
GOD CALLS HIS PEOPLE TO WORSHIP

GOD SPEAKS TO HIS PEOPLE THROUGH HIS WORD

The Bible is the means by which God graciously reveals Himself to His people—so we listen, read, and study with expectant hearts. God particularly entreats us in His Word to sing psalms. And while all Scripture is appropriate for hymns and spiritual songs, there is a specific exhortation for us to make use of the Psalter as the church's songbook.

Scripture Reading—Matthew 26:36-41

Then Jesus went with them to a place called Gethsemane, and He said to His disciples, "Sit here, while I go over there and pray." And taking with Him Peter and the two sons of Zebedee, He began to be sorrowful and troubled. Then He said to them, "My soul is very sorrowful, even to death; remain here, and watch with Me." And going a little farther He fell on His face and prayed, saying, "My Father, if it be possible, let this cup pass from Me; nevertheless, not as I will, but as You will." And He came to the disciples and found them sleeping. And He said to Peter, "So, could you not watch with Me one hour? Watch and pray that you may not enter into temptation. The spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak."

Reading of the Word—Hebrews 5:1-14

For every high priest chosen from among men is appointed to act on behalf of men in relation to God, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins. ² He can deal gently with the ignorant and wayward, since he himself is beset with weakness. ³ Because of this he is obligated to offer sacrifice for his own sins just as he does for those of the people. ⁴ And no one takes this honor for himself, but only when called by God, just as Aaron was.


⁵ So also Christ did not exalt Himself to be made a high priest, but was appointed by Him who said to Him, "You are My Son, today I have begotten You"; ⁶ as He says also in another place, "You are a priest forever, after the order of Melchizedek." ⁷ In the days of His flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to Him who was able to save Him from death, and He was heard because of His reverence. ⁸ Although He was a son, He learned obedience through what He suffered. ⁹ And being made perfect, He became the source of eternal salvation to all who obey Him, ¹⁰ being designated by God a high priest after the order of Melchizedek.

¹¹ About this we have much to say, and it is hard to explain, since you have become dull of hearing. ¹² For though by this time you ought to be teachers, you need someone to teach you again the basic principles of the oracles of God. You need milk, not solid food, ¹³ for everyone who lives on milk is unskilled in the word of righteousness, since he is a child. ¹⁴ But solid food is for the mature, for those who have their powers of discernment trained by constant practice to distinguish good from evil.

Sermon—The Suffering Son is our High Priest

GOD CALLS HIS PEOPLE TO CONFESSION, REPENTANCE, AND RECONCILIATION

The people of God respond to His Word by confessing their sins, repenting of their sinful ways, and seeking God's favor through the reconciling work of Jesus, the Son of God.

Confession of Sin—based on James 1:21-25

Pastor: Lord, we come confessing. You have commanded us to put away all filthiness and rampant wickedness and receive with meekness the implanted word, which is able to save our souls.

All: But we have not been doers of the word, but hearers only, deceiving ourselves.

Pastor: As hearers of the word and not doers, we are like a man who looks intently at his natural face in a mirror. For he looks at himself and goes away and at once forgets what he was like.

All: The one who looks into the perfect law, the law of liberty, and perseveres, being no hearer who forgets but a doer who acts, he will be blessed in his doing.

Assurance of Pardon—Galatians 2:16; Titus 2:11-14

We know that a person is not justified by works of the law but through faith in Jesus Christ, so we also have believed in Christ Jesus, in order to be justified by faith in Christ and not by works of the law, because by works of the law no one will be justified.


Pastor: This is the promise of God.

People: We lift them up to the Lord.


Pastor: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

in this hymn of eternal praise:



Announcements

Worship Notes:

Hebrews chapter 5 highlights our own great weakness (even the high priest in ancient Israel was "beset with weakness" and had to make sacrifices for his sin) and Jesus' willingness to suffer for our sins. These two themes—our weakness, and His suffering on our behalf—can be found throughout the service. We open with a declaration that the Lord bears up the fatherless, the widow, the solitary, and the prisoner (Psalm 68). We respond by crying out for the Lord to "defend the weak" (O Lord Most High—Psalm 9) and to send help that would sustain us despite our weakness (The Lord Ever Hear You—Psalm 20). The Scripture reading presents a portrait of Jesus suffering in prayer while His disciples display their own frailty (Matthew 26), and hymns throughout the service confront us with the reality of Jesus being "slaughtered for our sin" (Fountain Of Never Ceasing Grace) and ask us to "look on the sufferings our Savior chose to bear" (There Is No Greater Portrait). In the closing hymn of the morning, Jesus Paid It All, these dual themes come together. In it, we describe ourselves as "child[ren] of weakness," covered in "crimson stain[s]," and yet we also rejoice that Calvary's Lamb has "washed us white as snow" by shedding His own blood. —Henry C. Haffner
