQI reading between zero and 50 is considered 'good', 51 and 100 'satisfactory', 101 and 200 'moderate', 201 and 300 'poor', 301 and 400 'very poor', and 401 and 500 'severe'.

Migrant workers hit

Meanwhile, migrant labourers in the Capital have been hit the hardest by the government's decision to ban construction and demolition activities, forcing the workers to return home.

Rajbir, a resident of

West Singhbhum district in Jharkhand, has been coming to the city for the past three years to earn around ₹15,000-20,000 a month.

"Last year, I stayed back

because the Delhi government had promised to pay us [an allowance] for the days during which construction work was banned. But I did not get a single penny," he said.

This year, with little to no clarity on any monetary assistance, the 21-year-old worker is heading home.

Animesh, 19, who came to Delhi from Dhanbad, said he would not have come to the Capital had he known about the city's yearly pollution problem. "I am going back less

than a month after coming here. I did not even receive a month's pay," he said. (With inputs from Alisha

One voter, two States, two votes

People in the 14 villages draw benefits of social welfare schemes from both the States. "We have two voter cards, two Aadhaars, and get rations and pensions from both States. KCR [Telangana Chief Minister K. Chandrashekhar Rao] also gives us the Kalyana Lakshmi scheme [financial assistance to the bride's family], but neither of them gives us pattas [title deeds] for our lands we have been cultivating for decades," said Subhabai Mallahari Waghmare, 60, from Parandoli.

These villages have two Anganwadi centres, two primary healthcare centres, two water tanks, and two schools (Marathi- and Telugu-medium) run by the two State governments. In a country where jobs are sparse, people have two MGNREGS job cards. Each village even has two sarpanches. In these rural areas, walls serve as billboards for welfare schemes implemented, in both States in Marathi and Telugu.

"We are not worried about 'one nation, one election' and don't want to give up our dual voting right, as that could curtail our double benefits without any legal solution," a villager said.

A history of separation

The issue dates back to the unresolved tensions that arose during the linguistic reorganisation of States in 1956. This dispute led to inter-State tensions, more so when the Andhra Pradesh government set up polling stations in these villages for the first time during the 1989 election. (Telangana was carved out of Andhra Pradesh on June 2, 2014). It was further escalated in 1999 when the Andhra Pradesh High Court ruled that the villages be part of the Telugu State.

Maharashtra contested this decision in the Supreme Court, leading to a debate about dual voting, though the matter remained unresolved as elections were held separately in Chandrapur (in Maharashtra) and the united Adilabad district (in undivided A.P.) in 2004. That year, when the Election Commission mandated that voters choose a single constituency, Mr. Kamble recalled the impact: women voted in the Chandrapur constituency while men voted in Adilabad. "But now, we don't have that problem. We vote in both elections," said Waman Pawar of Maharajguda.

The Election Commission will be setting up four polling stations in the disputed villages for the forthcoming Assembly election. Telangana Chief Electoral Officer Vikas Raj, said, "After the delimitation process in 2006, these villages were included in the 005-Asifabad constituency. In 2004, recognising the territorial dispute, the Election Commission issued instructions to the CEOs of Andhra Pradesh and Maharashtra to take measures to avoid double voting."

NIA files chargesheet in Khalistan outfit case

Operating from the Philippines, Ammy and Amrik Singh were actively engaged in inducting the youth into the KTF. Their activities extended to smuggling of arms and explosives from Pakistan, as well as carrying out extortion and the subsequent channelling of the crime proceeds for terrorist activities, the agency said.

The accused facing chargesheet, at the behest of Arsh Dalla, raised funds for the KTF. The terrorist group had carried out targeted killings and firings at the residences of potential victims, coercing them into complying with their extortion demands. The NIA investigation allegedly revealed that extortion funds were being systematically transferred to various foreign countries through both banking and non-banking channels. "These illicit financial transactions were aimed at fuelling terrorist activities in India," it said. The KTF operatives were involved in regular recruitment and handling of their terror syndicate associates from abroad. They were also involved in the smuggling of arms, ammunition, and explosives from across the border through drones, it added.

Earlier, the NIA had filed a chargesheet against nine accused persons in the same case on July 22. It said that 12 other members of the KTF and their associates linked to the Babbar Khalsa International are currently under investigation.

One lakh orders light up Kashmir's pottery scene

"The modern way of life brought down the use of earthen utensils in Kashmir, denting sales. The past three years, however, have seen a revival of sorts. Diwali has played a role in it. Besides, glazed pottery is again in fashion in Kashmir, making pottery a viable option to earn our living," Mr. Umar, a commerce graduate, said. He has hired two additional workers to meet the demand of about

20,000 lamps this season. The localities of potters in Zewan, Lethpora, Nishat and Rainawari too chipped in to meet the demand. "We are getting orders from Jammu and outside," Mr. Umar said. A rough estimate from the kilns in Srinagar and Ganderbal districts suggested that over 1 lakh lamps have been supplied from the Valley this year for Deepavali.

The revival of the pottery sector in Kashmir is spurred on by the introduction of electricity-driven wheels and spinners, making it less labour-intensive. This year, the government announced training, credit, and market support for potters in Kashmir under the PM Vishwakarma Kaushal

Drug smugglers find new route via Mizoram, evade clashes-hit Manipur

Traffickers of narcotic substances from Assam and Mizoram have used excavators to carve a 10-km path from the International Border to the nearest habitation in the neighbouring country, officials say; the track starts from the Tiau river, which marks India's border with Myanmar

ndian smugglers and their local contacts on either side of the International Border used excavators to carve out a 10km "jeepable road" in Myanmar for a new drug route through Mizoram, officials said.

Dawn is the name of the nearest habitation from Lungkawlh, a village in Serchhip district in central Mizoram near the border with Myanmar.

Officials of the State's Excise and Narcotics Department discovered the track from the Tiau river – it marks India's border with Myanmar – to Dawn after smugglers began using the route to avoid the ethnic conflict-scarred Manipur, considered a more strategic and convenient passage.

A couple of couriers caught by the State police carrying heroin and a 10-kg bundle of methamphetamine pills a few months ago confessed to members of the ring forcing the track through the hilly terrain with excavators.

The Tiau has ankle to knee-deep water for most part of the year and its rocky bed allows easy crossing. The river runs southward along the international edge of Saitual dis-

trict through Champhai, Serchhip, and Hnahthial district where it meets the Tuichang river and flows onward Chhimtuipui.

"Drug trafficking controlled largely by some people in [southern Assam's] Karimganj district has always been a problem for Mizoram. But the volume of smuggling increased after Manipur started burning on May 3, disrupting the Moreh-Tamu route," Peter Zohmingthanga, Deputy Commissioner (Enforcement) of the Excise

and Narcotics Department, told The Hindu.

"Some 90% of the drugs that would have been smuggled in through Manipur during normal times find their way through the Zokhawthar area. Several agencies are intercepting consignments that find their way through Zokhawthar but the 10% being trafficked further south through Serchhip district from Dawn is a new worry because of remoteness and issues of accessibility," he

Mizoram Director-Gen-

eral of Police Anil Shukla admitted that the State has become a major transit for narcotic substances from Myanmar to other parts of India.

While Tiddim in Myanmar's Chin State feeds the narcotic substances to Zokhawthar, 234 km southeast of Mizoram's capital Aizawl, Dawn, also in Chin State, is serviced from Thlantlang, the nearest urban centre across the

Enforcement officials said a police checkpoint set up at Lungkawlh has made the drug smugglers take a diversion from Lungkawlh-Dawn 'road' north to Sailulak in the Serchhip district. Another "stopgap" route is from Dawn to Ngharchhip in the Hnahthial district south of Serchthrough Ralpel (Myanmar).

Meth worry

A series of seizures by the State agencies and the paramilitary Assam Rifles, authorised in March 2022 to seize and collect information under the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS) Act, have reportedly checked the inflow of drugs through Mizoram in the past couple of months.

"The terrain is tough and the Tiau is easy to cross at many stretches where it passes through hill-slope jungles on either side. We have caught several people, many of them [from] Myanmar, ferrying drugs in small and large quantities but many could be slipping through," Jeevan Kumar, the officer in charge at the Zokhawthar police station, said.

Zokhawthar, a border trade centre, is about 40 km from Champhai, the headquarters of the Champhai district. Both places are within the 16-km distance a Myanmar national is allowed to travel according to the free movement regime (FMR) agreed upon by the two countries.

"The traffickers usually move at night or dawn through jungle tracks, often on Kenbos [Myanmarmade two-wheelers illegal in India but used within the FMR]. On November 10, our teams seized 2.61 kg of heroin and cash totalling ₹19.52 crore from five Myanmar nationals in three different operations in Champhai district," an Assam Rifles officer posted on the India-Myanmar border said.

From January to October 2023, the Assam Rifles recovered 18 weapons, contraband items worth ₹74.03 crore, and drugs worth ₹911.28 crore from 131 Indians and 58 Myanmar nationals.

Officials of the State agencies contest the worth of drugs "as heroin and methamphetamine pills are sold at 1-5% of the price they command in India's metros".

"What is worrying is the spike in the smuggling of methamphetamine pills or crystal meth, increasingly popular among the youth as stimulants. From 9.108 kg between 2015 and 2018, the meth seizure from 2019 to 2022 jumped to 376.764 kg, which could be the tip of the iceberg," an Excise and Narcotics official said.

Inducing artificial rain to fix lingering pollution remains a nebulous science

The Delhi government's attempt to alleviate severe pollution in Delhi by resorting to artificial rain or cloud seeding is an experimental endeavour with no evidence so far that it will be successful in non-monsoon months. Though cloud seeding has been attempted since the 1940s and was pioneered by the United States military, having clouds deliver enough rain over a desired region continues to be a nebulous endeavour.

With air quality "severely" bad, the Delhi government met experts from the Indian Institute of Technology (IIT), Kanpur earlier this week, who plan to submit a proposal to the government, which will in turn submit it to the Supreme Court. The plan, the full details of which are not known, is to fly aircraft into rain clouds - which are anticipated in North India around November 20 and sprinkle a proprietary salt solution on them. Much like seeds sprayed on fertile soil, the hope is that

In principle, this works, but many factors must align for it to succeed, as the most exhaustive analysis of cloud seeding in India has found. Such an experiment in Solapur, Maharashtra over two monsoons in 2018 and 2019, the results of which were published in the Bulletin of the American Meteorological Society in October, concluded that seeding resulted in 18% more rainfall or about 8.67 mm more rainfall (or 867 million

litres of water) than in the absence of it. Solapur was chosen because it is a rainshadow region that normally receives little monsoon rain. Even so, the research team, consisting largely of atmospheric-research scientists from the **Indian Institute of Tropical** Meteorology, Pune, could find 276 "convective clouds". These are clouds with a minimum of 0.5 gm of water per sq. cm. of

Different cloud shapes

Thara Prabhakaran, the lead scientist for the experiment, said that differences in cloud shapes and their existing water consignificantly influenced the success with inducing artificial rain.

The ₹200 crore CAIPEX Cloud Aerosol Interaction and Precipitation Enhancement Experiment (CAI-PEEX Phase-4), as it was called, even tracked individual clouds to see the extent to which they were influenced by seeding. "Not all clouds are seedable, not all clouds will make rain. There are clouds that will get dissipated on seeding. Overall, however, there was a net increase of 18% [rainfall] in a 100 sq. km area. Our experiment was very controlled and we selected clouds based on their potential to make rain," Dr. Prabhakaran told The Hindu. Conducting the experi-

ment during pre-monsoon or post monsoon (as is the case in Delhi) could have different outcomes as the number of convective clouds were fewer and relatively lower in the atmosphere (and therefore having less water), Dr. Prabhakaran said. Some of the rain from the seeded clouds also drifted several kilometres beyond the marked area, she added.

The researchers at IIT-Kanpur, who are gearing up for the cloud seeding exercise, say that the 18% improvement in rainfall observed in the CAIPEX experiment was an encouraging reason to attempt cloud seeding to allay Delhi's pollution woes. Sachchida Nand Tripathi, Professor, , IIT-Kanpur, said, "Even a few millimetres of rain can go a long way in clearing the air."

India, EU taking key steps to advance ties + on maritime front

As India and the European defence and security cooperation, the EU's first Defence Attaché to the country took charge earlier this month while the two sides also conducted the first naval exercise together. Officials noted that the ambit of security cooperation is expanding especially with focus on the Indo-Pacific region.

"We have increased a

number of maritime exercises between EU and India... especially France and Italy. EU is now not only a trade and investment partner but also a security partner," an EU official said on the sidelines of a discussion organised by the think-tanks Council for Strategic and Defence Research and Konrad-Adenauer-Stiftung. "We are now focussing on security, energy, sensitive technologies," the official said, adding that there is lot of focus on digital connectivity.

Last week, Captain (Navy) Fabrizo Falzi, who has earlier served as the Italian Defence Attaché (DA) in India, took over as the first DA in the Delegation of the European Union in New Delhi. The EU has limited number of DAs worldwide and the appointment in India shows the importance the organisation attaches to the ties, another EU official noted.

"The Government of India reserves the right, on the principle of reciprocity, to avail suitable reciprocal arrangement, as and when required," the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) said in a letter accepting the appointment.

Recently, India and Italy signed a defence cooperation agreement. The offi-

agreement between space agencies. India and Europe are the terminals of the India-Middle East-Europe Economic Corridor (IMEC) corridor which was announced on the sidelines of the G20 leaders summit in September.

Maiden naval exercise On October 24, India and

EU conducted their first joint naval exercise in the Gulf of Guinea which saw the participation of Indian Navy's INS Sumedha, an offshore patrol vessel, joined by Italian navy ship ITS Foscari, French navy ship FS Ventôse, and Spanish navy ship Tornado, the Indian Navy said in a statement. The exercise followed the third meeting of the EU-India Maritime Security Dialogue on October 5 in Brussels.

The four ships practised

a series of tactical manoeuvres in international waters off the coast of Ghana, including a boarding exercise, a flying exercise using the helicopters embarked on French ship Ventôse and INS Sumedha, and transfer of personnel between ships, the Navy said. "This exercise was followed by a knowledge sharing session in Accra, Ghana which built on the joint experience at sea to operational improve know-how."

Uttarakhand govt. plans to hold special Assembly session amid buzz over UCC

The Uttarakhand government is planning to call a special Assembly session in the second half of November, during which it intends to pass one of two much-awaited Bills - either the Uniform Civil Code (UCC), or a proposal for 10% horizontal reservation for statehood agitators and their dependents - according to sources in the government.

A Secretary-level official confirmed to The Hindu that orders have been issued to start preparations for the special session, though its dates have still not been decided.

"We have been told that we should be ready for the session which can be called anytime after the Deepavali holiday. The Bills that may get tabled in

the session are either UCC or reservation for Rajya Andolankaris [statehood agitators] and their dependents," he said.

The official also confirmed that the committee formed by the Uttarakhand government in June last year to examine means for the implementation of UCC in the State has not yet submitted its final draft. "But the committee too has been asked to be ready

with the same," the official confirmed. He added that the State

cabinet, in September this year, had already granted approval to present the Bill proposing 10% horizontal reservation for statehood agitators and dependents.

Rajasthan's hilly village gets a polling station

BJP promises wheat MSP hike, medical colleges in M.P.

ays ahead of the Assembly election in Madhya Pradesh, the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) on Saturday released its manifesto titled Sankalp Patra with a slew of promises, such as increasing the minimum support price (MSP) of wheat to ₹2,700 a quintal and of paddy to ₹3,100 a

The manifesto launched by BJP national president J.P. Nadda, Madhya Pradesh Chief Minister Shivraj Singh Chouhan, and other party leaders also promised concrete houses to more than 1.3-crore beneficiaries of the State government's flagship scheme 'Ladli Behna Yojana'. The BJP also promised that beneficiaries of 'Ladli Behna' and the Centre's 'Ujjwala Yojana' would receive LPG cylinders at a subsidised rate of ₹450.

The Congress has already released its anifesto in which it had promised to purchase wheat at ₹2,600 per quintal and rice at ₹2,500 per quintal.

The BJP has also promised to establish one engineering institute named Madhya Pradesh Institute of Technology, on the lines of the Indian Institutes of Technologies (IITs), in each division of the State. Mr. Nadda said that if the BIP forms the government in the State, it will also set up one medical college -Madhya Pradesh Institute of Medical Sciences, on the lines of Centre's All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS) – in each division. A medical city named Atal Medicity would also be established.

Free education

The party has promised free education from kindergarten to postgraduation for girls from below poverty line (BPL) families, Eklavya Model Residential Schools in all Scheduled Tribe-designated blocks of the State, and one medical college each in all tribal districts.

The BJP also proposes a Bundelkhand Development Board with an investment of ₹5,000 crore for the underdeveloped region. It has also promised similar development boards for the Vindhya and Mahakoshal regions. The ruling party, in an attempt to win over the State's 21% tribal population, has promised that ₹3 lakh crore would be spent on the development of the community. The BJP also said that the financial assistance to girls under 'Ladli Lakshmi Yojana' will be increased from ₹1.43 lakh to ₹2 lakh.

Mr. Nadda said that six new expressways will be developed in the State, and promised that two new airports will be developed in Rewa and Singrauli. He said while existing metro rail projects in Bhopal and Indore would be completed, new metro networks

will come up in Gwalior and Jabalpur. With the number of gig workers rising, the party has promised to set up a welfare board for them. It has also promised 100 unit of electricity for ₹100 to every household.

Commenting on the BJP's manifesto, Congress general secretary in charge of Madhya Pradesh Randeep Surjewala called it a "jumla patra". "Liars and dishonest people are issuing a *jumla patra*, how do you trust them?," he said.



Shortage of fertilizers in M.P. sows seeds of discontent among farmers

Farmers complain shortage of fertilizers in cooperative retail outlets and delay in their distribution affecting yield, and demand better management; farmer leaders say situation portrays the govt's absolute apathy towards farmers, and alleges nexus with private companies; BJP rubbishes allegation

ong queues of farmers at governmentcontrolled fertilizer distribution units have become gathering points to discuss the Shivraj Singh Chouhan government's farm policies ahead of the Assembly election in Madhya Pradesh. Farmers complain that shortage of fertilizers in cooperative retail outlets and delay in their distribution will have an impact both on the crops and on votes. The BJP, however, denied the reports of shortage and said if at all there are any issues, the district administrations will address it. The State will go to the polls on November 17.

The Hindu talked to scores of farmers who were on a queue near the Pipaliva Mandi in Mandsaur. This is the same area where six farmers were killed in police firing while protesting for higher minimum support price (MSP) and for adequate quantities of fertilizer and seeds, in June 2017. "I have been waiting here for two days. I need 15 bags of urea and

what I will get after submitting relevant documents is two bags [each of 45 kilograms]. They won't be sufficient," said Ramlal, a

farmer from Mandsaur. Women and elderly people were also seen in the store waiting for their turn. "Only limited number of tokens are given, that too on a first come, first served basis. So I camped here overnight to be at the front of the queue. The government should have managed this better as we cannot stay away from our farms at this time. It is very crucial," said Monu Gujjar, another farmer.

Continuing problem

The police have been deployed in these retail outlets to control the rush. "Every such retail outlet has long queues. This is not new. We are facing this for the past few years," said Vijay Singh, another farmer. He said he has sown wheat and chickpeas in his two-acre farmland and needs fertilizers urgently. "I need to provide fertilizers for wheat and chickpea saplings within the next seven days. If I don't get the fertilizers, I will be forced to buy from private retailers where prices are much

higher," he added. Kishore Patidar, a farmers' leader associated with the Samyukt Kisan Morcha, said such long queues portray the absolute anathy of the go vernment towards farmers. "Under the pretext of a slow billing

system and other logistical issues, the BJP government is pushing farmers towards private suppliers. Cooperatives are controlled by government and elections are not held for several years. Farmers depend on these cooperative outlets so that there is some respite in the input cost," Mr. Patidar said.

Price difference

According to farmers, priv ate retailers charge about

while the price in cooperative stores is ₹266. Similarly, nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium, or the NPK fertilizer is sold for around ₹1,500 to ₹1,800 at private stores while the designated rate is ₹1,350 (for 50 kg). Di-ammonium phosphate is also costlier with private retailers. "The government is in connivance with the private companies," Mr. Patidar said, demanding direct transfer of subsidies.

The Union government has been maintaining that the country has adequate stocks of fertilizers for this season despite global crises such as the Ukraine-Russia war. The Union Ministry of Chemicals and Fertilizers is also monitoring the supply and availability of fertilizers on a daily basis through an integrated e-platform.

The BJP said allegations of long queues and shortage are false. Party spokesman Hitesh Bajpai rubbished the charges.

"There may be local issues which need the District Magistrate's intervention. There is nothing to worry," Dr. Bajpai said, adding that the BJP will manage such issues after December 3, the day of announcement of the re-

Balak Nath brands himself as 'Rajasthan *ka* Yogi', raises communal passions in Tijara

Addressing a small gathering at the village temple in Bubkhera, Baba Balak Nath, the BJP candidate from Tijara in Rajasthan, asks, "Have you seen the Bharat-Pakistan match?"

The crowd, consisting largely of Meghwals, a Scheduled Caste communlistens to impassively.

The clean-shaven, saffron-clad Baba, who has traded his diamond studs for wooden hoops this election season, thunders: "Match Pakistan ke saath jitna hai ki nahi? (Don't we have to win the match with Pakistan?)" The Bharat-Pakistan euphemism for the Hindu-Muslim divide is not lost on his audience.

The Tijara Assembly segment is part of the Alwar Lok Sabha constituency that Mr. Nath, 39, currently represents. In an election that could go down to the wire, his immediate concern is voting percentage. He does not name any community, but asks, "How much is their voting percentage?" Someone remarks that it goes up to 90%. "And how much is ours," he asks. There is on-

Ahirwal vs Mewat

The Congress has fielded 36-year-old Imran Khan, a former Bahujan Samaj Party (BSP) leader who has not formally joined the party, but was granted ticket just days before the dea-

dline to file nominations. The battle lines are drawn clearly in the "us versus them" metric, and the binary that Mr. Nath drew in his election pitch is an old tactic. The new pol-

itical map has not erased the ancient Ahirwal-Mewat boundaries. Ahirwal was a post-Mughal principality ruled by Ahirs or Yadavs. The Mewat region is populated by Muslims and Dalits. Development is uneven on the two sides of the Delhi-Alwar highway, which divides the two regions.

In the 12 Assembly elections held since 1967, the seat has been held by Muslim candidates seven times and Yadavs five times. Mr. Nath, who is a mahant of the Nath sect of Hinduism, was born into a Yadav family and is one of the aspirants for the Chief Minisfaction-ridden State unit of

post in the the BJP. The only time the BJP has won the Tijara seat was in 2013.

As one crosses over to Rajasthan from Haryana, trudging through dusty Nuh, there are no motorable roads to the villages. At Mansingh Ki Thani, a small hamlet of 50 Meghwal households, voters are waiting patiently for Mr. Nath to arrive, though it is nearly 1 p.m., and he is running late. "We want to show him the condition of our village," says Ravinder Kumar, a 26-year-old electrician who works in the nearby industrial town of Bhiwadi. In his next breath, he adds, "But I have heard that he could be the CM, so I guess it would be good to place our bets on him."

Another man in his mid-40s listening in to the conversation offers his perspective. "No Muslim legislator has ever worked for Mewat. Last time, we had BSP MLA Sandeep Yadav, who later joined the Congress. He also worked only for Ahirwal. No one wants to bring development to Mewat," he says, on condition of anonymity For the last two consecutive terms, the legislators from Tijara have been Yadav.

In this battle between the Yadavs and Muslims, it is the significant population of Dalits who could play a decisive role. Most of the Dalit voters are waiting

for a cue from the Meghwal Vikas Samiti, whose president, Mangat Ram, says he will take a call in a day or two. "All I can say is that we have been happy with the Congress government in the State and the same can't be said about our MP," says Mr. Ram.

'Communal agenda'

This is the same pitch adopted by Mr. Nath's opponent. "Our honourable MP can't point to a single foundation stone that he has laid in four-and-a-half years," says Mr. Khan. "He never talks about development. He has a single point agenda of Sanatana Dharma. No religion is in peril here, neither Hinduism nor Islam, but he is trying to fan communal pas-

sions," he adds. Mr. Khan has been busy lodging complaints against Mr. Nath, including a claim that he drove bulldozers while campaigning without holding a heavy-vehicle

driving licence. The use of bulldozers in the BJP campaign is an ode to Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath, whose name Mr. Nath has adopted to brand himself as "Rajasthan ka Yogi".

Mr. Khan fears that as the polling date nears, the campaign will become more and more divisive.

Rajasthan will reject BJP's polarisation pitch: Ramesh

Congress leader Jairam Ramesh on Saturday said the people in Rajasthan would reject the BJP's "politics of polarisation" in the Assembly election and support the ruling Congress, which was seeking a mandate based on the State government's performance during the past five years. The BJP is misusing the Central agencies for its electoral benefit, Mr. Ramesh said.

Mr. Ramesh said at a press conference here that the BJP, which was devoid of issues, was using polarisation on the basis of religion and caste as well as the agencies like Enforcement Directorate (ED) and Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) as its "weapons" for the polls. "Prime Minister Narendra Modi and his associates are speaking the language of polarisation and making baseless allegations against the Congress government in Rajasthan," he said.

Mr. Ramesh said Rajasthan had emerged as a model State during the Congress rule while the Opposition BJP was not in a position to talk adversely about the State government's welfare schemes.



3 tourists killed as houseboats catch fire on Dal Lake

Three tourists from Bangladesh lost their lives in a blaze that engulfed five houseboats on Friday night at the tourist hotspot of Dal Lake in Srinagar. An official said a State Disaster Response Force (SDRF) team retrieved the bodies from the debris of the houseboats on Saturday. The deceased were identified as Anindaya Kowshal, Das Gupta and Mohammad Moinud. The circumstances under which the houseboats caught fire near Ghat No. 9 in the Dal Lake could not be ascertained immediately. "The administration is dedicated to providing assistance to the victims," Ajaz Asad, Deputy Commissioner of Srinagar, said. The administration also relocated four houseboats to prevent further damage. Regional parties have expressed shock over the fire incident.

Grain tune: PM Modi's millet music gets Grammy nod

India's Prime Minister Narendra Modi has made an entry into the halls of global music with a song featuring him and his passion for millet nominated for a Grammy. "Abundance In Millets" by Falu and Gaurav Shah, a tune the musicians say was "written and performed" with the Prime Minister, features speeches by Mr. Modi expounding the benefits of his favourite grain. The tune was nominated on Friday in the Best Global Music Performance category. Mr. Modi has said he believes it "will inspire more people to embrace millets for healthy living!". Grammy winners will be announced on February 4. AFP

One dead, several injured in stampede at Surat station

One person died and several more were injured in a stampede at the Surat railway station in Gujarat's Surat district on Saturday. Sources said the stampede occurred when hundreds of passengers tried to board a Bihar-bound train ahead of the festivities. A massive crowd of migrant workers were on the way to their home towns and in a headlong rush the crowds attempted to board the outbound trains resulting in a stampede. The police said they managed to being the situation under control and additional forces were deployed to manage the crowds at the station compound.

Indian fishermen released by Pak. govt. handed over to BSF

Eighty Indian fishermen who were released from a jail in Pakistan have been handed over to Border Security Force (BSF) authorities on the Attari-Wagah border here, officials said on Saturday. The Pakistan government on Thursday released 80 Indian fishermen from the Malir jail in Karachi. Punjab police protocol officer Arun Mahal said all the prisoners crossed over to India on Friday night through the border through the 'Emergency Travel Certificate' issued by the Indian High Commission based at Islamabad. Rishi Sunak keen on visiting India, but difficult issues remain in FTA'

British High Commissioner to India Alex Ellis says both Prime Ministers are signalling to their systems that they want to find a way to get a deal, but there is no hiding the difficulties: External Affairs Minister S. Jaishankar to raise concerns about Khalistan threats during his four-day London visit

egotiations for a India-United Kingdom Free Trade Agreement (FTA) are the main focus of ties between the two countries at present, with several "hard bits" that could need intervention at a "senior level", the British High Commissioner to India, Alex Ellis, said on Saturday, speaking ahead of External Affairs Minister S. Jaishankar's visit to London this week. He added that British Prime Minister Rishi Sunak was "keen" on visiting India, but that the focus on the FTA talks came first.

"We are a lot closer than we were a year ago. We are batting deep as they would say in the Cricket World Cup, and now we are on to the big and tricky issues, and they are substantially difficult," Mr. Ellis said, when asked about a timeline for the FTA to be completed.

Asked whether Mr. Sunak's visit was contingent on the FTA being ready to sign, Mr. Ellis told *The Hin*du in an exclusive interview that the "Prime Minister [Sunak] is keen to come [to India]. But first of all, we have got to focus on the FTA," pointing to an "intense period of negotiations" that are now ongoing, with officials meeting regularly to work through

FTA talks drag on

Mr. Sunak's proposed bilateral visit to India in October-November is understood to have been put off due to delays in the FTA talks. The talks, which began after Brexit in January 2022, are now in their 14th round, with about five of the 26 chapters still unresolved, sources said.

In a telephone conversation last week, Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Mr. Sunak also discussed the progress in the FTA

Mr. Jaishankar, who left for the U.K. on Saturday on a four-day visit that officials said was "long overdue", is expected to be joined by U.K. Foreign Secretary James Cleverly to celebrate Deepavali at the Indian High Commission. He will hold several high-level meetings in London to discuss strategic ties, as well

Top priority

Diplomatic sources have said that the U.K. FTA is India's top priority at present. Deals with Australia for the Comprehensive Economic Cooperation Agreement (CECA) and the European Union and the European Free Trade Association (EFTA) talks with Switzerland, Norway, Finland and Liechtenstein, as well as with the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) are next in line. With election season in India in 2024 and the U.K. headed to polls by January 2025, Mr. Sunak and Mr. Modi are hopeful that the FTA will be completed by early 2024, but have not set any deadline

"I think it's clear both Prime Ministers are signalling to their systems that they want to find a way to get a deal. But there is no hiding the difficulties," Mr. Ellis said. The problems include the Rules of Origin, given that the U.K. has an integrated supply chain with the European Union, while India wants to favour goods that include a higher value addition from the

U.K. itself. In addition, tariffs over goods such as Scotch whisky and automobiles, including electric vehicles, from the U.K., and leather and textiles from India are among the sticking points. Meanwhile, India has yet to commit to giving legal and financial U.K. firms access to the Indian market.

"So what we want to do now is try and boil down the issues to the few big ones which need resolution at a senior level, to cut away quite a lot of the second order issues... and then we can actually focus on the really hard bits at the end," Mr. Ellis added, clarifying that mobility, or more visas for Indians, are not included in the agreement.

When asked about the U.K. decision to put India on a list of "safe states", effectively disallowing any Indians that enter the U.K. illegally on "small boats" across the English Channel from applying for asylum, Mr. Ellis said that the move was an "autonomous judgment".

"To sustain legal migration we have to tackle illegal migration. And at diffe-

rent points in the first quarter of this year, Indians moved up to number two in terms of nationals coming in small boats across the Channel, crossing the English Channel. So you need to tackle that as well," Mr. Ellis said, adding that Indians are the largest recipients of work visas to the U.K.

Mr. Jaishankar, whose visit comes eight months after a major India-U.K. spat over protests by Khalistani extremists at the High Commission in London, is also expected to raise India's concerns on the issue, including over the most recent video by the Sikhs for Justice group, banned by India, that threatened any passengers taking Air India flights on November 19.

"We're always keeping under review the list [of extremist groups] and looking at the behaviour of different kinds of groups. I feel that [India and the U.K.] have a better understanding and a more greater confidence on the two sides of how to deal with extremism in different forms in the U.K.," Mr. Ellis said in the interview.

Pre-sale of dolls crafted by women in Manipur exceeds expectations

The online pre-sale campaign for crochet dolls crafted by Manipur's internally displaced women exceeded expectations by garnering \$11,000, officials said on Saturday.

A couple of mo ter the ongoing ethnic conflict broke out in Manipur on May 3, a Singaporebased brand named 1 Million Heroes launched 'Stitching Hope', an initiative to equip the violencedisplaced women with skills in the Japanese craft art of amigurumi.

Shaping the narrative

Detailed templates, tools, and materials were provided to women in a few relief camps to create dolls as a

viable means to the sustainable livelihood of persons affected by the ethnic violence that has so far claimed close to 200 lives and displaced more than 60,000 persons.

The online campaign for the dolls, which ran from October 7 to November 5, garnered \$11,000 worth of pre-sale orders from North America, Australia, Europe, and Asia.

Monish Karam of 1 Million Heroes said the business generated through the pre-sale campaign was twice the initial target, attributing it to a blend of compassion and the therapeutic aspect of crafting dolls.

"The success of the campaign is not just about numbers but about the human connection. It is about children around the world learning from the stories of resilience, and about our artisans finding healing and purpose through their craft," he

Officials of the State's Trade, Commerce, and Industries said the campaign, while transitioning to the production phase, has shaped a narrative of hope among the women for reclaiming control over their lives. "The dolls are expected to be delivered to homes across the world before December-end," an official said.

Scrap deal to send Indian workers to Israel: trade unions

Ten Central trade unions (CTUs) have questioned the Centre's proposed move to send about one lakh Indian construction workers to Israel to replace Palestinian nationals working there. They alleged that the Union government is playing a despicable role in supporting the Israeli plans to throw out Palestinian workers, and retaliation for the Hamas attack is only an excuse. Diplomatic sources, however, said the request from Israel's construction industry has been discussed, but there is no agreement yet.

Asked about the proposal, Ministry of External Affairs spokesperson Arin-

dam Bagchi said the government was not aware of any specific request, but that India has been discussing a mobility and migration agreement with Israel to facilitate and protect Indian workers in the construction and caregiver fields

The trade unions said both countries signed an agreement in May 2023 during the visit of the Israeli Foreign Minister Eli Cohen to send 42,000 Indian workers to Israel, out of which 34,000 were to be brought into the construction industry, to replace the Palestinian workers.

The trade unions said nothing could be more immoral and disastrous for India than "exporting" workers to Israel.

Scientists pull paper from journal over Arunachal mention

In a spillover of the border dispute between India and China, Indian scientists have been forced to withdraw a paper from an international peer-reviewed journal published from China on the grounds that it could not mention Arunachal Pradesh. Mukesh Thakur, Lalit

Kumar Sharma, and Avijit Ghosh were forced to withdraw a paper on the whitecheeked macaque (Macaca *leucogenys*) on the grounds that it could not mention Arunachal Pradesh as the sampling site. The Chinese government contested the inclusion of Arunachal Pradesh in the study, claiming it did not align with their defined map.

The paper, "Two Y chromosome lineages in whitecheeked macaque (Macaca leucogenys)" was accepted on February 14, 2023, and published online on April 5, 2023, in Wildlife Letters. Wildlife Letters is a recently launched international peer-reviewed journal and is published from Northeast Forestry University in China. 'Scientific terrorism'

"This is nothing but scientific terrorism. Since April 2023, I have exchanged several emails with the journal authorities relating to the paper. I have taken strong stand that I cannot replace Arunachal Pradesh

and was forced to withdraw the paper in the last week of October," Mukesh Thakur, scientist and officer in-charge, Mammal Sectional, Zoological Survey of India (ZSI), told *The Hindu*. Dr. Thakur, the lead

author of the paper, has more than 100 papers in his name and has been a recipient of several distinguished awards, including the DST Young Scientist (2013), the DST INSPIRE Faculty (2017), the INSA Medal for Young Scientist (2018), and the TULIP LAb Ex Fellow-France (2022). He has also served at the Chinese Academy of Sciences as a Visiting Scientist (2015-16).

"For Wildlife Letters, as a journal published in China, we are obligated to follow Chinese maps and use of place names. Our failure not to do so could result in removal of Chinese funding for the journal and create problems for journal staff that are based in China," Marcel Holyoak, co-editor-in-chief for Wildlife Letters, wrote to Dr. Thakur in an email dated April 2023.

The co-editor-in-chief suggested that the only option in the current case is that the problems be corrected or "we are forced to withdraw the manuscript".

When the scientists accused the journal of questioning the geopolitical boundaries of India, Professor Holyoak wrote back saying that neither he nor the journal takes any position with respect to geopolitical boundaries, but "we are obliged to follow what is expected of the scientists and journal within China".

In October 2023, Dr. Thakur wrote to the journal saying that their decision to withdraw the paper based on "national regulations concerning the name of specific regions, mentioned in the article, in my view" was "unwarranted".

He also said that he was willing to pursue legal action through an international court to ensure resolution of the matter.

Lack of support

Dr. Thakur said that he was surprised that there were Indian scientists on the board of the journal who did not support him on the issue. Dr. Thakur, who specialises in the use of DNA technologies, also added that the journal holds a production house in India. and a few Indians employed with the journal's production house also insisted on the omission of Arunachal Pradesh's mention from the paper.

"We are happy that our scientist has remained firm on the issue of the territorial integrity of the country. There could be several such incidents that can go unnoticed and we would urge the Government of India to come up with an advisory on issues where the territorial integrity of the country is concerned," ZSI Director Dhriti Banerjee

Discovered by Chinese scientists from South Tibet, white-cheeked macaque (Macaca leucogenys) was later reported by Dr. Mukesh and his team from Dibang Valley and West Siang region of Arunachal Pradesh on the basis of camera trapping and DNA analysis. srael's Prime Minister pushed back on Saturday against calls from Western allies to do more to protect Palestinian civilians, as troops encircled Gaza's largest hospital where doctors said five patients died, including a premature baby, after the last generator ran out of fuel.

Israel has portrayed Shifa Hospital as Hamas's main command post, saying militants were using civilians as human shields there and had set up elaborate bunkers underneath it - claims Hamas and Shifa staff deny. In recent days,

fighting near Shifa and other hospitals in the combat zone of northern Gaza has intensified and supplies have run out.

"There is no electricity. Medical devices stopped.

Abu Selmia said Israeli troops were "shooting at anyone outside or inside the hospital," and prevented movement between the buildings in the compound.

Asked about reports of troops firing into the Shifa courtyard, the Israeli military would only say that troops are engaged with fighting Hamas in the vicinity and take all feasible measures to prevent harm to civilians. It said soldiers have encountered hundreds of Hamas fighters in underground facilities, schools, mosques and clinics during fighting in Gaza.

Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said the responsibility for any harm to civilians lies with Hamas. His statement came after French President Emmanuel Macron pushed for a ceasefire and urged other leaders to join his call, telling the BBC there was "no justification" for Israel's ongoing bombing.

The U.S. has been pushing for temporary pauses that would allow for wider distribution of badly needed aid to civilians in the besieged territory where conditions are increasingly dire. More than 11,070 Palestinians, two-thirds of them women and minors, have been killed since the war began, according to the Gaza Health Ministry.

Arab leaders slam Israel; call out 'double standards'

Arab and Muslim leaders on Saturday condemned Israeli forces' "barbaric" actions in Gaza but declined to approve punitive economic and political steps against the country over its war against Hamas.

The outcome of a joint summit in the Saudi capital of the Arab League and the Organisation of Islamic Cooperation (OIC) highlighted regional divisions over how to respond to the war even as fears mount that it could draw in other countries.

The final declaration on Saturday rejected Israeli claims that it is acting in "self-defence" and demanded that the United Nations Security Council adopt "a decisive and bind-

ing resolution" to halt Israel's "aggression".

Saudi Arabia's de facto ruler Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman, who before the war was considering establishing formal diplomatic ties with Israel, told the summit he "holds the occupation [Israeli] authorities responsible for the crimes committed against the Palestinian people". Iranian President Ebrahim Raisi said Islamic nations should designate the Israeli Army a "terrorist organisation".

Prince Faisal bin Farhan, the Saudi Foreign Minister, similarly decried "double standards" in the world's response to the war, saying Israel was getting a pass on violations of international law.

Over 3,00,000 turn out for pro-Palestinian London rally

More than 3,00,000 pro-Palestinian demonstrators marched through central London on Saturday, with police arresting nearly 100 far-right counter-protesters to stop them ambushing the main rally.

Pro-Palestinian protesters could be heard chanting "From the river to the sea, Palestine will be free", a rallying cry which is viewed by many Jews as anti-semitic and a call for Israel's eradication.

Others carried banners reading "Free Palestine", "Stop the Massacre" and "Stop Bombing Gaza".

Skirmishes broke out between police and the far-right groups that had also descended on the cap-

ital as the Palestinian demonstration clashed with Armistice Day, the anniversary of the end of World War I, when Britain commemorates its war dead.

Police said there were several hundred counterprotesters on the streets of central London, and skirmishes broke out near the Cenotaph war memorial early on Saturday. Incidents continued throughout the day, with police in riot gear trying to contain protesters near the House of Commons, with footage showing police officers with batons working to control the crowds.

Assistant Commissioner Matt Twist said that the counter-protesters had seemed "intent on confrontation and violence".

Myanmar fight blocks | Missile strike targets Kyiv as Russian train China trade routes

A surprise offensive by Myanmar ethnic armed groups has blocked two strategically vital roads to the country's biggest trading partner China, choking cross-border commerce and denying the cashstrapped junta taxes and foreign exchange.

Fighting has raged across northern Shan state for two weeks, displacing almost 50,000 people, according to the United Nations, and posing the most serious military challenge to the generals since they seized power in 2021.

The blockage to key transport arteries is already leading to higher prices in markets and hampering the junta's ability to send reinforcements to tackle the offensive.

Goods traffic from Muse has all but halted since fighters from the Arakan Army (AA), Myanmar National Democratic Alliance Army (MNDAA) and Ta'ang National Liberation Army (TNLA) launched their offensive on October 27. Chinshwehaw, another hub on the border with China's Yunnan province, is also currently closed.

Last week, the MNDAA posted footage of its fighters raising their flag at the border gate. The junta later admitted it had lost control of the town.

Russian forces targeted Ukraine's capital, Kyiv, as part of an overnight bombardment felt across the country, local officials said on Saturday, while drones Russian officials blamed on the Ukrainian military targeted areas around Moscow and the region of Smolensk.

A ballistic missile was shot down as it approached the Ukrainian capital, said Serhii Popko, head of the Kyiv City Military Administration. He said that no one was injured.

The Ukrainian Air Force later confirmed an Iskan-

der-M ballistic missile was used in the attack, the first attempted missile strike on Kyiv in almost two months.

Elsewhere in Ukraine, the strikes killed four people in three regions: two in Kherson, one in Dnipropetrovsk and another in Zaporizhzhia, local officials reported.

Ukraine's air defence systems actively repelled attacks in Odesa, Dnipropetrovsk, Kharkiv, Poltava, Sumy, and Kirovohrad regions. The country's Air Force said Russian troops launched 31 Shahed-136/ 131 drones, of which 19 were shot down.

In Moscow, Russia's Defence Ministry said that its aerial strikes had hit an **Ukraine's Air Force** said Russian troops launched 31 drones, of which 19 were shot down

ammunition depot serving the 43rd mechanised brigade of Ukraine's Armed Forces near the village of Devichki in the Kyiv region. In an online statement, it said that Ukrainian drones had been shot down over the Smolensk and Moscow regions.

Meanwhile, trains carrying cargo in Russia's Ryazan region were derailed Saturday morning due to "unauthorised interference," Moscow rail opera-

tor MZHD said. Russian law enforcement said that 15 train carriages had been derailed southeast of the capital, while MZHD reported the number as 19. Several Russian media outlets also reported that an explosion was heard in the vicinity on Saturday morning, although this could not be independently verified.

Russian officials have previously blamed pro-Ukrainian saboteurs for several attacks on the country's railway system since Moscow invaded the country in February 2022, although no group has claimed responsibility for the damage.

Kyiv has not commented on Saturday's attacks.

Modified antifungal agent shows reduced toxicity in mice

A structurally modified antifungal agent has shown reduced toxicity in mice and in human kidney cells while retaining its antimicrobial properties, according to a paper published in Nature. The advance could increase the clinical effectiveness and safety of such treatments in fighting deadly fungal infections.

Highly toxic

Amphotericin B (AmB) is

an antifungal agent produced by bacteria and has been used as a last line of defence against severe fungal infections for many decades. It achieves this by forming sponge-like aggregates that bind to a molecule known as ergosterol (which is found in bacterial and fungal cells and performs a similar function to mammalian cholesterol). This binding results in the extraction of ergosterol from the membrane, which leads to fungal cell

death. Despite being effective, AmB is highly toxic in humans – particularly in renal cells. However, it is unknown whether this toxicity is due to the same mechanism that causes fungal cell death.

Analogues of AmB

Arun Maji from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, Urbana, Illinois, U.S. and colleagues created analogues of AmB with changes to the parts of the molecule that bind sterols, with the aim of observing how these changes affected biological activity. These analogues were tested in human kidney cells, and it was determined that renal cell death was due to the binding and extraction of cholesterol from kidney cell membranes by AmB.

The authors then designed a variant of AmB that can bind to and extract fungal ergosterol but not mammalian cholesterol, which would mitigate the toxic effects on the kid-

ney. The resulting compound (which they named AM-2-19) was renal-sparing in human renal cells and in mice, while retaining high efficacy as an antifungal treatment. The treatment was also comparatively resilient to antimicrobial resistance.

This mechanism of action is conserved across many antifungal molecules, and the authors suggest that the technique could be used to reduce toxicity in additional drug treatments and thus increase their clinical efficacy. "Rational tuning of the dynamics of interactions between small molecules may lead to better treatments for fungal infections that still kill millions of people annually and potentially other resistance-evaantimicrobials, sive including those that have recently been shown to operate through supramolecular structures that target specific lipids," the authors


arlo Rovelli is an Italian theoretical physicist who has written sevpopular-science books. In his latest work, White Holes: Inside the Horizon, Mr. Rovelli explains the theoretical existence of white holes - the converse of black holes. The latter is believed to be the ultimate graveyard of all matter from which nothing, not even light, can escape. White holes on the other hand may beget a new universe. Though still in the realm of speculation, the math checks out.

From what I understand of your book, a white hole is like a black hole in reverse – or as you would describe it – akin to a movie running backward, Could vo explain why they are significant? We've seen black holes, ta-

ken pictures of them colliding. We see matter around them spiralling and falling inside them. But then what? If we fell into them we would be squeezed and stretched but say we resisted it, what happens next? Are whatever falls into it eaten by monsters, do they go into a different universe? One can speculate in all kinds of ways. What I describe in my book is that something very simple happens. Things just fall and fall and then they bounce back. Like a ball bouncing back up from the ground, it passes on the same path while going back up but with a reduced velocity. What interested me and my colleagues is that the bouncing out is also predicted by Einstein's theories. This possibility of things coming out is what we call a white hole. Einstein's theories however don't accommodate the possibility of a bounce, but quantum mechanics [The science and laws governing the subatomic world] does. So we use the equation of 'loop quantum gravity' our theory of quantum mechanics and gravity together – and this suggests that a black hole itself bounces and becomes a white hole. If this is true, this implies that space and time undergo 'quantum jumps' and suggests that we have to change our understanding of what space time is. Electrons undergo quantum jumps and that is what makes all our electronic devices possible. These are quantum jumps of matter and don't do anything to space or time. But here, the shape of space itself is a quantum jump. It implies that time is no longer this uniform, local thing and performs tiny 'jumps.' akin to a stretching rubber

Is it possible that our universe is emerging out of a white hole, and before this was one that was swallowed by a black hole?

Well it is the same but there are some differences. The ball that is going up after bouncing is slower and has less velocity and energy. Where's the energy gone? It dissipates as heat on the ground. The blackhole-to-white-hole transi-



tion is also similar and that's why studying the transition is complicated.

The dissipated energy of the white hole was studied by Stephen Hawking; it is his great contribution to physics. Black holes emit heat or 'Hawking radiation' and this information isn't lost but can come out from a 'white hole.'

There is a very interesting theory that a universe that will fall into a black hole will bounce and generate something very similar to the Big Bang. We don't know if it is so but it is possible. The equations that predict a black to white and a bounce are quite similar. So you and I, in this universe, might be coming out of a 'big bounce' through what looks to us like a Big Bang 14 billion years ago.

How must someone in 2023 understand time? Is it an abstract but fixed entity - like the marker between two events. Or is it something physical, made up of particles, that can stretch and squeeze, and influenced by forces such as gravity?

We've discovered something very factual; that time doesn't pass the same for everybody. It seems unusual only because we aren't used to it or don't experience it often enough. If we could travel near light speeds, it would be usual for us to go on a long trip (at those speeds) and come back to see that a younger sibling is now older than you. This is as much a fact as that the earth is round. Albert Einstein was the first to suggest that time wasn't something fixed like the ticking of a clock, but something more flexible like a rubber band. What we need to know is what makes time stretch, unevenly, in this way.? Is it something like an electric field? There are electric and magnetic fields around us all the time but we don't feel it. Similarly, there is also the 'time field' that Einstein called the gravitational field. Einstein imagined us as being trapped in a large jellyfish, which is 'time' itself. In Einstein's theory, there are no particles of time but rather an entity called 'space time'. Mass distorts space time and the bigger ones more. Near a black hole, time passes super-fast. Someone at the edge of one, looking at earth, can see a year go by in a minute. But viewed from earth, everything is going very, very slowly and that is time-distortion. It's easier to think of space and time as a single-entity. This was all Einstein, 110 years ago. But we know that is limited and we also have to account for quantum effects; even though they may be tiny. They become important inside a black hole, near the Big Bang. If we account for quantum effects, space is granular. Not continuous and smooth and this granular aspect of space is time. This however is speculation and results from what we think should happen when combining quantum mechanics and gravity. That's what I have been working on, all these years. (We think) there are 'timesteps.' There may be atoms in space but they aren't moving in space. They themselves are space.



Efficient passive radiative cooling materials developed

Two recent studies provide evidence that passive radiative cooling materials work. Passive radiative cooling approaches that use glass- and ceramic-based materials are more versatile, making them more attractive for a wide range of outdoor passive cooling applications. The microporous glass coating enables a temperature drop of about 3.5-4 degrees Celsius during daytime and night time, respectively. The ceramic composite can produce highly efficient light scattering and high thermal emission.



Nepalese researchers are studying an eye condition

Researchers in Nepal are carrying out environmental surveys and genomic sequencing to determine the cause of an eye infection that can cause children to lose their vision within days. Symptoms begin with a painless reddening and loss of pressure in one eye. Cases of seasonal hyperacute panuveitis seem to spike every two years, baffling scientists. Now researchers are racing to examine a possible link with white moths of the genus Gazalina, which swarm through Nepal at the end of the monsoon season.



Egg cells that lack cytoplasmic lattices become infertile

Cytoplasmic lattices seem to be storage sites for many proteins that are essential for the development of the early embryo. They enrich maternally provided proteins to prevent their premature degradation and cellular activity.

The discovery could explain why people whose eggs lack the fibres entirely are infertile. When researchers disabled the genes in mice that encode the proteins that make up the fibres, the resulting embryos were non viable.

Not unique

Like humans, are rats capable of imagination?

Researchers at the Howard **Hughes Medical Institute's** Janelia Research Campus have found that animals also possess an imagination. The researchers developed a novel system combining virtual reality and a brain-machine interface to probe the rat's inner thoughts. They found that like humans, animals too can control their brain activity to imagine places and objects that aren't right in front of them, using their thoughts to imagine walking to a location or moving a remote object to a specific

spot. Like humans, when rodents experience places and events, specific neural activity patterns are activated in the hippocampus, an area of the brain responsible for spatial memory. The new study finds rats can voluntarily generate these same activity patterns and do so to recall remote locations distant from their current position. This ability to imagine locations away from one's current position is fundamental to remembering past events and imagining possible future scenarios.

Health benefits of functional foods

Senior citizens like me remember the song "Mera Nam Abdul Rahman, Pistawala Main Hun Pathan" in the 1956 film Bhai Bhai, and thought that the dry fruit Pista or pistachio was an import. But Dr K.T. Achaya, in his book "Indian Food", points out that dry fruits like almonds, pistachio, cashew, walnut, apricot and pomegranate were known since the time of the sage Charaka (100 BC), the father of Ayurvedic Medicine, who pointed out their value in health

Functional food

The growing body of clinical evidence suggests that almond, which can be bought in any dry fruits shop, consumption is associated with several health benefits. Other dry fruits that also offer health benefits are cashew nuts, raisins, walnuts, dates, apricots and pistachio. Besides dry fruits, 'wet fruits' such as bananas, grapes, gua-

vas, oranges and mangoes offer health benefits, as Charaka pointed out.

Such healthy foods are also called 'functional foods', since they offer health benefits beyond their nutritional value. Some examples are oats, and millets like bajra, ragi, jowar, and soya proteins, besides the fruits. The Hyderabad-based National Institute of Nutrition (NIN) offers periodic reports on the nutritive values of Indian foods, and what a healthy adult should eat to stay healthy. Children in particular should eat a lot of dry and wet fruits, and foodgrains of nutritive value. Functional foods are defined broadly as foods that provide more than simple nutrition; they supply additional physiological benefit to the consumer. Besides what NIN has suggested, the Healthline website suggests many functional foods that should be in the daily diet. This site is well worth reading. Functional foods have ingredients that offer health benefits which extend beyond their nutritional value. Some types contain supplements or other additional ingredients designed to improve health.

A healthy diet

Given all this, what should be eating, in order to maintain a healthy daily diet?

The best would be to use not just rice or wheat

Add butter and ghee, but not in excess. Curd contains several antioxidants. And drinking coffee and tea, though no more than a few cups per day, is also useful since they contain antioxidants. Children, in particular, should drink several cups of milk daily, while adults can limit it to three cups. In addition, let us eat dry and wet fruits often, at least once a week. And, if you are a non-vegetarian, you can eat eggs, fish, chicken and mutton, since they offer rich sources of minerals and fats of value.





A new sheriff in town

The former three-time Prime Minister, who came back from a self-imposed exile in London, has daunting tasks ahead, from tackling the corruption cases against him to steering his party to victory at February's polls despite the continued popularity of Imran Khan

he return of Mian Nawaz Sharif to Pakistan in October, and the relief he has received in cases against him ahead of elections on February 8 next year, prove that no one can ever be written off in Pakistani politics – as long as the military establishment is on their side. This isn't the first time Mr. Sharif, who had been Prime Minister a record three times so far (1990-93, 1997-99 and 2013-17), has come back from foreign exile to massive crowds.

He had lived in Saudi Arabia after being dismissed in a coup and charged with treason over the hijacking of Gen. Pervez Musharraf's flight in 1999, and returned to Pakistan to similar crowds in 2007. For the last few years, he lived in London, after he was disqualified in 2017 by the Supreme Court over undeclared assets that featured in the 'Panama Papers', and he was sentenced to 10 years in prison before he received medical bail.

His return on October 21 would not have been possible if the present military dispensation was not in favour of it. In a sense, Mr. Sharif, inarguably Pakistan's most senior leader today, with a career in public office spanning half a century, has received that approval now, much as he did at the start of his political journey, groomed by the regime of Gen. Zia-ul-Haq, from the late 1970s.

At the time, a 30-year Nawaz Sharif was a businessman, learning the ropes at his father's company, the Ittefaq Steel conglomerate. Mian Muhammad Sharif (known as Abbaji to all) was the stern patriarch for Nawaz Sharif, and his two younger brothers, Shehbaz and Abbas, and made most of their major life decisions and political choices for them. In his 20s, Mr. Sharif received a law degree at Punjab University in Lahore, and was known as a keen cricketer, although his professional career ended with a duck in a match playing for the Railways vs PIA (Pakistan International Airlines).

He was most remembered then for the flashy sports car that he drove around. In both their memoirs, former Pakistani Foreign Minister Khurshid


Kasuri (Neither a Hawk Nor a Dove) and former Indian special envoy to Pakistan Satinder Lambah (In Pursuit of Peace) have made a special reference to the car, a Mercedes convertible, when they wrote about meeting Mr. Sharif in the 1970s.

For Mr. Kasuri, Mr. Sharif was the energetic new entrant to the Pakistan Tehrik-e-Istiqlal party that opposed Prime Minister Zulfiqar Ali Bhutto's Pakistan People's Party (PPP) in 1975 the Sharif family business had been badly hit by Bhutto's decision to nationalise its steel mills. For Mr. Lambah, then a diplomat in the Indian High Commission, Mr. Sharif was the amiable and charming member of the Lahore Chamber of Commerce, who drove him from the airport to a meeting in 1978. Shortly after, Mr. Sharif was chosen by Gen. Zia as the Provincial Minister of Finance. He became Punjab Chief Minister in 1985, and the Prime Minister of Pakistan in 1990. While Mr. Sharif's life has seen many ups and downs, he still retains his youthful looks and charm, a love for luxury and for being a generous host, an interest in cricket, as well as in improving ties with India.

Political ideology

In addition, he has remained aligned to the political ideology he started out with: right-wing economics and fiscal conservatism to boost industry, and a religious conservatism that endeared him to Islamist forces unleashed by Gen. Zia, and seen in the Shariat Bill that he brought to Parliament in 1998.

This writer remembers his particular pride in building the M2 Islamabad-Lahore motorway, then the only such expressway in South Asia, which PM Benazir Bhutto halted during her tenure. While taking journalists to a rally ahead of the 1997 elections, he landed his helicopter right on the unfinished highway, vowing to complete the project (he did). Regardless of the criticism he faces for plunging Pakistan into debt, Mr. Sharif's lasting legacy is in the boost to businesses, the motorway, the metro rail project, and then in 2015, inviting the Chinese Belt and Road Initiative projects across the country.



"Nawaz Sharif has been consistent in wanting to focus on expanding Pakistan's economy by making it more market and investor-friendly and formulating a more realistic foreign policy, including good relations with India. But his approach to civil-military relations and working with (or against) domestic political opponents has varied," said former Pakistani Ambassador to the U.S, Husain Haggani, who is currently a scholar at Washington DC's Hudson Institute and the Anwar Gargash Diplomatic Academy in Abu Dhabi. "He seems to have learned a lot from both his previous stints in power and his

tribulations," Mr. Haqqani told The

Mr. Sharif came to PM Narendra Modi's swearing in ceremony, and then received him in Lahore on his birthday on December 25, 2015 in an effort to reset ties once again, and once again, the Pathankot terror attack, and Pakistan's arrest of Kulbhushan Jadhav put paid to efforts by both sides to improve ties.

Trifecta of problems

During his 2013-17 tenure, PM Sharif and the Pakistan Muslim League (PML-Nawaz) lost much of their sheen due to his poor record in handling the trifecta of Pakistan's problems - the debt-ridden economy, the Islamist militancy that carried out one of the worst terror attacks in 2014 at the Army School in Peshawar, and the military's control of Pakistani politics, using the country's three main parties, the PML-N, the PPP and Imran Khan's Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) to take one another down. This last factor has meant that no Prime Minister of Pakistan, including Mr. Sharif, has ever completed a full five-year term in office.

The fact that Mr. Sharif spent months in prison, with severe ailments that required surgery, and didn't give up the political fight even from London, appears to have mitigated some of the negativity around his term in office. In addition, much of the blame for mismanagement has accrued to his brother Shehbaz Sharif, who ran the country during 2022-23, after the dismissal of PM Khan.

Despite the warm welcome back, Mr. Sharif has his work cut out: to manage the corruption cases against him so that he can stand for elections in February; to steer his party to victory at polls despite the continued popularity of Mr. Khan who remains in jail facing serious charges; and to ensure a smooth transition of power within his own party, to his daughter. Maryam Nawaz, at 50, is already a decade older than Mr. Sharif was, when he first took office as Prime Minister.

A lone voice

Rashida Tlaib

The Palestinian-American Congresswoman from Michigan was censured by the U.S. House for her remarks on Israel's war on Gaza

n a rare move, the U.S. House of Representatives on November 7 passed a motion of censure against one of its members. It voted 234-188 to censure Rashida Tlaib (47), a three-term Democrat politician who represents Michigan's 12th Congressional district. Only 25 members have ever been censured in the House's history.

Ms. Tlaib is the lone Palestinian-American and one of only three Muslim lawmakers in the American Congress. Even in a House heavily polarised along party lines, the resolution, moved by the Republicans, received significant bipartisan support, as it typically does on matters concerning Israel. Twenty-two Democrats voted to censure a member of their own party, while four Republicans voted against it, on free speech grounds.

This is the second censure motion Ms. Tlaib has faced over her comments on Israel's war on Gaza. The first one, introduced a week earlier by Republican Rep. Marjorie Taylor Greene, had accused Ms. Tlaib of "anti-Semitic activity, sympathising with terrorist organisations and leading an insurrection". But it was blocked, spurring the Republicans to try

Although she has publicly condemned the October 7 Hamas attack several times, and proclaimed that Israeli and Palestinian lives are of equal worth to her, her pro-Israeli critics took issue with her for sharing a video that showed crowds chanting, 'From the river to the sea, Palestine will be free'. Israel interprets this slogan as a call for the elimination of the state of Israel.

Call for freedom

Ms. Tlaib defended the slogan, clarifying that it was "an aspirational call for freedom, human rights, and peaceful coexistence". The phrase has its roots in the anti-colonial movement. Ms. Tlaib's refusal to retract, however, led to the censure motion. Incidentally, the same coinage for which Ms. Tlaib was censured figures prominently in the official charter of Israel Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's Likud Party, which states that "between the Sea and the Jordan [River] there will only be Israeli

sovereignty". During the debate on the censure motion, Ms. Tlaib, who still has family in the West Bank, made an emotional speech defending herself. "I will not be silenced, and I will not let you distort my words," she said. "The idea that criticising the government of Israel is anti-Semitic sets a very dangerous precedent. And it's been used to silence diverse voices speaking up for human rights across our nation."

The House resolution, however, charged Ms. Tlaib with having "defended the brutal rapes, murders, be-headings, and kidnapping – including of Americans – by Hamas" and accused her of "knowingly" spreading "the false narrative that Israel intentionally bombed the Al-Ahli Arab Hospital on October 17". It further charged her with "conduct entirely unbecoming of a Member of the House of Representatives by calling for the destruction of the state of Israel".

The vote against Ms. Tlaib comes at a time when problematic comments against Palestinians have been made by other members of Congress, including Senator Lindsey Graham, who said Gaza should be "flattened" and Republican Max Miller, who has said Israel should not have to follow any of the rules of military engagement and Gaza should be "turned into a parking lot".

ored shepherds clouting a taped ball with a piece of wood in ancient Britain was the genesis of cricket before it acquired sophistication and rules. distance. That primordial touch still lingers in many batters, a trait that finds exposition in One Day Internationals and Twenty20s. Among the medley of batting marauders, Glenn Maxwell has carved a distinct niche. The Australian, with roots in Melbourne, plays a method that is sharpened with speed, kinetic energy, malleable limbs, especially hands, and astounding game-awareness.

After 35 summers of top-flight cricket, donning the Aussie yellow shade or varied jerseys in the Indian Premier League, Maxwell dipped into all that experience while hammering a chart-busting unbeaten 201 (128b, 21x4, 10x6) against a stunned Afghanistan at Mumbai's Wankhede Stadium on Novem-Chasing ber 7. The duo's 202-run partnership for the eighth wicket, scripted a miraculous win for the Aussies and by the end of that feverish night, Mumbaikars were completely besotted with Maxwell. In World Cup history, this was akin to Kapil Dev's marvellous unbeaten 175 against Zimbabwe during the 1983 World Cup. India back then was struggling at 17 for five when the captain dished out an astounding innings, a knock that inspired the Indians to eventually win the trophy.

Maxwell was physically drained with Mumbai's lingering heat and humidity sapping his veins. Cramps set in, often he was like a cat on a hot tin roof, twitching and collapsing, and at times lying flat on the ground. This was similar to what the late Dean Jones did while scoring his 210 against India in the famous tied Test in Chennai during the 1986 tour. With the southern metro's heat deflating him, Jones threw

up, lost control of his blad-

der, but soldiered on.

There is another thread that binds Maxwell and Jones as the latter was one of the original ODI specialists. Jones was the kind, who would dance down and lash fast bowlers over covers, run hard between the wickets, and field with tigerish zeal. These are attributes that enrich Maxwell; additionally, he bowls off-spin too and is a good all-rounder.

Master of shots

Australia has one of the finest cricketing systems in the world and players emerge as strong blokes, willing to quell raging fires. It is famously said that the Waugh twins – Steve and Mark – were ultra-competitive in backyard cricket while sibling love was nudged to the side. Having grown through such a firstclass structure, Maxwell remains a tough cookie.

What distinguishes him is his penchant to create angles where none exist. South African AB de Villiers did this before, India's

Survakumar Yadav does this now, and Maxwell remains a master. To shuffle across the crease and tip one over the head of the fielder at short fine-leg, or do a reverse-ramp shot and flummox the opposition captain, or to just stand and tee off like a golfer, drilling deep and wide, all these shots emerged like a fusillade from Maxwell's bat. Later, he spoke about how playing golf helped him fine-tune these strokes. How do you strike past a tree on the course? Obviously innovate and flex your wrists. With his legs in a shambles, Maxwell stood rooted to the crease and just relied on his hand-eye co-ordination to demolish the Afghan bowlers. He may look like a messiah now but he is fragile too. A few years back, he took a 'mental health' break, coping with the dark fog that crept into his mind.

It should also be noted that Maxwell never prospered in Tests and has just played seven games. Unlike David Warner, who seamlessly flits between Tests and abridged cricket, Maxwell hasn't found that switch yet. But with strike rates of 127.06 and 150.97, respectively, in ODIs and T20Is, Maxwell is the reigning deity of shock and awe on the cricketing turf. When he prospers, Australia soars high past bruised rivals.



BSE Q2 net jumps fourfold to ₹118 crore, revenue rises 53%

BSE has reported a four-fold jump in net profit to ₹118.4 crore for the quarter ended September 2023. The exchange had posted a net profit of ₹29.4 crore in the year-earlier period, BSE said in a statement. 2022-2023. The demand from these travellers during COVID-19. when train travel was no longer a preferred choice for many due to health safety protocols, also often led to airlines opening new routes and later providing more frequencies on them.

"So, we have gone from 54 domestic destinations to 74. We are now connected to Jamnagar (Gujarat), Jaisalmer (Rajasthan), Ba-(Uttar Pradesh), Agartala (Tripura), Jharsuguda (Odisha). Five years back you couldn't have imagined that there would be a direct flight to these cities from Bengaluru," says Mr. Raghunath.

The number of domestic passengers at the airport is now at 105% of pre-COVID levels. The number of international passengers last fiscal (3.78 million) though lagged behind the pre-COVID level by around 10% as foreign carriers are yet to restore capacity to the levels seen in 2019-2020 due to supply-chain constraints and the Russia-Ukraine conflict which has closed a part of the European skies. However, by the end of this fiscal the airport is expected to exceed the pre-COVID passenger number of 33 million, the top executive said.

Moody's turns negative on U.S. rating, irks Washington

Moody's lowered its outlook on the U.S. credit rating to 'negative' from 'stable' citing large fiscal deficits and a decline in debt affordability, a move that drew criticism from President Biden's administration. The move follows a downgrade of the sovereign by major agencies, Fitch, this year, and S&P, which has maintained a AA+ rating since 2011.

Federal spending and political polarisation have been a rising concern for investors, contributing to a selloff that took U.S. government bond prices to their lowest in 16 years.

"It is hard to disagree with the rationale, with no reasonable expectation for fiscal consolidation any time soon," said Christopher Hodge, chief economist for the U.S. at Natixis. Moody's in a statement blamed "continued political polarisation" in Congress raising the risk that lawmakers will not be able to reach consensus on a fiscal plan.

Republicans, who control the House of Representatives, expect to release a stopgap spending measure aimed at averting a partial government shutdown as funding for federal agencies expires next Friday.

"We disagree with the shift to a negative outlook. The American economy remains strong, and Treasury securities are the world's preeminent safe and liquid asset," Deputy Treasury Secretary Wally Adeyemo said in a statement.

Festive season keeps logistics, warehousing sectors abuzz

Logistics movements and

demand for warehousing have seen a significant spike in the months of September, October and until the first week of November to support the soaring festive season shopping volumes in the country. Market observers said

the logistics and warehousing segment reported a 50-60% increase in traffic and storage volumes in this festive period compared with the same time last year.

Merchandise segments, too, grew substantially and some categories grew even 100% over last year. "As



the festive season unfolded, the demand for warehousing solutions was reaching unprecedented levels, with sectors such as e-commerce, FMCD, and CDE significantly ramping up their inventory to meet the peak-season demand," said Manikandan Ramachandran, COO, TVS Industrial & Logistics Parks.

The convenience of online shopping and the exclusive deals have a significant impact on shifting consumer behaviour specifically during the festive season, which clearly leads to high volume of logistics traffic, observed Kami Viswanathan, President of FedEx Express Middle East, Indian subcontinent, and Africa.

Although festive peak months start from October, the preparations typically begin as early as July and continue through January to cover year-end and new year gifting, said Ishaan Gupta, Joint MD, Gateway Distriparks, a part of Snowman Logistics.



I don't see them taking their foot off the pedal in any way. I'm sure they'll be putting their best foot forward, and we would obviously be showing them the same courtesy as well," he said.

The Netherlands has four wins in 29 matches at 50-over World Cups, and it beat two full ICC members, South Africa and Bangladesh, in this edition. As the head coach of the only associate nation at this World Cup, Cook hopes this performance will elevate the profile of the sport back

Nothing goes Pakistan's way right from the toss; England seals CT berth

Babar's men fall woefully short against a penetrative attack after Buttler's team bats first and posts a huge total; Stokes shines yet again

he outcome of the Pakistan-England game at the Eden Gardens on Saturday had ceased to matter even before a ball was bowled. Pakistan's only chance of making the World Cup semifinals was to bat first and win by 287 runs. The moment the coin flipped in England's favour, and Jos Buttler chose to bat, it was curtains.

The tie did not prosper as a contest either. England scored 337 for nine on the slow, abrasive surface as Ben Stokes, in what was perhaps his final ODI innings, made the 37,666strong holiday audience bounce by scripting a fine 84 (76b, 11x4, 2x6).

Pakistan fell woefully short, losing by 93 runs, as **England sealed Champions** Trophy qualification.

When Babar Azam was batting, Pakistan looked very much in the hunt. But once the skipper fell in the 14th over after a sweet 38 (45b, 6x4), it all fizzled out.

The middle-order collapse against Adil Rashid and Moeen Ali was particularly glaring. Once a land of great spinners and spinplaying batters, presentday Pakistan is neither.

It has been evident in the way its tweakers have bowled all tournament. At the Eden, it manifested in the way Mohammad Rizwan, Saud Shakeel, Iftikhar Ahmed and Shadab Khan fell - charging down the track mindlessly, sweeping thoughtlessly and failing completely in picking straighter deliveries and googlies.

The afternoon's proceedings, though, were in stark contrast as Stokes and Joe Root (60, 72b, 4x4) took centre-stage, building on a 82-run stand for the opening wicket between Jonny Bairstow (59, 61b, 7x4, 1x6) and Dawid Malan (31, 39b, 5x4), with a 132run partnership for the third wicket.

Stokes was the more expressive, capitalising fully on an early let off by Shaheen Afridi, who grassed a simple caught-and-bowled chance.

32-year-old smashed the left-armer straight down, past midon, over mid-wicket and beyond point in a matter of two overs to send him out of the attack. Then came the hoick over mid-wicket off Mohammad Wasim and the falling reverse-swept six off Agha Salman, his stand-out shots.

At one point, Root seemed so bored at the other end that he tried his own reverse ramp. But

classical batsmanship is his forte and he showcased that with back-to-back fours to the square fence.

Breezy knocks

Afridi did have Stokes' measure, uprooting his offstump with a ball that swung back. But breezy knocks from Jos Buttler (27, 18b, 3x4, 1x6) and Harry Brook (30, 17b, 2x4, 2x6) swelled England's total.

Pakistan's below-par fielding stuck out. Nothing it did really worked. It was a match that was emblematic of its World Cup campaign.

Soon after he crossed his fifty, Warner chipped Mustafizur Rahman to stand-in captain Najmul Hasan Shanto against the run of play. In came Smith and seamlessly continued his long hit in the net on the previous day.

None of the five bowlers employed by Bangladesh appeared to ask any questions to either of the two as Marsh and Smith kept on punishing them. Marsh's power-hitting rubbed on to Smith as well, as was

displayed during his slogsweep for a six off Nasum Ahmed's medium-pace. The young pacer had the most difficult day as he conceded a whopping 85 runs in his quota.

Had the Australia fielders not managed runouts at key moments, Marsh may have been presented with an opportunity to join Glenn Maxwell rested for the game - to hit a double century.

"Those memories are


special already. So, whether we win or not, I don't think - that's not up to us really. Whatever will happen will happen, but we'll definitely go away from here with fond memories." he said.

Gasping for breath

Every winter, air pollution spikes in the entire Indo-Gangetic Plain when pollutants from various sources are not dispersed easily because of the drop in temperature and wind speed. The worst affected by this deadly turn of events is Delhi

n the Annual World Air Quality Report released by IQAir, a Swiss air quality technology company, India is ranked eighth among countries with the worst air quality index. Even worse is the fact that 14 cities from North India occupy the list of 20 most polluted cities in the world.

The entire Indo-Gangetic Plain witnesses a spike in air pollution every winter. During the season, roughly the same atmospheric condition prevails throughout the region, which includes large parts of Delhi, Haryana, Punjab and Uttar Pradesh, bringing it under an "airshed". Winter sees a spike in air pollution as the drop in temperature renders it difficult for the pollutants emitted by different sources to disperse. Vehicle and diesel generator exhaust, heavy industry emissions, soil and road dust, open waste burning, and biomass burning all pollute the atmosphere throughout the year, but the

amplifying the effect.

Debates over the extent of the impact of stubble

noxious discharges get accumulated in the winter,

burning on air quality are going on. But this practice of clearing paddy crop residue from fields to sow wheat by burning it during October-November makes the situation worse. This November too, air pollution spiked in the region covering the national capital with toxic smog for about a week. Delhi remained the "most polluted" major city in the world for days together in November, according to IQAir's live data for over 100 cities. (*Text by:Vighnesh P. Venkitesh*)
