praises!


Reader 2: Sing praises to our King, sing praises! For God is the King of all the earth; sing praises with a

GOD SPEAKS TO HIS PEOPLE THROUGH HIS WORD


Scripture Reading—Psalm 133:1-3

Reading of the Word—1 Corinthians 1:10-17

¹⁰ I appeal to you, brothers, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you agree, and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be united in the same mind and the same judgment. ¹¹ For it has been reported to me by Chloe's people that there is quarreling among you, my brothers. ¹² What I mean is that each one of you says, "I follow Paul," or "I follow Apollos," or "I follow Cephas," or "I follow Christ." ¹³ Is Christ divided? Was Paul crucified for you? Or were you baptized in the name of Paul? ¹⁴ I thank God that I baptized none of you except Crispus and Gaius, ¹⁵ so that no one may say that you were baptized in my name. ¹⁶ (I did baptize also the household of Stephanas. Beyond that, I do not know whether I baptized anyone else.) ¹⁷ For Christ did not send me to baptize but to preach the gospel, and not with words of eloquent wisdom, lest the cross of Christ be emptied of its power.

GOD CALLS HIS PEOPLE TO CONFESSION, REPENTANCE, AND RECONCILIATION

The People of God respond to His Word by confessing their sins, repenting of their sinful ways, and seeking God's favor through the reconciling work of Jesus, the Son of God.

Confession of Sin—based on 1 Peter 2:1-2, 9-10, 16-17

Pastor: Lord, we come confessing; we come confessing our worldliness, our sinfulness, our divisiveness. You commanded us to put away all malice and all deceit and hypocrisy and envy and all slander.

All: Like newborn infants, we are to long for the pure spiritual milk, that by it we may grow up into salvation.

Pastor: For we are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for His own possession, that we might proclaim the excellencies of Him who called us out of darkness into His marvelous light.

All: Once we were not a people, but now we are God's people; once we had not received mercy, but now we have received mercy.

Pastor: We are to live as people who are free, not using our freedom as a cover-up for evil, but living as servants of God.

All: We are to honor everyone. Love the brotherhood. Fear God. Honor the magistrate.

Assurance of Pardon—from 1 Peter 2:24-25

Christ Himself bore our sins in His body on the tree, that we might die to sin and live to righteousness. By His wounds we have been healed. For once we were straying like sheep, but have now returned to the Shepherd and Overseer of our souls.

Pastor: This is the promise of God.


All: This is the Word of the Lord.

Pastor: He says to us, "Come to Me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest."

All: Thanks be to God.

Pastor: Amen.

Profession of Faith—The Apostles' Creed

angels, the archangels, and the whole company of Heaven in this hymn of eternal praise:



Worship Notes:

The hymns we sing this morning come in pairs, each responding to a different aspect of Paul's call for unity in the church in 1 Corinthians 1. We begin the service with a vision of the name of Jesus compelling "every heart and tongue" to "join the sacred song" (To Our Redeemer's Glorious Name), and close with a declaration that all our Father's works shall bless Him (Joyful, Joyful We Adore Thee). We sing twice from the Psalms that we look to see "all the faithful souls ever dwell in unity" (a paraphrase of Psalm 101:6) and that this unity is "good" and "becoming" (Behold How Good A Thing It Is—Psalm 133). We confess twice from The Church's One Foundation that the cornerstone of this "mystic sweet communion" between the saints is "one Lord, one faith, one birth" (echoing Paul's words in Ephesians 4). As we go to the table, the hymns speak of the particular joy of unity within the church: it is sweet to sing in one accord (O Lord, How Joyful Tis To See), and all who praise together in Zion are blest (O Lord Of Hosts, How Lovely—Psalm 84). While this vision is indeed sweet, it isn't easily attainable due to our fallen natures. As we go out, let's continue to sing and pray the final verse of the closing hymn: "teach us how to love each other..." —Henry C. Haffner
